ON THIS, the 5th day of November, 1962, the City Council of the City of Haskell, Texas, convened in Called session, at the regular meeting place thereof in the City Hall, there being present and in attendance the following members, to-wit: J. E. WALLING, JR., Mayor; RAYMOND DAVIS, R. L. STEPHENSON, OTHO NANNY, JOHN THOMAS, BOB SEGO, Aldermen and with the following absent: None, constituting a quorum; and, among other proceedings had, were the following:

SECTION 1: That said election shall be held at the CITY HALL in the City of Haskell, Texas, and the entire City shall constitute one election precinct.

SECTION 2: That the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of the election to-wit: John E. Robison, Presiding Judge; T. A. Rhoads, Judge; Mrs. C. N. Taylor, Clerk, and Mrs. V. A. Brown, Clerk.

SECTION 3: That said election shall be held under the provisions of and in accordance with the laws governing the issuance of municipal bonds in cities, as provided in the General Laws of the State of Texas, and only resident qualified electors, who own taxable property in the City, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be qualified to vote.

SECTION 4: That the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Chapter 6, V.A.T.C.S., Election Code, as amended, and that printed on such ballots shall appear the following: "FOR THE ISSUANCE OF \$650,000 REVENUE BONDS FOR WATERWORKS IMPROVEMENTS AND EXTENSIONS AND PLEDGING THE REVENUES OF THE CITY'S COMBINED WATERWORKS AND SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM TO THE PAYMENT THEREOF." "AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF \$650,000 REVENUE BONDS FOR WATERWORKS IMPROVEMENTS AND EXTENSIONS AND PLEDGING THE REVENUES OF THE CITY'S COMBINED WATERWORKS AND SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM TO THE PAYMENT THEREOF."

EACH VOTER shall mark out with pen or pencil one of the above expressions thus leaving the other as indicating his or her vote on the proposition.

SECTION 5: THAT a copy of this resolution and order signed by the Mayor of the City and attested by the City Secretary shall serve as proper notice of said election.

SECTION 6: In the event the said revenue bonds submitted under the proposition above are authorized to be issued by a majority of the resident qualified electors of said city, who own property therein, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, voting at said election, and the same are issued and sold the holder or

holders of such bonds shall never have the right to demand payment thereof out of any funds raised or to be raised by taxation; and each bond issued or executed in pursuance of such election, shall contain this clause:

"The holder hereof shall never have the right to demand payment of this obligation out of any funds raised or to be raised by taxation."

SECTION 8: THAT notice of said election shall be given by posting and publication of a copy of this resolution and order, at the top of which shall appear the words "NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS." Said notice shall be posted at three public places in said City, one of which shall be at the City Hall not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date on which said election is to be held, and be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Haskell, Texas, the first of said publications to be made not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date set for said election.

As of the start of the fall season, the U.S. government, or in other words, the taxpayers, had tied up in surplus dairy products, i.e., butter, cheese, and dried milk, a little over a third of a billion dollars. In butter alone, there is now piled up some 400,000,000 pounds, and there is only storage space available for 100 million pounds more.

**This is surplus in storage, and does not take into account the free dairy products the government gives away. With these costs added, the dairy industry is costing the taxpayers about two-thirds of a billion dollars per year. In the meantime, income to nation's 400,000 dairy farmers has dropped.**

It would appear the big problem is that few of the country's dairy cows have ever attended Harvard, thus, have little conception of the principles of a government rigged economy.

In March of 1961, the supplies of surplus dairy products had dropped substantially. So for reasons quite unknown the government raised the support prices from \$3.22 per hundred-weight to \$3.40. This encouraged greater production of milk, and at the same time raised the cost to the consumer so that milk sales declined.

A year later, or early in 1962, the government dropped the support price down to \$3.11 per cwt., but much to the surprise of the bureaucrats, production did not diminish. This was perhaps due to the fact that milk-

**Specialist Five Bowman Completes Refresher Course**

(AHTNC)—Specialist Five James E. Bowman, 30, son of Mrs. Era A. Bowman, Throckmorton, Texas, recently was graduated from the Seventh U. S. Army Non-Commissioned Officer Academy in Bad Tolz, Germany. **'62 Cotton Crop Estimate 50,000 Bales Over 1961**

A Texas cotton crop of 4,800,000 bales — about 50,000 bales above last year's — was forecast Aug. 8 by the Agriculture Department at Washington.

The department placed the Texas area in cotton at 6,580,000 acres, a 30,000 acre increase over 1961.

The indicated production was set at 350 pounds per acre, compared to 448 last year. If this prediction is borne out, it would be 90 pounds an acre above the 10-year average.

The total crop for the nation was estimated at 15,102,000 bales. This would be the largest since 1953 and one likely to add more than a million bales to the surplus.

By comparison, production last year was 14,318,000 bales. Production for the 1951-1960 period averaged 13,979,000 bales.

This year's crop — grown under federal planting allotments and marketing quotas designed to prevent excessive production — will be supplemented by a reserve and surplus supply of 7,700,000 bales accumulated from past crops. Much of this is owned by the government under price support operations.

The department has forecast foreign and domestic market demands at about 14 million bales.

The estimated yield to the acre of 461 pounds is 23 pounds above last year and equals the second highest yield in 1959. The record high was 466 pounds in 1958.

The department said that compared with last year, indicated acre yields are sharply higher in the central states, down slightly in New Mexico, Arizona and Georgia, and up moderately in most other states.

The department said that 709,000 acres of the 16,427,000 acres planted to cotton this year has been or will be abandoned. This indicated abandonment is 4.3 per cent this year compared with 5.7 per cent last year, and 6.3 per cent for the 10-year average.

**Cotton Ginning And Harvesting Changes Studied**

Shifts in the cotton producing areas of Texas and changes in harvesting methods have greatly affected investments in gins, according to Progress Report 2233 of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

The report shows that the Blacklands and East Texas have shown the greatest decreases and the High Plains the largest increases in cotton production. The areas with great declines in production have had comparable declines in the number of gins and those areas with increased production have had opportunities for expanded investment in gins, the report explains.

Cotton harvesting has almost completely shifted from hand picking to hand snapping and mechanical harvesting and thus has created a greater need for cleaning devices in the gin to handle this cotton. This additional investment has increased the equipment that a gin owner must make, the report continues.

There are wide differences in the amount of cotton each gin handles and in the areas of falling production they are not handling enough cotton to be economical, the report points out. The gins in the Blacklands and East Texas are not being fully utilized as are the gins in the High Plains.

These preliminary studies show that model gin plants should be developed as a guide for installing and remodeling gins to get the most efficient operation under different conditions and in different areas of the state.

## Farm Facts

Prices of food have risen less than most other items in the consumer's budget. This is pointed out by the Agricultural Marketing Service of the Department of Agriculture.

In 1960, retail food prices were about a sixth higher than their average in 1947-49, but the Consumer Price Index—the average of prices paid by consumers for all goods and services—was up by more than a fourth. Declining food prices helped keep the Price Index from climbing higher during this period.

Retail prices of foods originating on American farms rose less than the average for all retail food prices, which includes prices of imported foods and non-farm foods.

The slower rise in retail food prices than in the Price Index resulted entirely from the decline in farm prices, since charges for marketing these products increased at a faster rate than the Price Index.

The consumer's food dollar pays for the services of many different groups in the economy that produce, process, and

distribute food. It pays for the workers in agriculture and for the services, supplies, and equipment used in farming. It pays for processing, transporting, wholesaling, retailing, and other marketing services.

### Bale Grouping Will Aid In Better Ginning

The simple process of grouping unginning bales of cotton according to their moisture and trash content is suggested by B. G. Reeves, extension cotton ginning and mechanization specialist, as an aid to better ginning and improved quality. This is especially true during periods of damp weather, explains Reeves.

Here's an example. A bale of fairly dry cotton goes to the gin which can be processed into a low middling grade with a 31/32 inch staple without too much difficulty. But, what happens when this fairly dry cotton is ginned behind a bale with a much higher moisture content? Reeves says a low middling plus grade could result but with a drop in staple length to 15/16 of an inch. There could also be a loss of 19 pounds in weight as a result of the over-drying. Currently, he says, the price of LM 31/32 inch and LM plus 15/16 inch are the same, 29.11 cents per pound. However, the 19 pound loss in weight means a loss of \$5.53 in the bale's value. A higher grade but an actual loss in bale value.

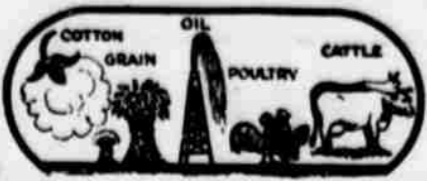

very best solution to a problem was to "court-test" an issue that could not be settled. I have seen opposing sides go to court in a very friendly manner in order to reach a decision without voluntarily setting a precedent for such future incidents. This is especially true in the great American insurance industry. The idea that a person has to go to court with a chip on his shoulder (as if he were going to war) is an idea that should be dispelled in our thinking. I have witnessed opposing sides in a lawsuit to settle an insurance claim go out after the decision and have coffee together and talk freely and openly about the decision. All of the legal ramifications had been properly "aired," both sides had equal opportunity to present their case, and the decision was the new law for future similar cases. It might even serve as the basis for the re-wording of some of the thousands of different contracts written in the insurance industry. What I am saying to Christians is that the utilization of our great judicial system is not to be avoided if we approach such utilization in the proper manner. Even a divorce case which reaches the court is not the place for an airing of personal animosities. It is a time, of all times, for rational action and for a presentation of the facts... even if some of the facts are quite personal in nature. Churches have used the courts in settlement of property disputes, and have come out better for having done so. The judicial process in America remains one of our foremost social institutions. It commands the respect of a people who desperately need a strong judicial system marked by honesty, impartiality and unchallenged integrity. Thus far, our system has shown itself to be just that!

### National Honors for Safe Driver Performance Won by West Texas U.

National honors for outstanding safe driver performance were won by West Texas Utilities Company in the Public Utility Division of the 31st National Fleet Safety Contest conducted by the National Safety Council.

The West Texas Utilities Company fleet, consisting of 322 vehicles, was awarded 1st place in the Public Utility Division at ceremonies held in conjunction with the 50th National Safety Congress and Exposition.

The award is based on the Company's safety performance from July, 1961, through June, 1962. During this period, the firm's drivers operated 5,289,791 miles and had 1.70 accidents per 1,000,000 miles of operation.

All accidents were counted in the contest except those occurring when a company vehicle was properly parked. Winners were determined after inspection of their records by an auditor appointed by the National Fleet Safety Contest Committee.

Mr. Doyle Gray, Safety Engineer for West Texas Utilities, received the award for the employees of West Texas Utilities.

Winners were also honored at a Victory Luncheon sponsored by General Motors Corporation in the La Salle Hotel's Grand Ballroom in Chicago, Ill. More than 700 safety experts from the nation's motor transportation industry at-

tended the luncheon.

Over 2,500 fleets competed in the contest operating 305,200 vehicles and traveling over six and a quarter billion miles.

The combined average frequency rate of 13.02 accidents per 1,000,000 miles is an increase of 4 per cent over the previous Contest period and is the highest rate since the 1957-58 contest.

Mr. Harold R. Hosea, Chairman of the National Fleet Safety Contest Committee, congratulated the winners and participants for their support of the contest and urged them to take greater strides toward safer fleet operations in the coming year.

 R. L. STEPHENSON,  
 OTHO NANNY,  
 JOHN THOMAS,  
 BOB SEGO, Aldermen

and with the following absent: None, constituting a quorum; and, among other proceedings had, were the following:  
 Mayor Walling introduced a resolution and order. Alderman Davis moved its adoption. The motion was seconded by Alderman Nanny, the motion carrying with it the adoption of the resolution and order, prevailed by the following vote:  
**AYES:** Aldermen Davis, Stephenson, Nanny, Thomas and Segó.  
**NOES:** None.

**THE RESOLUTION AND ORDER** is as follows:  
 WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Haskell, Texas, on August 12, 1958, adopted a resolution calling an election in said City to determine whether the City of Haskell should be authorized to enter into a contract with the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority for the purpose of supplying water to the City of Haskell; and  
 WHEREAS, Paragraph 6 of the said resolution provided in part as follows: "Such contract will provide that the City shall not be obligated to pay more than 30 cents per 1000 gallons of water delivered to the City;" and  
 WHEREAS, after the qualified voters of the said City of Haskell at an election held September 6, 1958 authorized the City to enter into such a contract with the Authority, the then City Council of the City of Haskell and the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority purported to enter into a water supply contract which did not provide that the City shall not

be obligated to pay more than 30 cents per 1000 gallons of water delivered to the City, but provided instead that the City shall pay a minimum of \$63,072.00 per year to the Authority regardless of the amount of water delivered to the City; and  
 WHEREAS, as applied to the maximum amount of water ever used by the City of Haskell and to the reasonably anticipated needs of the City of Haskell for water for the foreseeable future, the aforesaid minimum annual payment of \$63,072.00 would require the City to pay well in excess of the authorized maximum price of 30 cents per thousand gallons of water delivered under the contract; and  
 WHEREAS, the said contract between the City and the Authority also authorizes the Trustee under the Trust Indenture securing the issuance of bonds by the Authority to require an increase in the charges to be made for water to be delivered to the City of Haskell by the Authority beyond 30 cents per 1000 gallons, and said contract also authorizes the Authority to increase the charges for water delivered under the contract beyond 30 cents per 1000 gallons; and  
 WHEREAS, because of the foregoing provisions in excess of the authority conferred on the City Council by the qualified voters of the City of Haskell, the water supply contract between the City of Haskell and the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority is void and of no force and effect; and  
 WHEREAS, the City Council is convinced that the qualified voters of the City of Haskell are opposed to any water supply contract between the City and the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority and considers it desirable to hold an election in order to afford the qualified voters of the City of Haskell an opportunity to revoke the City Council's authority to enter into any water supply contracts with the Authority; now therefore

**BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HASKELL, TEXAS:**  
**SECTION 1:** That an election be held on the 4th day of December, 1962, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:  
 "Shall the City of Haskell, Texas, contract to buy water from the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority?"  
**SECTION 2:** That said election shall be held at the City Hall in the City of Haskell, Texas, and the entire City shall constitute one election precinct.  
**SECTION 3:** That the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of the election to-wit:  
 John E. Robison, Presiding Judge  
 T. A. Rhoads, Judge  
 Mrs. C. N. Taylor, Clerk, and Mrs. V. A. Brown, Clerk  
**SECTION 4:** That said election shall be held in conformity with the provisions of Chapter 342 Acts of the 51st Legislature, and only qualified electors of the City of Haskell who own taxable property in said City and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be permitted to vote at said election.  
**SECTION 5:** That the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Chapter 6, V.A.T.C.S., Election Code, as amended, and that printed on such ballots shall appear the following:  
 "FOR THE CITY OF HASKELL BUYING WATER FROM THE NORTH CENTRAL TEXAS MUNICIPAL WATER AUTHORITY"  
 "AGAINST THE CITY OF HASKELL BUYING WATER FROM THE NORTH CENTRAL TEXAS MUNICIPAL WATER AUTHORITY"

**RAL TEXAS MUNICIPAL WATER AUTHORITY"**  
 Each voter shall mark out with pen or pencil one of the above expressions thus leaving the other as indicating his or her vote on the proposition.  
**SECTION 6:** If this election results unfavorably to the City of Haskell contracting to buy water from the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority, said election shall constitute a revocation of all authority of the City of Haskell to enter into any water supply contracts with the Authority including any authority under the September 6, 1958, election to buy water from the Authority at a maximum price of 30 cents per thousand gallons of water delivered to the City, and thereafter the City Council shall have no authority to enter into any such contract without first obtaining the approval of a majority of the qualified voters of the City of Haskell in an election under Chapter 342, Acts of the 51st Legislature.  
**SECTION 7:** A substantial copy of this Resolution and Order signed by the Mayor of the City of Haskell and attested by the City Secretary shall be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published within the said City, the date of the first publication to be no less than 14 days prior to the date of said election. Except as otherwise provided in Chapter 342 Acts of the 51st Legislature the manner of holding said election shall be governed by the general election laws.

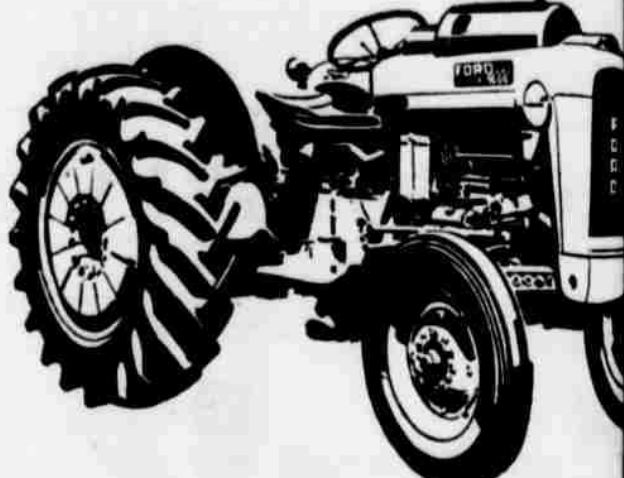

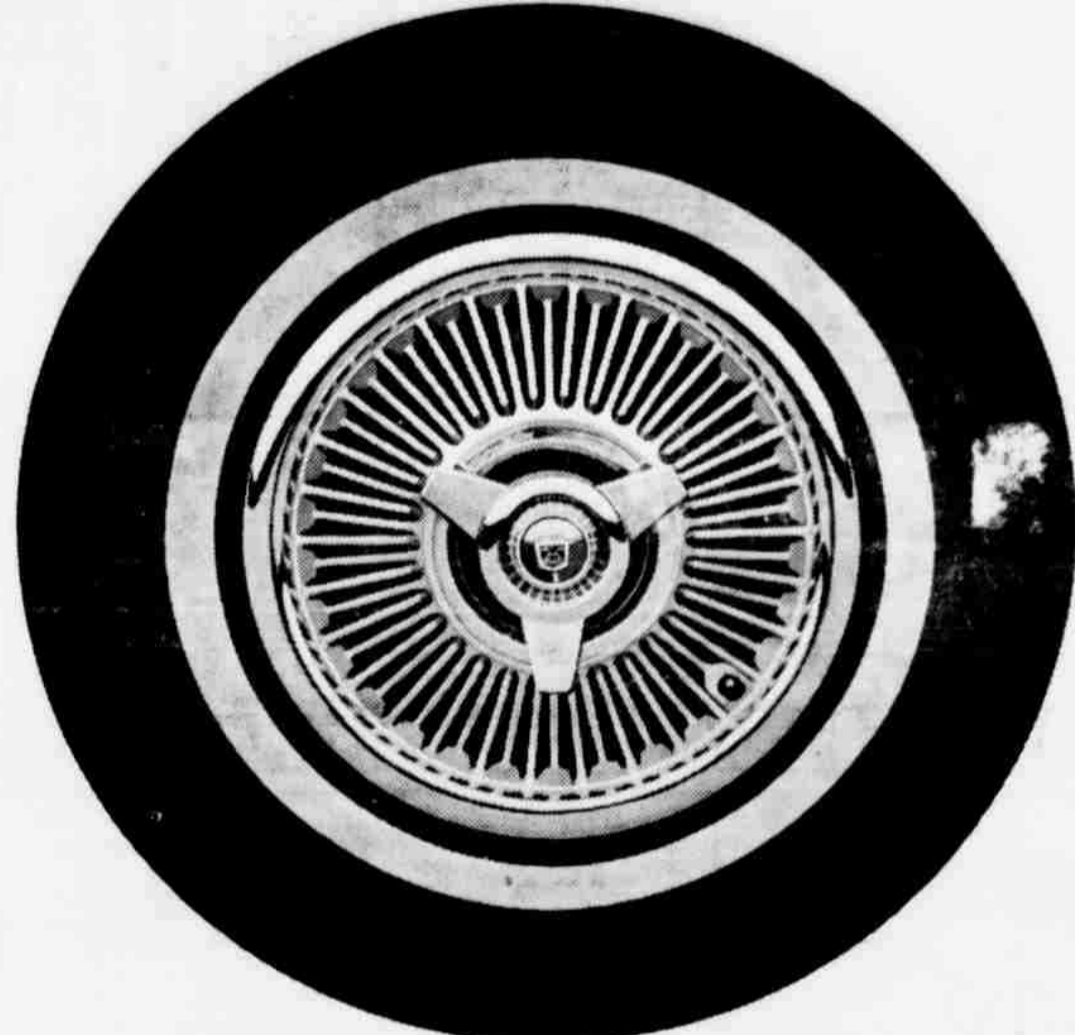

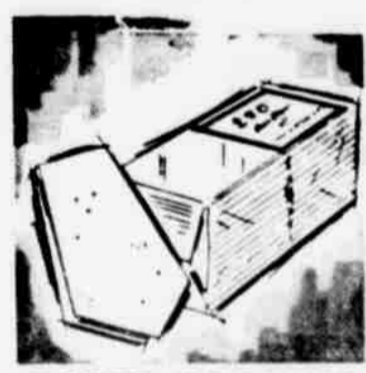
