





Nichols also pointed out that the surface reservoir would eliminate necessity for the city to build a similar reservoir as now planned. The 500,000 gallon reservoir, mains to connect with the present downtown tower, and pumping facilities will all be built by the Authority.



City Court Would Pay Its Way

In the last fiscal year ,the City of Haskell received a total of \$245.25 in fees from justice and county court, representing the city's share of fines paid in cases developed by city police officers

During that period, cost of operation and maintenance of the city police department amounted to \$8,322,89, not including cost of a new police car.

With exception of \$245,25 court fees, expenses of the police department were paid from tax funds.

Setting up a city or corporation court, in which all law violations covered by city ordinances could be handled, would result in several thousand dollars additional revenue to the city, it is estimated.

Only added expense would be the compensation allowed the court judge, and this could either be a fixed monthly salary or on a fee basis with a maximum agreed upon.

With a city or corporation court available for handling violations, a more consistent enforcement of traffic laws could be carried out, and the program would be self-supporting.

Enforcement of all other city ordinances would be simpli-fied also. Many of these statutes enacted by the City Council from time to time, are enforceable only in city court. Under the pres-ent set-up, this would require the Mayor to receive complaints and preside as magistrate. That this is an inconvenient and unworkable arrangement is borne out by the fact that no cases have been handled in this manner for the past decade or longer.

We believe that if the City Council can work out a plan to set up a corporation court, if only for a trial period, it will meet with approval of a majority of Haskell citizens.
