A local committee to combat the Jan. 20 county rollback election has been established and has designated a campaign treasurer with the Scurry County clerk's office

Committee formed

Joee Gainer, a local accountant, will lead the educational effort to oppose the election that seeks to reduce the county ad valorem tax rate for 1990 from 39.80 cents to 34.75 cents.

The group is called Committee for Tax Facts, and members of the steering committee are Bill Parker, Joe Jackson, the Rev. Miller Robinson, Charlie Henderson, Dr. Carl Dillaha, Bill Wilson Jr., Dr. Jim Burleson, Fr. William Costegan, David Holt, Tommy Davis, Ruby Anderson, Jack Denman, Roy Baze, Teddy Hatcher, J.B. Tate Sr., Stanley Noah and Martin Brooks.

'There has been too much misunderstanding and misrepresentation surrounding this issue," said Gainer. "Our purpose is to communicate the facts--and we won't be dealing in innuendo.

According to Gainer, the Jan. 20 rollback election is "about progress, not about politics." He added, "We're neither supporting nor opposing any particular official or candidate. We're simply advocating Snyder's future

"Of course, no one wants higher taxes, but all of us need to remember that taxes are necessary for law enforcement, fire protection, and good health care. The people need to know that this rollback could have a negative impact on our community. That's the message that needs to be heard.'

Gainer said other members of the steering committee would be announced at a later date, and that the group would be available to present informational programs. Gainer reminded voters that absentee balloting began today and will continue through Jan. 16.

A. At least some people in Ellis County (Waxahachie) who say they voted for the rollback have returned their refund checks to the county treasurer. An AP story said the checks ranged from 13 cents to \$60. In Polk County (Livingston), some refund checks were also returned, the largest being an \$80,000 refund to Champion International Paper.

Richards files

AUSTIN (AP) - The slate of several political races remained up in the air as potential state officerholders hustled to beat a 5 p.m. deadline today for the filing of candidacy papers.

Democrat Lloyd Doggett and Republican Roy Barrera Jr. contemplated races for attorney general in the March 13 primaries. Dallas businessman James Huffines, Gov. Bill Clements' appointments secretary, discussed with advisers a run for land commissioner.

On Monday, State Treasurer Ann Richards filed for the Democratic nomination for governor.

Gasoline spill

MONONGAHELA, Pa, (AP) — About 10,000 gallons of gasoline spilled into the ice-clogged Monongahela River after a barge hit a bridge, but state and federal officials said water supplies were safe.

'The situation's under control and the water supplies are safe," said Betsy Mallison, a spokeswomen for the state Department of Environmental Resources.

The leaking barge, owned by Gutman Oil Co. in Charleroi, broke loose about 8:30 a.m. Monday, hit the Monongahela Bridge and ruptured about 15 miles south of Pittsburgh. Cleanup crews worked in-



After he pitches a diamond on the spade king, he can ruff a spade with a high heart, lead a diamond to dummy's ace and ruff a diamond high, and then lead an intermediate heart to dummy's king and ruff the last diamond. The only cards left in the North and South hands are hearts and clubs. South can now lead the lowly two of hearts to dummy's three-spot and play a club back to his jack. West will win the queen and be forced to play another club, or to give declarer a sluff and a ruff if he plays a spade.

West can thwart this endplay if he plays a diamond after winning the ace of spades. That deprives declarer of the communication to eliminate the side-suits before playing clubs. But leading away from the king of diamonds is not easy.

Avoid narrow-topped shades as the heat from the confined bulbs deteriorates the shades.

To achieve harmony in a room, keep the tops of table and floor lamps at the same level and use shades that are similar in style and fabric.

Worried about choosing the right size chandelier for your dining room? A good rule of thumb is that its diameter in inches should equal the diagonal of the room in feet. However, some decorators feel that when it 'comes to chandeliers, it's better to overscale than to underscale. 


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SHS teams resume chase for loop title



Fifty said arrested in hotel party violence

ATLANTA (AP) - At least 15 people were hurt and about 50 arrested after a New Year's Eve party at a downtown hotel turned violent and drunken revelers threw potted plants, fire extinguishers and bottles from balconies.

"At midnight it was literally raining bottles. I got hit in the back of the head with a bottle,"

A similar scene occurred in Charlotte, N.C., where a New Year's celebration at a hotel turned into a near-riot. Fire ofncials evacuated the Howard Johnson hotel after youthful vandals unwound fire hoses, emptied all the fire extinguishers, pulled smoke detectors from walls and broke the fire alarm system.

"There must have been somewhere around 1,500 teenagers," said Fire Department battalion chief Arnold Mullis. "They were out every window

"By the time we were ready to go to the symphony, there was no earthly way you could get out," Claude Talley, 62, said Monday. "We became captives, hostages.

Henry Hancock, *a telephone operator at the Marriott, said the hotel offered a special New Year's Eve package deal and sold out its 1,685 rooms, and many of the younger revelers apparently brought friends into their rooms.

Charges against about 50 people arrested in the melee at the 47-story hotel included reckless conduct, vandalism and assault. Most of those arrested were from 17 to 21 years old, police said.

Paramedics said as many as 15 people were treated for injuries ranging from broken teeth to cuts on the head. One was knocked unconscious, apparently by a falling object.

Brad Bosworth, a hotel manager, said eight people were hospitalized.

The hotel's atrium was strewn with toilet paper, beer bottles and cans, smashed glass tables, ripped-up furniture and potted plants. On several levels of the atrium, garbage and pillows were tossed about.

Bosworth said hotel officials had barely begun to assess the damage Monday.

In Charlotte, hundreds of youths threw hotel furniture from balconies and windows of the 11-story hotel. Some furniture landed in the swimming pool, authorities said.

No arrests were made because officers were unable to identify those who did the damage, said Capt. Earl Mathis of the Charlotte Police Department.







DEAR DR. GOTT: I have senile macular degeneration. I've lost the vision in one eye, and the disease has spread to the other one. Recently, I heard that 200 milligrams of zinc, a day would stabilize the condition, but then was subsequently told that consuming more than 15 milligrams of zinc daily could have adverse effects. What do you think?

DEAR READER: Macular degeneration is a condition of unknown cause marked by a malfunction of the portion of the retina needed for primary (central) vision. This is the leading cause of visual impairment and blindness in the elderly. There is no known medical treatment; some cases can be helped by laser surgery.

Zinc will not affect macular degeneration. The Recommended Daily Allowance for the mineral is 15 milligrams daily. Doses above this can cause anemia, nausea, abdominal cramps and fever. Therefore, taking 200 milligrams of zinc a day could result in dangerous toxicity.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I've been diagnosed as having several salivary stones in my mouth and jaw area. My oral surgeon suggests leaving them alone, since they don't bother me. Do you have any information to provide?
DEAR READER: Hollow, fluid-

containing organs - such as the gallbladder, kidneys and salivary ducts are particularly prone to stone formation. Dissolved calcium is present in body fluids and can precipitate as granules under certain circumstances, much the same way ice forms on the surface of a pond. The reasons for this chemical reaction are unknown but are probably related to the acidity/alkalinity of the fluids, coupled with poorly understood genetic influences.

Salivary stones are common. They can be large or small and can affect the saliva-producing glands themselves or the ducts that supply saliva to the mouth. Ordinarily, these stones do not cause symptoms and are left alone. They do not affect health.

On occasion, however, salivary stones result in blocked ducts, leading to swelling, pain and inflammatior. When this happens, the stones should be removed. I agree with your oral surgeon: Leave the stones alone unless you experience symptoms from

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Woman dies when car runs over her

SOUTHLAKE, Texas (AP) -A woman died after being pinned by a car that apparently slipped out of gear while she was walking behind it, police said.

The woman, Pamela J. Rickett, 40, died Sunday night at Harris Methodist Hospital in nearby Fort Worth about seven hours after the accident.

Rickett had gotten in the car and started it as she prepared to go to a grocery store, but then left it to get a sweater. As she was walking behind it, the car slipped into reverse and rolled backwards, Southlake police Capt. Malcolm Jackson said.

'The car was still in reverse and running when she was found pinned under the car," Jackson said. "Someone in the house heard the accident and ran outside, that's who found her first.".

Texas Department of Public Safety spokesman David Wells said the accident would not be included in the agency's count of holiday weekend traffic fatalities because it occurred on private property.

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


