Moving Land Mark.
One of the oldest store and office buildings in Floydada is being moved out of town this week. This is the Duncan old building on the southeas corner of the square, which was moved here about 10 years ago.
It was first used as a drug store, later as an office building and for storage. Since the erec-
tion of their brick on the lot adjoining, the frame building has been a menace in the way of fire risk.

Chair man Lindsey, in calling the meeting to order, suggested that the work be continued as a student body addressing itself to economic problems of the farmer and that the work of the Commission should be educational in its nature. He recommended that the Commission be enlarged and that
active members be substituted active members be substituted for those who had expressed their inability
consideration.
Mr. Peter Radford, Manager of the Commission, told the meeting of his success in undertaking to organize the farmers through
out the state for the purpose securing their co-operation with the Farm Life Commission.
Mr. E. J. Kvle of the A. \& M College stated that the colleg was planned to send out organizers to encourage co-cperation in all forms of community life

Dr. R. A. Burroughs, All-Texas Manager of Methodist Orphanages Will be Here Fridav morning to Confer with Citizens and Trustees

The important announcement was made Wednesday afternoon that Dr. R. A. Burroughs, of Waco, superintendent of the Methodist Orphanage at Waco, and manager for Texas of all Methodist Orphanages, will be in Floydada Friday forencon te confer with the citizens of Floydada and the trustees of the Floydada Presbyterian Academy with reference to taking over the Academy plant by the Methodist hurch, operating it as an orphanage
The announcement is that be will motor to Floydada with Rev. O. P. Kiker, presiding elder of the District, and deat the Daily Hotel Friday A. M . the project.
W M. Colville is responsible for the statement that at least three of the Board of Trustees of the Acadəmy are willing to release the plant to the Methodist people; it is his opinion that the majority of the board will concur in this. In all probability a majority of the board will be presen and go over the matter officially with Dr. Burroughs
This is an especially important announcement; it means that the idea oI the establishment of an orphanage at Floydada advanced only a few weeks since, has met with instant favor in theeyes of the people responsible in the Methodist Church and that what might have been a wait of several months may be compassed within a much shorter time.
But your presence is desired at this meeting. The interest the citizenship demonstrate mav mean securing this im portant institution
of it. Be on Hand.

The fact that the Methodists have shown instant interest in the move to the West Texas Methodist Orphanage estab lished in Floydada, assuming the ownership of the Presby terian building and grounds, should be a matter for congra tulation on the part of every citize:1 ot the town; it should also be the intent of every citizen to see that the matter does not fail to go through on account of lat the part of the people of the town.
There is at present an approximate outstanding indebtedness against the Academy of $\$ 6500$. The Trustees of the school are willing,-three of them at least, more than likely adl, -that the Methodist Church take over the property after satisfying the indebtedness against ;it. Floydada citizens may be called on to take care of a part of this indebtedness possibly all. Pn comparison with the price that numerous other cities and townstion par for similar institutions this is small.
A town not a hundred miles distant at the present time has a standing bonus for a similar institution to be established by a certain fraternity, of upwards of $\$ 20,000$. Other cities have paid more.
Some may object to reference to money before the bridge. is approached; but there is always a time "to count the cost;" that time is before the time for action. The sure reward should also be considered.
