## Alcohol Barred From Navy.

 Alcohol as a beverage has been barred out of the United States Navy, Following the recommendation of Surgeon-General Brist, Secretary of the Navy Josephus Daniels has issued an execative order abolisning all alco holic liquors from every ship andstation of the Navy. The order reads, "The use or introduction, for drinking purposes, of alcoholic liquors on board any naval vessels, or within any naval yard or station, and commanding officer will be held directly responsible for the enforcement of this or der." The significance and extent of the change which has taken place in popular views this sweeping order of the secretary, can be appreciated only when one recalts the stories of naval experiences of past generations, when rum, brandy and whisky formed -a part of the regular official rations, when liquor of some kind was served, as a routine procedure, to officers and men before going into action, and when one of the chief characteristics of sailors, whethability to dispose of an amazing quantity of intoxicants. The development of scientific methods and the use of instruments of precision in warfare have made the modern ately detrimental to the modern naval man. Sea-
