## Keep your car new for years to come

We have all probably heard the tories about the little old lady in mint condition, having only driven it to church on Sundays or the past 60 years.
Well, there are many more vehicles on the road that have 100,000 or more miles on the odometer and are still running
strong. And in almost every case trong. And in almost every case simple: proper maintenance. Many of you may have taken advantage of the good deals last all and may now be proud wners of new cars and trucks. Whether you remain proud of your investment, and keep your vehicle in like-new condition your attention to its depend on needs. With that in mind, I offer the following maintenance chedule to get your car started off right.
For future reference, you might want to keep this column with a notebook in your glove compartnent where you can record maintenance procedures. Such record may even come in handy
if you ever sell the vehicle, as a record of its good care. And, finally, remember that if you do not feel comfortable perorming any of these checks o changes yourself, there are plen
ty of qualified mechanics and specialty automotive centers, like quick-lube shops, that can hanis for you to stay on top of things and know when op or and know when to schedule Oil Filer Cher - Oil and Filter Changes: As have said many times before,
motor oil is the lifeblood of you motor oil is the lifeblood of you car's engine. Its performance is
key to the rest of your engin working properly.
Above all, you should use the grade of motor oil recommended in your owner's manual. In ure models, most manufac "lighter" multi-grade are recomending Energy multi-grade oils with ratings, Conserving II (EC-II) Climate $5 \mathrm{~W}-30$ and $10 \mathrm{~W}-30$ products.
You should also follow your owner's manual recommendations on oil and filter changes. Most of us drive between 5 and 30 miles a day, to and from work in stop-and-go traffic. Under hese conditions, the oil and oil filter should be changed every hree months or 3,000 mile whichever comes first. Frequent oil and filter changes prolonged engine life.

- Air Filter: Inspect your air filter cooling system flush. It should every 3,000 miles and change it when it appears dirty. How often air filter will depend on the mileage and the terrain where you drive. When is it dirty enough to change? When in doubt, go ahead and change it. - Antifreeze/Engine Cooling System: Antifreeze can be easily

If you drive mostly short trips in stop-and-go traffic, your transmission fluid should be changed between 15,000 and 25,000 miles, depending upon your vehicle manufacturer. - Brake Fluid: Brake fluid should be checked whenever checking other vital fluid levels. Be sure to
clean the top of the master clean the top of the master
cylinder with a clean cloth before removing the cap. And use only brake fluid conforming to DOT 3 requirements when additions are required. Frequent need to add brake fluid is an indication of severe brake wear
- Power-Steering Fluid: Powersteering fluid should also be checked during your regular
underhood service. Always turn the engine off before doing this check to prevent injury. Clean the cap to avoid contaminating the fluid with dirt.

hose and pump damage. Tune-Up: Make sure your vehicle gets a complete tune-up at least once a year, preferably before winter if you live in a cold

 NUMBERSPAY Now that the Internal Revenue Service requires Social Security numbers for dependents on tax returns, the strategy appears to be paying off. "Seven milliondependents between 1986 and 1987 tax returns, suggesting that not al the dependents that had been claimed (when Social Security
numbers were not required) were bona fide dependents. Tax audits have resulted in an average additional tax owed per return of more than $\$ 2,000$. The
IRS will target for audit the tax returns that showed seven dependents or more for 1986 returns than were listed for 1987.
The IRS estimates that about three billion dollars of extra tax revenue will be collected when fewer dependency exemption are claimed by taxpayers.
