BINDER-TWINE FIBERS.

Leaves of the Henequen Plant of Yucatan Furnish Principal Supply.

More than 80 per cent of the 400,000,000 pounds of binder twine of the world is made of henequen. This fiber, common ly miscalled sisal, is obtained from the leaves of the henequen plant (Agave fourcroydes). It is cultivated in Yucatan. and to a less extent in the states of Campeche, Chiapas, and Sinaloa in Mexico, and in Cuba. More than nine-tenths of the henequen fiber is produced in Yucatan, where the porous limestone soil and the hot dry climate-rarely falling below 65 degrees and never below 48 F.-are especial ly favorable for the growth of the plant. More than 1,000,000 acres are devoted to the indust ry there and more than half a million acres are in actual bear ing. The plants are perennial, and the first crop of leaves is not cut until five to seven years after they are set out.

The fiber is cleaned by large machines into which the freshly cut grav, glaucous leaves, 3 to 5 feet long and 4 to 5 inches wide, are fed sidewise at the rate of 5,000 to 10.000 an hour. The fiber is dried in the sun and pack ed in bales of 170 kilos (375 pounds) for shipment.

About 99 per cent of the total production of the henequen of Yucatan is imported into the United States, and most of it is made in binder twine, in more than a dozen large twine mills, besides the eight binder twine plants in State penitentiaries. Some of the twine and also some of the raw fiber is re exported to other countries, but most of it is used on the farms of the United States.

Other fibers used for binder twine are abaca (Manila hemp), sisal, Manila maguey, and phormium (New Zealand hemp) None of the soft fibers like hemp, jute and flax can be used success fully.

There are three kinds of beggars in China-the local beggars, who live in the town they prey on; the traveling beggars, who journey from village to village; religious beggars, who, according to their religion, have to become traveling beggars for a certain number of years in order to attain the right humility. 1 can think of nothing that would gain a person humility quicker than begging in China and sleeping on mats by the side of the road. hot lead on their heads. The number of beggars in a small town is surprising. In one small town that I lived in for awhile there vere 800 local beggars. These with the hundreds that flocked in for few days or a week at a time kept

one to throw pennies to. A person cannot become a beggar in China by simply putting on old clothes and going out with his palm turned up. He has to serve an apprenticeship just as he would in any other trade. The beggars have unions. Incredible as it may seem, in every town or village is a beggar guild, all banded together for the common purpose of making people pay. This is the way they go about it:

Each town has its head of the guild, or beggar chief, called the kah doen. His word is law. 


