



Texas' banner Democratic County is Dallas, with 13,410 for Wilson and 2,554 for Hughes electors. Bexar gave 7,008 Democratic votés and 5,494 Republican; Harris, 10,131 Democratic and 3.009 Republican, while Galveston cast 3.542 Democratic and 1,264 Republican votes.

Nine Texas counties went Republican, namely. Dewitt, Lee. Comal, Maverick, Gillespie, Guadalupe, Zapata, Kendall and Washington. The latter is the home of J. P. Buchanan, Congressman from the Tenth Texas District. It gave 1,119 Democratic votes and 1,306 Republican ballots.

The Fight to the Death That Ended the Lives of Crockett and Bowie.

Since 1822, when Mexico threw endured much at the hands of the new government. A climax was reached when Santa Anna seized tutionalists and made himself dictator. He was the particular enemy





Mr. Harvey became interested in the building of roads through necessity. In his section of Arkansas, where he located about fifteen years ago, there were no roads worthy the name. Failing to arouse the citizens of the community to a point where they would volunteer to help build some, he began making ter the better citizens they became with reference to their atwhile building roads they also built character.

It was then that Col. Harvey began a propaganda for better roads that has since extended into six states. He organized the Ozark Trails Association and was elected as its president. Members of the association pay \$5 per year for the privilege of belonging, and during the five years of its existence no man has oeen solicited by Col. Harvey, or at his suggestion, to join the association. From the start a tew patriotic men have kept their memberships alive and each Ozark Trails convention has brought with it a substantial in crease in the volunteer membership roll. From this small fund the expenses of the association are paid, including the expenses of the president while actually engaged in the work of promoting or building roads, with no salary to him.

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





the passage of an act or acts Dallas members Will Present Concurrent Resolution in Legislature

> A constitutional convention for the purpose of revising the basic law of Texas will be sought by Representative C. O. Laney and State Senator J. C. Mc-Nealus, both of Dallas. A concurrent resolution calling the convention will be introduced by the two men in the Thirty-Fifth Legislature which con venes at Austin on Jan. 9, 1917.

Mr. Laney is of the opinion that the chances are the best chey have eyer been for the passage of the resolution. He said that he would oppose any further efforts to patch up the present document. Joint resoutions submitting constitutional amendments to a vote of the people require a two-third majority, whereas only a majority n each house is needed for the concurrent resolution calling the convention.

"My idea of a Constitution is that it should be a statement of the fundamental law and not a statute book," Mr. Laney said. "Then we would not always meet the objection that every bill introduced is unconstitu-

Early Artificial Limb.

There is preserved in the Royal College of Surgeons, London, what is probably the very earliest specimen extant of an artificial leg. This remarkable limb is considerably over 2,000 years old. having been unearthed in 1885 from a tomb at Capua, which was built at least as far back as 300 B. C. Yet for beauty of shape and carefulness of those turned out today. with pieces of thin bronze, fastened by bronze rivets to a hollow wooden core and is modeled so as to accurately rep resent the form of a real leg. The out side is believed to have been enameled flesh color, and the upper part of the artificial leg was connected with the living stump by means of a circlet of sheet bronze edged with small rivets, probably used to fasten a leather lin ing.-Pearson's.
