## What is a Weed?

In Farmers' Bulletin No. 660 recently issued from the Depart ment of Agriculture a new definition for a weed is suggested The author of this bulietin in
discussing a definition of a weed says: "A weed has been defined as a plant out of place. This definition is not entirely satisfactory for two reasons: (1) Because a plant may be
out of place and still not be a weed in the popular sense, as rye growing in a wheat field or Kentucky bluegrass in an alfalfa field, and (2) becaue a plant may
not be out of place and still ber not be out of place and still be

scientific circles they are referred to as "pediculi," in order

given thern a new importance, especially since typhus has brok especially since ty out in en out in European armies. A recent paper by Dr. Fischer of of tynhus in relation to the "lice plague," now so tormidable in eastern Europe. The routine eastern Europe. The routine
history of tyhus, its description by Fracastorious (1533) and as "taboridillo" by Francesco Bravo (1570), the superb account of Pringile (1752), the attempts to differentiate it from typhoid by Willis (1643), Huxham (1737), the final and classical differentia tion by W. W. Gerhard in America (1837) and Sir William Jenner in England (1849), and the subsequent developments up to the time of Plotz are well known. Dr. Fischer lists the many curious names given to the
