Today, all Air Base Group personnel and their friends will have an opportunity to pay an informal farewell to Col. Griffith starting at 3:30 p.m. in the Enlisted Open Mess.

Tomorrow, 6:30 p.m., all Reese personnel are invited to attend the wing's formal farewell to Col. Griffith and his wife Jean in the Officer's Open Mess. A barbecue dinner will be served and dress will be casual. Cost of the meal is \$6.95 per person. Reservations can be made by calling Ext. 3520.


### Holiday activiti scheduled

"What are you going to do the Fourth of July", said 1st Lt. Mark Farmer, Freedom Fest Coordinator. "Come on out and join us at the Reese Freedom Fest '86. On Friday, July 4, from 1-5 p.m., the Reese Freedom Fest '86 Marathon will take place all over base.

"The competition is made up of 24 person organizational teams which will compete in different events in a continuing relay around the base. A total of 19 events will be completed before the finish. The events are as follows:

1. Run from picnic grounds to Wing Headquarters flagpole; tag cracker eater;

2. Eat three crackers, whistle the entire chorus of the "Star Spangled Banner" in an audible whistle. No spitting of crackers allowed. Tag tricycle rider at road intersection;

3. Ride tricycle around to the fire hydrant between CBPO and the Volleyball Court. Tag volleyball person at fire hydrant. Bring your three balls into service court. own tricycle;

4. After tagging tricycle

rider, volleyball person should proceed to the service line and begin serving. Three balls should be served into the service court over the net. Tag basketball person;

5. Make three freethrows and retrieve all missed balls. Tag tennis player at tennis court making sure not to run in front of other volleyball or basketball players. Bring your own ball;

6. Tennis player serves Cross 5th Street and tag wheel-barrow person. Bring own balls and racket;

7. Wheel-barrow 50 yards to 13th Street and tag soccer person;

8. Soccer-dribble around 13th Street to track and tag runner. Bring own ball;

9. Run clockwise around track and tag egg-tossers at north end of flicker-ball field;

10. Toss eggs a minimum of 10 yards for the total length of the flicker-ball field. If the egg breaks, start from the beginning. Tag sack-hopper. Bring own eggs;

11. Sack hop across the track towards pool. 100 vards available. Tag leap frogs. Bring your own sack;

12. Leap frog towards pool at least 20 of the 70 yards available then run to the ladder to tag the swimmer;

13. Swimmer walks fast to 3.5 foot deep pool start point, jumps in feet first, and swims to end of pool blowing a ping-pong ball in front. Modified breast stroke works best. No hands allowed. Tag three leg racers;

### **Top enlisted advisor selected**


technical assistance to small computer users. Over the course of the year 13 to 21 military personnel and six to 11 civilians assigned were assigned to IPC.

Everyone who has ever come in the main gate has probably seen the American flag proudly flying in the brisk West Texas breeze. Every morning and evening it is solemnly raised and lowered by members of Command Post, the Security Police and the Wing Honor Guard. These people do their job proudly, but I've noticed that some members of the wing are unaware of the honors that our flag deserves.

The stars and stripes represent a living country and should be considered a living emblem of the respect and pride we have for our nation. The flag is a symbol of our heritage from Bunker Hill to Beirut. It has been alternately honored, respected, burned and defiled. It represents everything that we, as Americans, should hold close to our hearts and, by following a few simple rules, we can give our flag the respect and reverence that it deserves.

Contrary to popular belief, you can display your flag on an inclement day. Just use an all-weather, nylon flag. If you use a flag in an auditorium, office or on a speaker's platform it should hold the position of superior prominence and be to the speaker's right as he faces the audience. Never wear the American flag as clothing or a costume, nor use it as bedding or draperies. A flag patch or lapel pin can be affixed to clothing and should be worn on the left lapel or shoulder near the heart.


During the raising or lowering of the flag, all persons in uniform should stand at attention and salute. All persons not in uniform should stand at





#### Lose weight, not life

Some Texas weight control clinics have been directly appealing to military service members to promote weight reduction with a product called MINT CAL.

The active ingredient in MINT CAL is 2-4 Dinitrophenol – DNP. DNP is used as a pesticide and a dog wormer. The Food and Drug Administration has not approved DNP for use in humans. The product interferes with the cell's ability to use food to produce energy. It produced an increase in metabolic rate and heat production and is highly toxic to man.

Persons using MINT CAL are urged to discontinue using it immediately. The Hospital offers weight loss classes which are safe and aimed at long-term weight control.



### **Everyone needs a budget**

#### by Nancy Ragan **Air Force News Service**

KELLY AFB, Texas (AFNS)-The key to financial solvency is a working budget backed up with a readily accessible savings account.

According to Rosalyn Massie, personal financial management program counselor in the Family Support Center here, people get into financial trouble because they lack a financial planning program.

They deal with money on a "want" rather than "need" basis, without finding out whether an item can be worked into the budget, she said. "They want it and just go out and buy it."

Many people think they don't need to save or budget, said Mrs. Massie. "They think, 'I have so many bills to pay and that's where my money goes.' But when they don't have the extra money for an emergency-that's when they really need it."

If people allow their expenses to exceed what is coming in, naturally their budgets are not going to babance at the end of the month. People really don't plan to fall, Mrs. Massie said, "they fail to plan.'

The only thing that keeps people solvent in the long run is a realistic working budget and a regular savings plan, she said, adding, "Saving has to be a systematic, willful thing to leave that money in an account for emergencies."

She said individual retirement accounts are fine once a person has a "savings backbone," because they have substantial penalties for early withdrawals. "But you need liquidity-at least three to six months' take-home salary that you can get your hands on in an emergency," she said.

People who don't know how to set up a budget can get help from the Family Support Center. At most bases there is a personal financial management counselor to help find out where every penny is going and to develop and balance a budget.

Because credit in this country is so easy to get, Mrs.

they are active duty," they can go to the FSC and talk to someone in the Air Force Aid Society. Air Force Aid can help reconstruct their budget, said Mrs. Massie.

AFAS has a program that will keep active-duty members from going into bankruptcy. "And if it's within the AFAS monetary limit, members can get an interest-free budget reconstruction loan,' she said.

Under the BRP, Mrs. Massie said, creditors are paid, all past-due amounts are brought up to date and members are brought to a point where everything fits within their ability to pay. The member has to accept financial management counseling and subsequent monitoring.

Once people get behind or pay bills late on a regular basis, their credit is affected. said Mrs. Massie. "The retail merchants association probably already has this information-and it stays on record for about seven years."

She explained that whenever a credit check is done, it shows whether a person pays on time or whether the bills are paid late. A credit check also will show whether or not there is a foreclosure, a repossession or-an uncollected balance.

Most credit associations across the country now are connected by computers so that an association in one city can talk to an association in another city. "You can't run away from your debts-your credit records follow you," said Mrs. Massie.

If a person has to file bankruptcy, there are two types available. Chapter 7-total bankruptcy-wipes all debts off the books. The other-Chapter 13-is the wage earner's budget reconstruction plan.

"With Chapter 13, your outstanding debts are paid back, but all interest and finance charges are deleted, and the payments are based on your ability to pay," said Mrs. Massie.

When a person files for bankruptcy, she said, it's very



### **Commander's trophy points**

RANDOLPH AFB, Texas (AFNS) – Lackland AFB, Texas, has lengthened its lead over Lowry AFB, Colo., to 110 points in Air Training Command sports and recreation competition. The Lackland lead in the race for the ATC Commander's Trophy comes 10 events into this year's 23 event sports calendar.

It's part of the national tradition to celebrate Independence Day. We have a right to set off fireworks. What is legal? What is al-

lowed on Reese? It is illegal to discharge any firearm or explosive on government property without written permission from the Base Commander.

If you or your organization plan to have an organized fireworks display, base approved or in your backyard, be sure the displays are thoroughly coordinated with all involved personnel, particularly Safety, Fire Department, Security Police, and medical departments.

In the City of Lubbock, as in most cities, it is illegal to set off fireworks.

### se catches a few inches of rain

The reason for records is for them to be broken. In the Reese area the weather has broken its share. The storms that have been plaguing the area have brought an incredible amount of damaging winds and large amounts of rainfall. The system that was the cause of these storms was an upper level low pressure system that was positioned just to the area's west in the center of New Mexico. The circulation from the low pressure system continued to bring moisture into the area keeping all levels of the atmosphere saturated. The low pressure system also kept spinning off disturbances in the form of troughs into the area creating instability areas which aided in the formation of thunderstorms as experienced at Reese during the last few days.

As a result of the low pressure system remaining in the area for such a lengthy period of time, Reese has received 6.05 inches of measurable precipitation for the month of June. The average rainfall for the month is around 2.05 inches! Winds from these storms are breaking all previous records which have been kept since 1952. 65 knots was the record but on June 16, 1986, the winds peaked out at 68 knots (78 mph). It has been known that the storms can be severe over the Texas Panhandle and it appears that this year the storms made this a self evident truth. In the case of the storm which created the strong winds, it's birth was right over the Reese vicinity. A gust front appears to be the culprit. A gust front is the result of a dying thunderstorm that collapses producing a disturbance much like that of a cold front on the surface but with very gusty winds and not as extensive as the cold front. The gust front is an area of extremely unstable air. The gust front that came into the Reese area came from a thunderstorm that was located in Oklahoma on the morning of June 16. This gust front then advected down to the Reese area and came into contact with the warm moist air producing an explosive situation resulting in a very severe thunderstorm. The trend of the moisture ' pattern since Tuesday is for the moisture to remain to the west of the Reese area. The low pressure system is also on the move and appears to be moving to the north and out of reach of the area. The result of this is the drying out of the area weather for the next few days. The weekend looks quite nice at this time with the temperatures being in the mid 90s and the overnight lows will be in the mid 60s. The chance of thunderstorms will probably be in the forecast but this threat will begin to decrease as the weekend approaches. Hopefully mother nature will let the air dry out and the days will be a little more comfortable and little less humid. A point of interest lies out in the Gulf of Mexico. A tropical storm called "Bonnie" is



"Can you image what it would be like to stick your hand on a pile of red hot burning coals or on a flaming burner from a cook stove? The feeling you would endure is very similar to what a small child bears when he or she comes in contact with a superhot playground slide," said SSgt. Ricky Pope, Ground Safety Technician.






