The joint statement by medical authorities, including Dr. Williams and Dr. George Pryor of Stamford, said. "After a careful review of the Sabin vaccine program, we are convinced that it is completely safe to proceed with Type I and II vaccines. The Surgeon General of the U.S. Public Health Service and the Director of the Texas Department of Public Health agree that local areas should proceed immediately with Type I and Type II immunization program.

Five Stations

Type I vaccine will be given Sunday, and Type II on Nov. 11.

Five dispensing stations will be set up in the county, and the vaccine will be given during the hours from 2 to 7 p. m.

There will be no charge for the vaccine. However, cost to the sponsors is approximately per dose, and to help dethis expense all persons desiring to help may leave donations in a contribution box at

each dispensing station. The vaccine is easily taken and will be given in a small cup of distilled water. It is safe for all ages, from six weeks up.

In Haskell, the dispensing station will be in the courthouse corridor, with entrance through the east door.

In Rule, Rochester and O'-Brien, the stations will be located in the school lunchroom at each place, and in Weinert at the community center.

Transportation

Persons desiring transportation to and from the dispensing centers should call the Sheriff's office in Haskell, and the High School in Rule, Rochester, O'Brien and Weinert. This service will be furnished without cost.



Courthouse Job Goes to Wichita Falls Man

W. W. Griffith. Wichita Falls contractor, was successful bidder on the job of repairing damage to the west wing of the courthouse in the May 26 storm, when bids were opened Tuesday at the regular meeting of the Commissioners' Court.

Griffith's bid of \$4,680 was for re-plastering, repainting and making other repairs to about 15 rooms, mostly on the second and third floors in the west wing of the courthouse.

Commissioners also approved the 1962 tax rolls as prepared by Tax Assessor-Collector Elizabeth Stewart. Total valuations for State and county taxes amounted to \$21,894,-590. Valuaions in the Weinert Water District amounted to \$1 .-370,100.

The Court also authorized the County Attorney to institute suit against Boyd Lumber Co. of Anson for damage to a bridge in Prec. 3, on the road along the south side of the John R. Watson Sr., farm.
