Principal basis of the plaintiff's lawsuit seeking the injunction was the alleged hiring by the City of an Austin law firm to oppose the granting of a permit for a dam on Miller Creek which would create a water supply for the towns of Haskell. Munday, Rule and Goree.

Plaintiffs contended that any legal fees spent in opposing the Authority, a govern-agency created by the Wat mer Leg. are, should be paid by ind iduals opposing the project and not by another govern-mental agency, such as the City of Haskell in this instance.

Text of Ruling

The text of Judge Williams' ruling in the case was substantially as follows:

As shown by the evidence .n the trial of this case, the council has expended from funds previously pledged for legal expenditures sums in the approximate aggregate amount of \$4,700.00, for the hiring of attorneys and in the instigation of lawsuits in opposition to the creation and exisence of another legal entity, being referred to in this case as the water district. The testimony of the councilmen who took the stand was to the effect that they were of the opinion that such expenditures were for the best interest of the City of Haskell and would be continued 1n the future, unless they were stopped by court action.

The right of a municipality of the type that Haskell to spend tax money is 18 strictly overned by the statutes. Unless an expenditure is allowed by the statutes, it is illegal, regardless of how sincere the council might be in their belief that the expenditure was for the best interest of the municipality, and regardless of how beneficial the expenditure actually might be to the municipality. The spending of what is to It shell rather large sums of money for the hiring of attorneys and the instigation of lawsuits in opposition to the water district is not allowed under any of the provisions of the statute. In view of the testimony that such expenditures will continue. unless prevented by court action, the injunction restraining same will be issued. There is a prayer in the petition that members of the council be restrained from furnishing services to the city and being paid therefor. There is evidence of statements made by council members that they realized such practice was not in keeping with the statutes and that they have no further intention of carrying on said practice. I believe that the word of the councilmen is just as good wherein they say that they will not do a certain thing as it is in the cases where they say that they will continue to do certain things, Relying upon the evidence in this case of their statements to the effect that they would not transact any business with the city and be paid therefor in the future by the city, they will not be restrained in this instance. Besides the word of the council, the plaintiffs have adequase protection under the criminal laws. We are reminded that there is a suit pending in the appellate courts of this state that is decisive of the differences between the citizens of Haskell and the water district.







The Record Speaks

The Chicago Daily News recently had something to say about the much-maligned medical profession which deserves the widest possible reading. Here, in part, is its view: "In these times doctors seem constantly to be under attack as selfcentered, venal, 'old-fashioned' in their fear of socialization of their profession, even callous in their regard for the welfare of the older portion of the population.

"We don't doubt there are some bad doctors; the AMA is constantly policing its own vast membership, disciplining those who take too easy a view of the profession's high standards.

"But the record of the past couple of decades eloquently reflects the wisdom of entrusting the medical profession with its assigned tasks and the freedom to carry them out in its own way. One by one the great scourges-diphtheria, smallpox, typhoid, polio, tuberculosis-have been or are being wiped out. Cancer's days are clearly numbered, heart disease is under vigorous and effective attack

"A single statistic ... sums up the progress: If the 1937 death rate were still operative. 4,400,000 healthy Americans now living would be dead.

"These results did not just happen. An immense amount of hard work, of dedication, and service above and beyond the normal scope of duty brought them about."

This is what the record shows, and all the political attacks we have seen and will yet see can't change it. Political tinkering with U.S. medicine is a menace.

Another Mouse Trap

Th Chicago Sun-Times observes: "Emerson's mousetrap shows up in many different guises. The quote about the world beating its way to the door of the man who makes a better mousetrap is an illustration that competition and the free enterprise system is good, not only for business, but for the consumers-the buyer of mousetraps.

Cause of this editorial comment was the installation. by one of the country's leading oil companies, of a filtering device on all its gasoline pumps. Cleaner gasoline is thus delivered to the cars of the company's customers.

The company, of course, hopes that the innovation will increase its service station business. And so it's an example of how the profit motive makes for better products, in big ways and small
