Some of this county's irrigated wheat averaged better than 30 bushels, Martin said, and some of the dryland crop fell below that figure, so "that WRS about what it averaged out." said the Haskell County

agricultural agent. It was one of the most bountiful wheat harvests this area has seen in years, Martin declared.
