C. C. French, Secretary of the C. C. French, Secretary of the
Southwestern Bovs' and Girls Hog Clubs, the Texas Industrial Congress has extended the con-
ditions governing its offer of
$\$ 1600$ in prizes in its livesteck $\$ 1600$ in prizes in its livestock classes so as to include all mem-
bers of the baby beef and hog cluhs of the State. Entering the livestock classes of the Congress will only require the mem-
bers of these clubs to enroll their names and to keep cost records on feeding.
The Congress requires the
weighing of each hog or stee entered in the contest in the presence of two disinterested again on October 5, 1914. Between October 5 and October 10, each animal entered in the contest must be shipped to For
Worth to be judged there during the Livestock Show. No pre-
liminary expenses will be incurred, as these animals can be con signed to any of the livestock yards in Fort Worth, and when the hog or steer is sold, the shipping expenses will be de-
ducted. By shipping to For Worth, during the Fat Stock Show, contestants will receive premium prices for their ani
mals and these will be high mough over the ordinary market price to talke
