SEEKING CONVENTION FOR ADOPTION NEW CONSTITUTION Dallas mambers Will Present
Concurrent Resolution in Legislature
A constitutional convention
for the purpose of revising the for the purpose of revising the
basic law of Texas will be sought bv Representative C. O. Laney and State Senator J. C. Me-
Nealus, both of Dallas. A conNealus, both of Dallas. A con-
current resolution calling the convention will be introduced by the two men in the ThirtyFifth Legislature which con
venes at Austin on Jan. 9, 1917. Mr. Laney is of the opinion hat the chances are the bes hey have ever been for the pas
sage of the resolution. He said that he would opvose any further effurts to patch up the
present dozument. Joint resolutions submitting constitutional amendments to a vote of the people require a two-third majority, whereas only a majority in each house is needed for the
"My idea of a Cunstitution is that it should be a statement of
the fundamental law and the fundamental law and not a
statute book," Mr. Laney said. "Then we would not always
meet the objection that every bill introduced is unconstitu tional.
"What we call our Constitu-
tion is really a hotch-poteh of legislation. Approximatelv 300 measures to amend the Consti tution have bsen introduced in
the Legislature during the last ten years. Since Sept. 25, 1883, the Constitution has been amended thrty eight times, and
the courts have virtually amenc ed it many more times by deci ons. It covers ninety-six pages sixteen articles and thirty-eight amendments, :while the? FederConstitution only covers and has only seven articles and eventeen amendments."
Among the changes from the present Constitution Mr. Laney ument are the amending of the homestead law, the increasing of the number of Judges of the Supreme Court, increasing the power of local self-government. reducing the number of mem bers of the lower house, "remod-
eling the election laws and eling the election laws and changing the present system
of operation of the Legislature Another feature which \& Mr Laney introduced two years ago the proposal for a short ses he Legislature to be devoted purely to the introduction of bils. Each bill will be printed and a copy furnished the members, but no action will be taken. Ders, but no action will be taken.
The short session would then adJourn for a veriod of \&thirty days in order to give the memcarefully and eliminate the okers. The extra time would Iso furnish an $3_{3}$ opportunity for he people $t_{1}$ express their opin
