Voters Approve and Issue Tuesday

Voters of the City of Haskell marched to the polls Tuesday, December 4, and voiced their opinions as follows on two propositions:

The bond issue carried better than two-to-one as 572 voters favored the issuance of \$650,000 revenue bonds for waterworks improvements and extensions and pledging the revenues of the city's combined waterworks and sanitary sewer system to the payment thereof, while 245 turned thumbs down on the proposition.

A total of 576 voters were against the City of Haskell buying water from the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority, while 272 favored the proposition.

Mayor J. E. Walling stated that the city council will proceed with the preliminary of the \$650,000 bond issue, through normal channels, as fast as possible and will get Lake Stamford water to the people of Haskell at the earliest possible date.

The Mayor says the Stamford and Haskell city councils have not met officially in approximately a year or more, but from an off the record discussion with the Stamford mayor, R. R. Kelly, and some of their councilmen they have stated they will sell water to Haskell and he feels that Stamford is anxious to sell water to Haskell and it is just a matter of ironing out details.

Officers and directors met Tuesday morning at 7:00 o'clock at the Highway Drive-In at which time projects for the next several months were outlined.

School Superintendent Bob King announced just before press time that the school board had accepted the new Elementary School building, and students will move into the building Monday of next week.

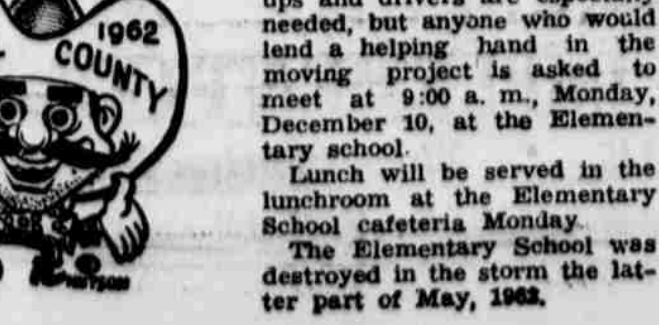

A High Calling

Effective government in a Republic such as ours depends upon a well informed, articulate public opinion. Elected officials must be sensitive to that opinion. A key factor in preserving our free society and representative government has been, and will continue to be, the more than 11,000 newspapers which are published in this country. Commenting on this, Representative Carl Albert of Oklahoma has said: "The functioning of an open democratic society demands an informed populace. History is replete with decisions not made or made erroneously because the weight of public opinion was against them. Thus, a newspaper becomes the means of disseminating information—accurate, factual information—to serve as the basis for reasoned judgment."

A newspaper's editorial opinion is a vital part of the information which it presents to its readers. Its importance cannot be over-estimated as a means "to stimulate the interest and arouse the concern of the average citizen in those issues which are broader than his private world." We are indeed fortunate that the vast majority of those who follow the newspaper calling know their deep responsibility and meet it so well.

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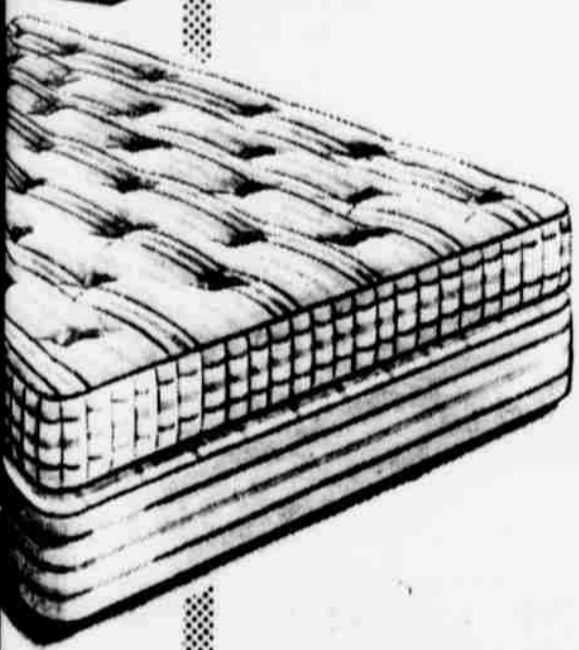

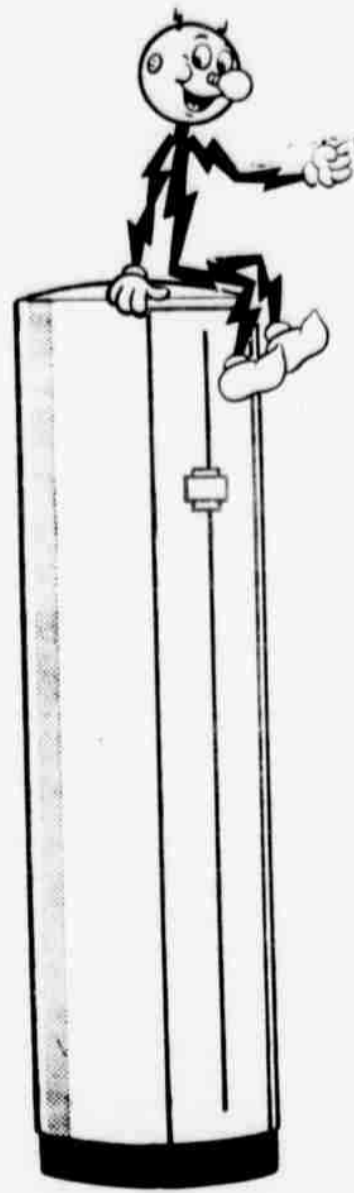

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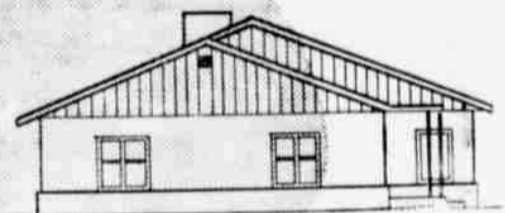

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Now Is the Time to Start Christmas Cards and Gifts On Their Way

Postmaster Harold Spain said today, "Right now is the time to start your Christmas cards and gifts on their way. The calendar says Christmas is less than a month away, but here in the Post Office it will be Christmas every day from now on. The Postmaster went on to say that by getting into action now a lot of headaches can be avoided when the full Christmas rush begins. For example, if you have articles of unusual size or bulk, better check with the Post Office before attempting to mail them—the limits on size and weight of packages vary, depending on where you mail them from. As an extra precaution, it's always a good idea to place an extra label carrying both your return address and the recipient's address inside the carton or package.

Postmaster Spain also suggests: "Be sure to send your Christmas cards by First Class mail, using the attractive new 4-cent Christmas stamps. When sent First Class, your cards are delivered quicker, and they will be forwarded or returned, if it becomes necessary. Also, they may carry written messages along with your signature."

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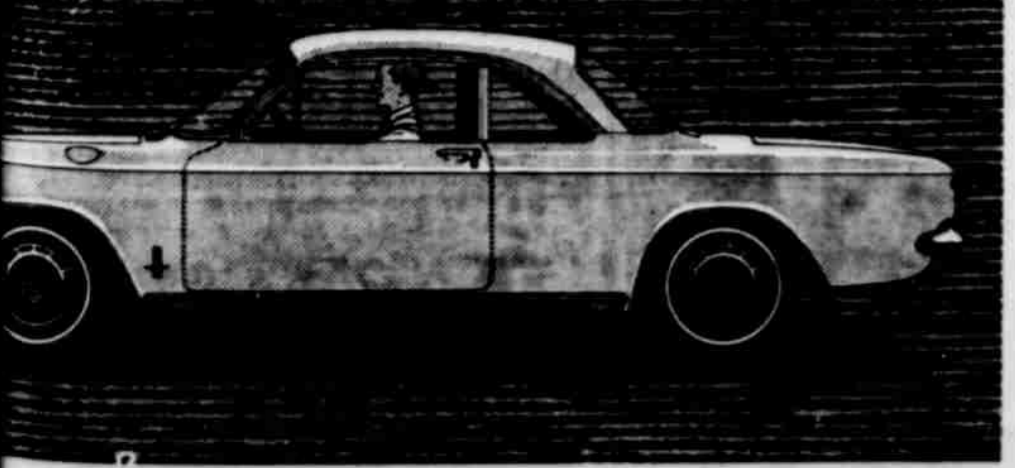

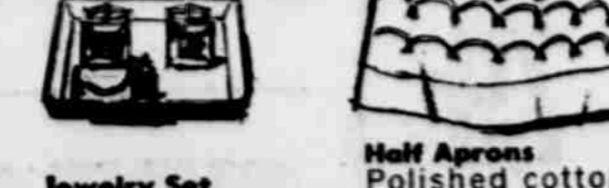

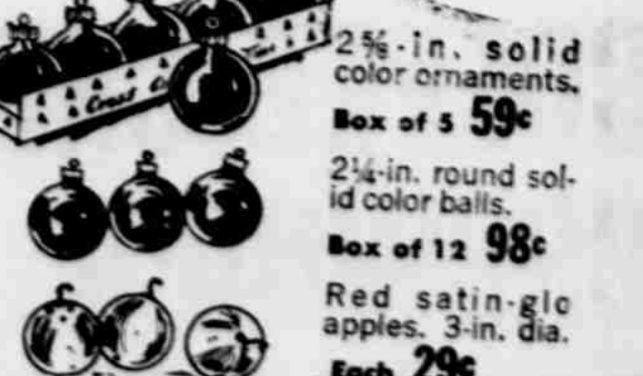

Polling places where Haskell County Farmers may cast ballots in the referendum on marketing quotas for the 1963 upland cotton crop were announced today by Mr. Ray R. Overton, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conser-

Weinert, Community Center; Haskell, ASCS office. Polls will be open from 8:00 a. m. to 6:00 p. m.

Any person who does not reside in the county in which he is engaged in the production of upland cotton in 1962 may obtain a ballot prior to the referendum from any county ASCS office and cast his ballot by mail. Also, any producer, who resides in the county in which he is engaged in the production of cotton, but will be out of the county on Dec. 11, may cast his ballot by mail. Absentee ballots must be mailed in accordance with instructions available at county ASCS offices and must reach the county office for the county in which the producer is eligible to vote by 6 p. m. Dec. 11.

Chairman Ray R. Overton explained that every effort has been made to inform farmers fully about the allotment-quota program so that the outcome of the referendum may represent the considered opinion of all the voters. Farmers eligible to cast ballots are all those who engaged in the production of upland cotton in 1962. This includes those farmers whose 1962 cotton history acreage is protected by participation in the Soil Bank, released acreage or preservation. If the
