65 PER CENT OF TEXAS FIRES PREVENTABLE

Defective Chimneys and Flues Are Cause of Half of Fire Destruction

According to figures compiled by the National Board of Fire Underwriters, Texas fires, causing losses of about \$5,000,000 in 1916, were in many ways preventable. The exact figures show that individual carelessness, covering a wide variety of fires led the field in starting blazes.

THE DANGER OF DIRTY MOUTHS The human mouth has been styled 'The gateway of health preventable diseases enter the body through the mouth; and the teeth of many mouths are so unclean and decayed that each bite of clean food they chew and swallow is filled with millions of disease germs. Among the diseases that are largely attributable to decayed teeth are chronic indigestion. heart disease, kidney disease, rheumatism, hardening of the arteries, pneumonia, and tuberculosis. The health of the nation demands that people shall have a better understanding of the importance of clean teeth.

The time to set up a better health program is while the body is young and free from disease. Many city schools are giving much attention to mouth hygiene. Recent data collected in Cleveland, Ohio, show that there exists an intimate association between the class standing and the health of the mouths of children. Incorrigible, inattentive and stupid children have become normal, well-behaved, bright and studious after their mouths received proper treatment. Many results of dental treatment have been little short of marvelous.


