Under the above heading "N R. s. Writing in the Live Report of February 4 th offer
some convincing argument rela tive to governmental reports of cattle and conditions which now appear to be before the livestock raisets and dealers. This arti cle follows:
"In last week's issue of the Live Stock Report we published the Department of Agriculture's lestimate on the supplies of live stock in this country as at Janu-
ary 1st, the per capita and total ary 1st, the per capita and total
valuation, tozether with comvaluation, together with com.
parisons for a number of past parisons for a number of past
vears. People doubting the ac vears. People doubting the ac-
curacy of the government's recuracy of the government's re
port are reminded of the fact that market receipts bear them out, as for instance, at nine mar kets where we maintain houses
(Fort Worth and El (Fort Worth and El Paso includ
ed) cattle receipts for 1915 were ed) cattle receipts for 1915 were
almost ten per cent greater than almost ten per cent greater than
in 1914, while in 1914, while hogg practically 15 per cent.
"One is immediatelyl impressed, not so much by the increase in our swine population of prac-
tically 5 per ceni, but of the very tically 5 per cenc, but of the very
material increase in our cattle material increase in our cattle
stocks, not only as compared with last vear, but with a num with last year, but with a num
ber of years immediately preced ber of years immediately preced

San Françisco, Feb. 5.Shooting some of our weak minded jurymen", was suggesttwo frequent acquittal of women charged with shooting men, by Judge Frank P. the army. He held the command of the Virginian troops the army. When the breach between the Colonies and Great Britain was widened by mutual animosity beyond any hope of reconciliation, tne eyes of his countrymen were fixed upon this commander, Wash. gion, and accordingly, in June, 1775, he took suvreme Mass. The complete history of George Washington, this great patriot for the next few years, is the historv kevolution. We are chiefly indepted to him for independenc which was finally secu"ed by a treaty of peace signed in the year of 1783. In 1789, he was elected President of the United States; at this time he left his beautiful estate and moved to his new home in the City of Philadelphia where merited. His government was characterized by that well tempered prudence which always distinguisher his conduct He held office as President of the United States for two terms, and refused a third term.
