Under the Federal Reserve Bank Act, each of the twelve federal re serve banks will receive advances from the Federal Reserve Board, in the form of Federal Reserve notes, a distinctly new sort of paper money. Commercial paper will be the collateral advanced by the various banks as security for these notes.


