

### In Brief

### Lower rates

WASHINGTON (AP) -The White House, breaking with its usual no-comment stance on activities of the Federal Reserve Board, said today that "lower interest rates are justified."

Presidential spokesman Marlin Fitzwater said recent economic reports show that the economy could benefit from an easier monetary policy.

'We had a recent drop in the prime (rate). That hasn't been totally passed through. But we nevertheless remain hopeful that it will be," Fitzwater told reporters.

Major banks lowered the prime interest rate on Jan. 8 to 10 percent, down from 10.5 percent. The independent Federal Reserve, however, has not lowered its bellwether discount rate. the rate it charges to other banks, for nearly a year. It stands at 7 percent.

### One arrested

SOFIA, Bulgaria (AP) -Ousted Communist leader Todor Zhivkov has been placed under house arrest on charges of inciting ethnic hostility, misuse of state property and malfeasance in office, the state news agency reported today.

The announcement came more than two months after the hard-line party chief, who had ruled for 35 years, was ousted by a peaceful, pro-democracy revolution and replaced by more moderate Communists who have promised free elections and democratic reforms.



including Dorothy Martin, president; Robert Patterson, vice president; and Sylvia Carpenter, secretary-treasurer.



## **Bridge** by James Jacoby



Although contract bridge is 60 years old, we haven't yet seen enough eightcard suits to know the best way to bid them. One thing is certain: When your first bid is five clubs, you will give the opponents fits. What you hope is that you won't be giving your partner a headache too. South, as dealer, tried that opening bid in a recent tourna-ment. Neither opponent could take action, and North knew that the opening bid would have been different if South

held a very strong hand.
It's easy to see the advantage to declarer. Since neither of the opponents had the opportunity to get into the bidding, West really had no inkling as to the best lead. So he tried the ace of hearts. South unblocked the heart king as East followed with the eight. If West now switched to a spade, declarer would have to win the ace and take a finesse against the queen of clubs in the East hand to make the contract. In fact that play would score an over-trick. But West did not know what de-clarer held in diamonds. If South held any two diamonds, the hand would be set by playing ace and another diamond. So West tried that play. South ruffed and quickly played A-K and another club. The spade losers now went away on the good hearts.

I can't recommend South's opening bid, but it certainly worked in today's deal. If South opens one club, East will get in a spade bid, and it will no longer be possible for South to steal a fiveclub contract.

Dawson County Sheriff Terry Brown advised that he has 5 deputies, 4 jailers and 1 office deputy which would total 11 counting the sheriff. Dawson County has a 21-bed jail. Scurry County has 5 deputies, 6 jailers and a jail cook which totals 13 including myself. Scurry County has one deputy that teaches the DARE Drug Program 4 days a week in our schools.

Scurry County has a 57-bed jail. In 1989 the Sheriff's Department made the county \$126,676 boarding out-of-county prisoners. We spent less than \$8,000 of this amount, leaving a \$118,000 profit for taxpayers.

Presently, we are boarding 21 out-of-county prisoners. If we have room to continue this for all of 1990, the department will net the taxpayers \$250,000 to \$300,000. The total Scurry County Jail budget estimated for 1990 is \$280,412.

Scurry County Jailers work 168 hours in 4 weeks. Scurry County deputies work 171 hours in 4 weeks.

Mr. Falls was also asked why his committee used Dawson County instead of Nolan or Andrews County. He replied, "We have to make it look as good as we can."








DEAR DR. GOTT: What are the aftereffects of Rocky Mountain Fever? Could it cause memory and/or hearing loss, and could it take up to 121/2

DEAR READER: Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever is a tick-borne infection causing headache, fever, chills, muscular pains, a hemorrhagic rash, low blood pressure, insomnia, delirium and coma. Untreated patients may develop pneumonia, heart damage and encephalitis (brain infection). Antibiotics are used to cure these

Because Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever can cause brain inflammation, memory and/or hearing loss could be a late complication of the disease. However, 121/2 years is such a long interval between the illness and the complications that the tick infection is an improbable cause of the

Such a patient should be examined by a doctor to determine if other ailments causing memory loss, such as Alzheimer's disease, could be present. If the patient lives in an area where Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever is prevalent, such as the southeast United States, the doctor should order a blood test for this condition, as part of a general diagnostic approach.

To give you more information on symptoms similar to the ones you describe, I am sending you a free copy of my Health Report "Alzheimer's Disease." DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm a 59-yearold male. About a month ago, I began wetting the bed. I don't drink coffee, but do consume two to three bottles of diet soda a day. What would be the

DEAR READER: The sudden development of enuresis (bed-wetting) in a 59-year-old man should be investigated by a urologist. This symptom can result from urinary-tract infection, including prostate infection, and abnormalities of the bladder sphincter, a muscular ring controlling the act of urination.

Some men experience incontinence as they age: This is due to a poorly understood breakdown of the normal bladder-to-brain nerve impulses, which signal the urge to urinate. In addition, prostatic enlargement, a common condition in older men, will prevent complete emptying of the bladder; this, in turn, leads to more frequent nighttime urination and, in sound sleepers, occasional enuresis.

You may be able to help the situation, before seeing a urologist, by reducing your intake of fluids, particularly in the evening. Drink only when you're thirsty and confine your fluids to daylight hours.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm a 17-yearold male and stand 5 feet 4 inches tall. All my life, I've put up with jokes about my size. Do you know of any exercises or prescriptions that can add a couple of inches to my height?

DEAR READER: I'm afraid you'll have to resign yourself to being short. At age 17, your centers for bone growth have probably calcified, making further growth impossible. Therefore, exercises and prescription drugs (such as growth hormone) would not

If the next five years are a copy of the last five years, Scurry County will have reached complete bankrupt status.

The commissioners gave a 5% pay raise to all county employees including themselves, when they knew the county couldn't afford it.

The commissioners have been spending money with absolutely no thought of what it is doing to the finances of our county.

Those opposing the rollback have gone to the Senior Center with scare tactics suggesting that a rollback would close the Center. ## Arkansas, UT win; tied for SWC lead

The Arkansas Razorbacks, third highest scoring team in the nation, posted their fewest points of the season yet coach Nolan Richardson couldn't have been

The 12th ranked Razorbacks smothered Southern Methodist with a fullcourt defense and forced 19 turnovers in an 80-61 victory over the Mustangs.

He added "We broke them down pretty good. SMU was sucking air trying to keep up with our

Arkansas forward Lenzie Howell said the Mustangs got jittery against the fullcourt pressure which forced 19 tur-

"They (the Mustangs) were intimidated by our pressure," Howell said. "You could see it in their eyes. I lot of teams don't like pressure. By the time they learned how to handle it the game was over."

Arkansas, 13-3 overall, slapped a fullcourt press on the Mustangs, who didn't score until almost five minutes were gone.

Huery scored nine straig points, including a three-point shot, to boost the Arkansas lead to 28-10 and the Mustangs were down and out.



HOLLIDAY, Texas (AP) - A teacher's error in averaging grades has caused the Holliday High School boys basketball game to forfeit 13 victories and cost the girls team two victories.

The boy's team had been off to a 17-3 start and captured championship trophies in three tournaments. Now their record is 4-16 and they will have to return the trophies.

School officials said Wednesday the investigation started as a complaint concerning the eligibility of a female student athlete.

The problem turned out to be a teacher's error in averaging The complaint was filed with the University Interscholastic

League in Austin. Investigators found a slight, unintentional flaw in the averaging of

grades, Texas Education Agency officials said. The TEA investigation revealed that only an error had been on the

grade of the female athlete in question, but a review of grade books revealed that a player on the boy's team had also failed a class That made him ineligible under the state's "No Pass, No Play"

rule and Holliday High School had to forfeit all the games in which the ineligible players participated, the minimum penalty under the

"We didn't have to report the boy, if you want to be technical about it, but what's right is right," said school principal Bill Lee.

B.J. Stamps, assistant to the director of the UIL, said the caller, a man who said he was from Archer City, told the UIL that a teacher had curved an entire class's grades on a test by 20 points to enable the girl to pass the test and play basketball.

"I was looking into allegations about a grade being curved, but found they have a system in that district that allows for a curving of grades, so they weren't in violation there," TEA education specialist Susan Sellars said.

School officials say all teachers have been briefed on the error. "It's our job to encourage and help students," Lee said. "I don't

like to think of the lesson they're learning from this. "In reality, the boys feel they won the ball games regardless of the official record," Lee said. "If there's a good point about this, it all happened before we went to district (play) or in the playoffs."

The boy's team is now 2-0 in district play, a small consolation, according to basketball coach Steve McIlhaney. "I've been a coach for 19 years and I've seen a lot of things, but this is one of the most unfortunate instances," McIlhaney said. He said

the incident had left the players "hurt and somewhat disillusioned."



Rooted on by a record crowd in the Dean Smith Center, the Tar Heels routed their eighth-ranked archivals 79-60 Wednesday night.

### Commander regains control of Columbia

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. Columbia's astronauts today tested their flight systems for Friday's homecoming after taking control of their ship when a bad navigation signal from the ground sent it into a slow spin.

Dan Commander Brandenstein, roused from sleep, manually overrode the shuttle's navigation system and stabilized the craft until Mission Control transmitted correct guidance signals.

There was no danger to the five astronauts, but "we had a little excitement tonight," said flight director Bob Castle

The incident happened Wednesday night, about 21/2 hours before their scheduled wakeup. A false fire alarm also got them out of their beds Wednesday.

A third wakeup, at the planned time, was music to their ears: a rendition of Washington and Lee University's fight song. One of the astronauts, David Low, is a graduate of the school.

"Good morning, Columbia, after what must have been a restful, or restless, night," the

control center radioed. President Bush planned to

radio them later in the day. Brandenstein and pilot Jim Wetherbee successfully tested Columbia's flight control systems to make sure they were in good shape for returning home. During the 10-day mission the astronauts have deployed a Navy communications satellite and retrieved an 11-ton science laboratory that had orbited for six years.

The weather at Edwards was bad early today, with rain and snow flurries. But NASA said the storm would leave the region later in the day, and conditions were expected to be good Friday.

The landing is scheduled at 2:55 a.m. PST at Edwards Air Force Base, Calif.



## **ACLU** says Gramm bill only 'ploy'

WASHINGTON (AP) - Sen. Phil Gramm is promising to get tough on drug thugs with a series of stiff anti-crime proposals that would require most inmates to work and could deprive them of such prison amenities as airconditioning.

But an official of the American Civil Liberties Union says the plan is an election-year ploy that fails to address the causes of drug abuse and drug dealing and ignores such issues as education, treatment and prevention.

"Every election year we see these new, get-tough approaches to the drug problem, and they're offered as though we haven't gotten tough on the drug robiem, said Gene Guerrero, a legislative representative for the ACLU.

Gramm, R-Texas, and House Minority Whip Newt Gingrich, R-Ga., are proposing legislation that would declare a five-year national drug and crime emergency act to "deal with the problems of our bleeding nation.'

'What I think we need to do is string some of these people (criminals) up," Gramm told a Capitol news conference Wednes-

While Gramm acknowledges his plan would look "pretty revolutionary" in Washington, "in Mexia, Texas, it will have strong support."

Joe Gunn, president of the Texas AFL-CIO, is already objecting to Gramm's proposal to allow prisoners to work in private industry, saying it would take particularly vulnerable to away jobs in a state with too high an unemployment rate.

"There are things (inmates) can do for the federal or state government ... but we (in Texas) have a policy of opposing them going into private industry," Gunn said.

Gramm's bill would require mandatory sentences, without parole, for federal drug and violent crime convictions. It also imposes stiff penalties for drug users; allows states, local governments and businesses to conduct random drug testing; and restricts the courts' right to limit prison overcrowding.

Gramm also announced that one of several sites in Texas seeking a 6,000-bed federal prison has a good chance of landing the facility from a national field of about 100 competitors.

Sites in the running include Big Spring, Beaumont and Lufkin, Gramm said. Other areas that have also expressed interest are Fort Stockton, Childress, Breckenridge, Mineral Wells, Woodville, Huntsville, Dalhart, and Upshur County.

Under Gramm's proposed state of emergency, prisoners could be housed in temporary space, including military bases or in tents, while costs for building new prisons could be cut eliminating such nonessentials as air-conditioning.

Prisoners would be required to work, with the only exceptions for medical, disciplinary or security reasons. The bill seeks to use prison labor for public purposes, and would encourage the DISMISSALS: Amy Choate, development of public and private prison industries.

The reservist call-up was needed in part because recent cuts under Gorbachev's plan to slash the nation's armed forces by 500,000 men have depleted the pool of units that can be moved to the Caucasus, Yazov said.

Also today, Gorbachev made Azerbaijan since 1923.

## U.S. diplomats are worried about impact of Panama incidents

WASHINGTON (AP) — Angry State Department officials say U.S. diplomats overseas could be the target of reprisals following a series of incidents between U.S. forces in Panama and foreign envoys there.

We cannot conduct diplomacy on the basis of 25-watt thinking,' said one administration official, accusing the U.S. military of failing to take into account the potential diplomatic consequences of its actions.

The incidents "put in jeopardy American diplomatic missions all over the world," said Perry Shankle, a former president of the American Foreign Service Association, the union of career diplomats. He was the only one of several officials interviewed who was willing to be quoted by name.

Fearful of the diplomatic fallout as a result of incidents at the embassies in Panama of the Vatican, Cuba, Peru and Nicaragua, the association has expressed its concern in a private letter to Defense Secretary Dick Cheney

## Maybe oat brandoes not lower cholesterol after all

BOSTON (AP) - The ballyhooed powers of oat bran lowering effect when you use are challenged by a study today concluding this faddish food fails to lower cholesterol after all.

The idea that oat bran lowers the level of dangerous cholesterol in the blood has been widely accepted in recent years. Some health experts have recommended starting the day with a bowl of oatmeal, and oat bran has become a common ingredient in muffins, cookies, bagels, even

doughnuts and potato chips.

The new study found that people's cholesterol levels indeed go down when they eat lots of oat bran, but it's only because they also eat less saturated fat and cholesterol than usual.

There really isn't any cholesterol-lowering property in oat bran," said Dr. Frank M. Sacks, a co-author of the study.

Some researchers were skeptical of the findings.

High amounts of saturated fat and cholesterol in the diet can raise blood cholesterol levels, leading to heart disease. But when people eat lots of grain products, they're too full to eat their usual amounts of fatty food, according to the new study.

In the latest study, volunteers' cholesterol levels fell significantly both while eating lots of oat bran and while eating equivalent substituting oat bran for other amounts of low-fiber white flour and Cream of Wheat. But they also cut their intake of saturated fat and cholesterol.

"They were meeting their caloric requirements, and they didn't feel hungry," said Sacks. "If they were eating Cream of Wheat in the morning, they didn't have any room for bacon and eggs. If they had high-fiber dinners, they weren't out eating pepperoni pizzas.



### Myerson's friend named in lawsuit

NEW YORK (AP) - Carl "Andy" Capasso, boyfriend of former Miss America Bess Myerson, was named in a \$70 million civil racketeering lawsuit filed by his former wife.

Nancy Capasso claims he hid assets from her during their divorce in 1985 and has prevented her from receiving a \$6.4 million divorce settlement.

The lawsuit was filed in U.S. District Court in Manhattan, the same courthouse where Capasso and Myerson were acquitted in December 1988 of criminal charges that they conspired with Judge Hortense Gabel to fix the Capassos' divorce.

Andy Capasso, who recently completed a prison term for federal tax evasion, was one of several defendants in the lawsuit. Also named were Capasso's bank and insurance companies, which Mrs. Capasso claims interfered on behalf of Capasso in the sale of property she received in the divorce settle-
