> "One is immediately impressed, not so much by the increase in our swine population of practically 5 per cent, but of the very material increase in our cattle stocks, not only as compared with last year, but with a number of years immediately preceding. For instance, the government report shows 22,000,000 milch cows, no greater number of which appears in any report in the past seven years at least, and so far as other cattle are concerned, the 39,450,000 specified as the census for January 1, 1916, are the greatest since 1911.

> "The increase in our bovine stock is not nearly so apparent to the man in the corn belt as it is to the people of the western states, or in other words, those vast regions which were recognized not so many years ago as a purely range territory, but which have developed in a large measue into farming areas. host of people from the corn growing states have gone to the West during the past ten years, have taken up land and gone into stock. usually in a small way. Some have not made good, but in a great majority of cases they have stuck by it and the result is today we have a host of small herds which in the aggregate represent an immense total.

"You have but to visit anyone of the various Middle West markets to see how active continues the demand for breeding heifers; in fact, you may find stock and feeding stock languishing, but there will be a brisk demand for the she stuff. Ask where these cattle are going and the reply is 'Montana' or some other Western state. And with the development of cattle industry along these lines in the West, there leave at Palace Barber Shop. has followed as a natural se quence the upbuilding of swine herds. Hogs are nolonger a side issue, but a distinctive industry, and so while part of our 5 per cent increase in swine population is attributable to the eradication of disease and the generally more healthy condition of the stocks as a whole, it is also because of the develop-

ment of hog raising over vast sections of the west that ten years ago hardly knew what a hog looked like.

'Nor is this movement confined to the West. Texas is developing along the same line. The small man is becoming more and more a factor. The old order of things has passed away and a new over taken its place. Our great staple corn was planted over a broader area last year than ever before, permeating sections of the south for instance, that had never known it, and as there are more fields of waving corn, so are there broader expanses of the deep. green altalfa.

"The Missouri River nolonger divides the range from the granger states. There will, of course, always be great tracts in this country which will be nothing more or less than grazing lands, but it is a rare rangeman who does not now have ample winter provision, and cattle that have never seen hay are few in

"The future of our beef supply in this country is absolutely assured. The cry of shortage is without foundation. Record breaking prices for cattle may now be a matter of history. If they are it will be a good thing for the industry.

"With sheep it is a different proposition. The government report shows a slight decrease as compared with last year, but a 5 per cent decrease from five years ago. At the nine principal markets in 1915, receipts fell off 15 per cent. There has been a series of high prices and the natural inquiry is "Why have not these high prices stimulated the breeding of sheep and re-established our herds?" The answer is merely this: That the high price naturally attracts the stock marketward, and with the male lambs go also the ewe lambs and the possibility of rebuilding the herds are in this way restricted."

George Dashington



EORGE WASHINGTON, an American General and the first President of the United States, was born on February 22, 1732, in the state of Virginia. In 1755 he served as a Colonel under the unfortunate General Braddock, who fell a victim to his own haughtiness and imprudence On that occas-

10n Washington gave strong proofs of his great military courage and skill, practically in conducting the retreat of the army. He held the command of the Virginian troops until 1758, when he resigned on account of poor health, and was then elected a member of the Assembly from Fredrick County, and later from Fairfax County. When the breach between the Colonies and Great Britain was widened by mutual animosity beyond any hope of reconciliation, the eyes of his countrymen were fixed upon this commander, Wash ington, and accordingly, in June, 1775, he took supreme command of the entire Continental Army, at Cambridge, Mass. The complete history of George Washington, this great patriot for the next few years, is the history of the Revolution. We are chiefly indepted to him for independence which was finally secured by a treaty of peace signed in the year of 1783. In 1789, he was elected President of the United States; at this time he left his beautiful estate and moved to his new home in the City of Philadelphia where he was received with the applause which he had so well merited. His government was characterized by that well tempered prudence which always distinguished his conduct. He held office as President of the United States for two terms, and refused a third term. In 1798, he accepted the command of the United States Army, which he held till his death, on December 14, 1799. He was buried at Mount Vernon. Behind the White House, at Washington, rises the Washington Monument, a great rectangular obelisk of marble which demonstrates the entire city and is visible for many miles. It perpetuates the memory of the Father of his Country. Its construction was aided by individual citizens during the period of its erection, from 1848 to 1884. It is 555 feet in height resting on a base only 55 feet square.

Winter Freezing of Oats.

Concerning the winter freezing of oats, Mr. G M. Garren, Agronomist of the Extension Department of the A. & M. College, makes the following recommendations:

The winter killing of oats frequently brings many surprises as well as dissappointments. They will withstand severe freezes provided the weather has been continuously cold enough to keep them in a dormant condition. 

RHINE VALLEY GOLD.

Plentiful In the Days of Caesar, Who Exacted Heavy Tribute.

In the time of Julius Caesar the prolificacy of the Rhine valley ir gold must have been very great, for there are frequent allusions to gold spoil in his account of the conquest of Germany, and his remittances of gold from this country to Rome were very heavy. The method employed to obtain it was to impose a tribute of gold upon the conquered and enforce it at the point of the sword. This simple but efficacious method continued in vogue for several centuries until the Roman empire began to decay. As this decay proceeded the vigilance of the imperial officers of the revenue became relaxed, and the slavery of the German gold washer came to an end. Between the fifth and tenth cen-

turies it is probable that the Rhine washings, which had grown to be odious from the slavery connected with them, were abandoned. Daubree (1846) says that at one time the magistrates of Strasbourg leased out the privilege of washing the river for gold, and it is probable that similar powers were exercised by other municipalities. By the year 1718 the washings had become so poor that the share of the Strasbourg magistrates was only four or five ounces of gold per annum. In 1846 the entire produce was estimated at thirty-six pounds troy. A writer of a little later period stated

"Many of the gold seekers are women. They seize a wooden bowl charred inside to render the glistening grains more readily visible, kick off their sabots, pull off their stock ings, tuck up their frocks and wade into the Rhine. After securing bowlful of the auriferous sand they select the soft side of some emer gent bowlder for a seat and go to work. The stones and pebbles are raked out of the bowl with the fin gers, then a sort of sifting and gy rating motion is imparted to the bowl, which is held low enough in the water to permit the surface of the sand to be washed off, and so little by little all the sand is washed out of the bowl and the gold remains at the bottom. Each bow. contains a cubic foot of sand and about one-fifth of a cent in gold."-Argonaut.

OUR PUBLIC FORUM

J. S. Cullinan ON CITIZENSHIP.



The Texas Economic League invites the people of Texas into a discussion of citizenship, but before we can intelligently study so important a subject we must first define it. What is citizenship? Who is the best American citizen? Search the statute books for a definition of citizenship and unless one is a member of the legal profession we immediately become entangled in a labyrinth of confusing and oftimes contradictory laws seeking to promote or restrain most every form of human activity, much of them good, some of them bad and others indifferent. But laws come and go; the Constitution is permanent. The preamble of our Federal Constitution

states that our government is organized to give its citizens liberty and happiness. Read the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution of the United States and one cannot escape the conclusion that the best American citizen is he who is most free, patriotic, just, happy and active and who hands down to posterity a civilization more capable than he found it. The spirit of our country is freedom and no man can become a true American citizen unless he is free,

Turning a moment from documents of State perhaps the best authority on citizenship, and one universally accepted by the public, is Webster's International Dictionary, which defines a citizen as 'A member of a State; a person, native or naturalized, of either sex who owes allegiance to government and is entitled to reciprocal protection from it." Further, 'A citizen as such is entitled to the protection of life, liberty and property at home and abroad.

We now have before us the authoritative definition of citizenship by both government and society and in order that the most humble citizen may feel perfectly free to enter into a study and discussion of this subject, I will briefly outline my conception of what citizenship involves, for the work of the Texas Economic League will be in vain if the most lowly citizen does not feel free to give serious thought and expression to his obligation to government and

his responsibility to his fellow men.

Appiled to able-bodied adult males, with which I take it we will have chiefly to do, a citizen's duty, in return for the rights, privilege and protection outlined above, would seem to be: First, to expend sufficient labor in production, or auxiliary occupations, viz., manufacture, transportation and distribution, to support himself and his family in comfort. Second, conform to all laws framed in the interest of society under the Constitution. Third, contribute his just proportion to the maintenance of government in personal time, payment of taxes or, if need be, bearing arms in the defense of the

In reaching the above conclusions I have assumed that under our system of government citizens are owners in common and are entitled to the rights and benefits of government during the term of their natural lives and


