

mar, a synthetic hormone derived from salmon) appears to inhibit bone loss. This prescription drug is administered in daily injections. It reduces pain and stimulates bone formation, but it causes nausea and skin rashes. The initial enthusiasm for fluoride

has waned. Early studies showed that fluoride pills relieved symptoms in osteoporotic patients. However, more recent reports have cast doubt on the effectiveness of this treatment, and many specialists no longer advocate

Therefore, in answer to your question about the use of fluoride/calcium combinations, the final word is not yet

I suggest you seek a consultation with an endocrinologist, a doctor who specializes in diseases of gland and bone metabolism. This specialist will examine you and obtain tests, such as a bone density, to assess the degree of bone calcification. Then, armed with information about your specific case, the doctor will advise you whether calcium, fluoride, hormone and/or calcitonin treatment would be appropriate.



Make the defense airtight

By James Jacoby

A declarer plans ahead to get the required number of tricks for his contract. A defender also must plan ahead, although his object is to get tricks to set the contract.

Today's East was guilty of a common bridge crime — he didn't think ahead, and thus played too fast. He won the ace of diamonds and led one back for West to ruff. West then returned a low heart. South now had a choice of plays. He could play low, hoping that West held the king of hearts. Or he could rise with dummy's heart ace, come to his hand with the ace of clubs, and then hope that West held the spade king.

Declarer guessed wrong by playing West for the spade king. When declarer took the losing trump finesse, East led back a heart, and the king was the setting trick.

This time East did not have to pay for his bad defense. After the opening lead, East can see that the diamond ruff can wait. What is important is that the defenders develop a positional trick in a side-suit. West will need ei-ther the club ace or the heart king. The club ace can wait if West holds that card, but if he has the king of hearts, the suit must be attacked immediately. So East should play back the jack of hearts. East can later give West a diamond ruff, but the play of a heart at trick two is crucial to setting the contract with airtight defense. Details slow SEC proposal

FAYETTEVILLE, Ark. (AP) University of Arkansas **Athletic Director Frank Broyles** says UA is a long way from leaving the Southwestern Conference for the bigger bucks of the Southeastern Conference.

"It's not a done deal. Not anywhere near a done deal," Broyles said of recent overtures by the SEC to Arkansas, a charter member of the SWC.

In a response to SEC officials, Arkansas athletic officials have said the university would be willing to be considered in the SEC's bid to expand its 10-team slate.

But Broyles said in an interview that UA officials have heard nothing further officially from the SEC, perhaps because of the details involved in a possible expansion.

"There has to be something to talk about before they are ready to talk," Broyles said last week. "The schedule is a big issue. They've got a lot to talk about. Possible divisions, the basketball tournament, the baseball round robin - there's a lot to do."

He said he believes any negotiations with the SEC would occur later rather than sooner because so much is involved.


"The next move is up to the SEC, and that is as it should be," he said. "When they feel they have something to talk to us about, a meeting will be set up."

Any decision by Arkansas to leave the SWC would be based on the future direction of college sports, Broyles said.

"We have a lot at stake in the Southwest Conference. Tradition plans to par the 452-yard ninth, a is important," he said, "and for us to break tradition it's got to be where colleges sports is headed, that we'd be missing the train if we don't, that we'd be left out.'

There is no doubt, Broyles said, that the Southeastern Conference is more profitable than the SWC.







The state aims to have 95 percent of Texas students in an equalized system by 1995.

"We think that the system is significantly changed," Kirby

Assistant Attorney General Kevin O'Hanlon said the law provides a way to keep track of increasing education costs so the gap between rich and poor school districts won't widen in future years. The gap increased after past education reform efforts.

Hooligans attack

WEST BERLIN (AP) -Celebrations of West Germany's World Cup victory turned deadly today as hooligans attacked police and foreigners, smashed windows and looted stores in both German states.

Police said four people were killed and more than 100 were injured during melees and brawls across the two nations.

Hundreds of thousands of Germans poured into the streets in scores of cities to savor the emotional victory Sunday night, but roving bands of rowdies and neo-Nazi skinheads are blamed for using the celebrations for their violent rampages.

The violence lasted into this morning and widespread vandalism and looting was reported in numerous cities.

'exas author has taken front row seat to life

KERRVILLE, Texas (AP) -Perched on a bicycle seat, Norman Ford has had a front-row seat for some of life's most prohumanity at its most intriguing, has seen some of nature's most spectacular beauty and has witnessed the steady decline of the world environment.

Ford says he would like nothing more than a "reunited planet" focused on saving the environment in his lifetime.

"I'm not very patriotic," said Ford, who holds dual citizenship in the United States and England. He says national borders may be preventing people from working together to solve serious world

Ford has an expanded concept of duties for the armed forces freed by improving East-West relations.

"What we really need an Army for is to go to East Africa and prevent people from destroying the elephants, or to go to Brazil and stop people from burning down the rain forests. It would be cheaper to pay the workers there for not burning down any more trees" than it will be to pay for the consequences of environmental destruction, he says.

As the author of more than three dozen books, many dealing with quality of life, Ford speaks knowledgeably about what he considers a deteriorating quality of life. His statements are sprinkled with facts obtained during research for his books as well as his own personal memories of a quiet yet memorable childhood in the British Isle.

Ford grew up in Wales, in the coastal town of Tywyn, where his father was an auditor for the railroad. "It was a complete paradise," Ford recalled, "with mountains on one side of the village, salt marshes leading to the sea on the other, sand dunes, a beach a quarter-mile wide and estuaries filled with bird life."

"We took her to the station and after an hour or so of questioning, she finally admitted that she got a rifle she borrowed from a friend and went downstairs and shot her," Carmack said.






