The accident is a staged simulation used to sharpen the skills of firemen and hazardous materials response teams from Snyder and the surrounding area. #### Rain pours past 27-inch mark for year

It's doubtful Snyder's rainfall this year will set any kind of record, but it's certainly in stark contrast to 1989.

Gauges at the water treatment plant recorded 1.42 inches of rain during a 24-hour period ending at 7 a.m. today, giving the city 27.39 inches for the year.

Snyder received only 11.57 inches for all of 1989 - the driest year since 1954 and the fifth driest in 78 years, according to records.

An average yearly rainfall locally is 20.69 inches over the past 78 years.

While Snyder's 27.39 total to date may be one of the wettest, it is still far behind the the record 44.02 inches dumped on the area

Area rainfall reports received this morning included 1.4 inches at Lloyd Mountain and 1.1 inches at the Wheat Community, three miles northeast of Hermleigh. Fluvanna received 1.6 inches while Ira picked up 1.2. The area north of Snyder reported 1.4 and the area east of the city received from 1 to 1.3.

AUSTIN (AP) - The State legislative inquiry. "I think prevalence of fraud in the insurance industry," they said.

'What is particularly troubling about the grand jury report and the district attorney's comments is that they make very serious charges about the operation of this agency without documentation or substantiation," the board members said.

The insurance board also complained about a new report from jury reported. the state auditor, which the board members said would question an early warning system for troubled insurance companies.

The board said it already had decided that the system wasn't progressing as planned and hired an independent consultant to "give us guidance on this massive undertaking."


The grand jury's report was issued last week following a sixmonth investigation.

It estimated that insurance company insolvencies and fraud could cost the state treasury more than \$400 million.

"We hereby warn the Legislature and the citizens of our state that the insurance industry is plagued by egregious conduct amounting to a breach of trust with policyholders and by bold embezzlement," the grand

The grand jury, which was funded by the Legislature and worked with a special unit of the Travis County district attorney's office, returned 27 indictments against 21 individuals in a term that ended Friday.

Most notable was an indictment against former Dallas insurance executive Robert Walker, who was charged with looting National County Mutual Fire Insurance Co. of millions of

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### Youngster's slaying jolts community

KINGSTON, Mass. (AP) -The search for 13-year-old Melissa Benoit ended in a way that has traumatized this picture-book community: The girl's body was found in the basement of her neighbor, a father of two who had helped look for her.

"I'd rather know that it was just some sicko that grabbed her struggle to comprehend a crime off the street than someone she trusted," said Michelle Ponte, who lives in nearby Plymouth. "I have a 10-year-old daughter who absolutely freaked out when she heard this.


Stephens and Haywood each were credited with 91/2 tackles and Stephens added an interception that halted a Steer drive in the Snyder end of the field.



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

### Gorbachev adviser heads to Iraq on special' mission

By The Associated Press

A close adviser to Mikhail S. Gorbachev headed for Iraq today on a special Middle East mission, leaving just hours after Secretary of State James A. Baker III said there was growing world support for a military strike against Iraq.

**President Francois Mitterrand** also flew to the region today to meet the leader of Saudi Arabia and inspect French troops.

Mitterrand will visit the French frigate Dupleix on Thursday, then travel to Saudi Arabia for talks with King Fahd and to inspect French forces at the Red Sea port of Yanbu.

Meanwhile, Iraq freed nine Frenchmen taken hostage in the standoff caused by Iraq's invasion of Kuwait on Aug. 2. Several thousand Westerners are being held hostage in Iraq and Kuwait, some as shields against a possible attack.

Mitterrand offered in a speech last week to link an Iraqi pullout from Kuwait to a broader Middle East settlement. In a speech Sunday, Iraqi President Saddam Hussein suggested France as a possible negotiating partner. The Soviet news agency Tass

announced the departure of Yevgeny Primakov, former head of the leading Soviet think tank on Middle East issues.

It said he would visit Baghdad en route to Amman, Jordan, where he would meet with King Hussein and PLO chairman Yasser Arafat.

Tass said Primakov was "on a special mission" on behalf of the Soviet president but did not elaborate. It also did not say with whom Primakov would meet in Baghdad.

The Soviets have joined the United States in demanding that Saddam pull his troops out of Kuwait, although they have urged that no military action be taken against Iraq without U.N. authorization. On Tuesday, the Soviet

military chief of staff reiterated that position during a trip to New York. Gen. Mikhail Moisevev said current sanctions are working and that Saddam is "in economic and political isolation and he can't survive very long that way.'

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm a 40-yeare recently a having a fibroid tumor of the uterus the size of a grapefruit. While my doctor recommended hysterectomy, I opted for the hormone Lupron Depot to reduce the tumor's size with eventual removal through the vagina. My Lupron injections will continue for several months prior to surgical removal. I've also considered a myomectomy, instead of hysterectomy, in the hope I can continue a normal sex life, yet have read there is a 10 to 30 percent chance fibroids will recur. What are the pros and cons of this

DEAR READER: Fibroids are benign growths arising from the muscular wall of the uterus. When small, they rarely cause symptoms other than increased menstrual flow. As fibroids enlarge, however, they can lead to menstrual hemorrhage (and anemia), excessive menstrual cramps, lower abdominal discomfort and painful intercourse. Fibroids, even big ones, may spontaneously degenerate (shrink and disappear). Therefore, treatment is reserved for women with large, symptom-producing fibroids that do not regress with

Lupron (leuprolide) injections reduce the level of estrogen in the body: this treatment usually shrinks fibroids, which appear to be stimulated by estrogen. As you say, Lupron may make removal of fibroids easier because they are smaller. Under these circumstances, many gynecologists would opt simply to remove the fibroids (myomectomy) through the vagina, rather than subjecting the woman to the more complicated and dangerous hysterectomy.

Also, hysterectomy is permanent; although it effectively reduces any possibility of future fibroids, it makes pregnancy impossible. Thus, women who wish more children invariably choose the limited, non-hysterectomy

Approach.

Hysterectomy does not, in the vast majority of women, reduce sex drive or sexual pleasure. However, like any surgery, it is best avoided if at all

Fibroids tend to recur. If you eventually decide on myomectomy, you may experience future growth of new fibroids that would possibly require further Lupron treatment or limited

In my opinion, your best bet is hold your course. I believe you've made a wise decision to use medicine and reject hysterectomy. If, at a later date, your fibroids return, you can always re-think the issue and change your mind.

But as for computers, the de Camps get by without them. They write on matching Smith Corona electric typewriters, and de Camp keeps a file of thousands of index cards referring to magazine articles he has read.

The de Camps don't spend much time in front of the television. However, Mrs. de Camp admits a fondness for another fantasy - the prime time soap opera "Dallas."

"I don't think anyone really knows what happened," Odyssey Harbor Director Amine Varga told the Fort Worth Stara baby girl. Before checking out of Telegram. "The boys had been playing soccer and the ball accidentally bounced up and hit him. He was angry and he stomped off into the woods.

Paint chips and other evidence found at the scene indicate that Jackson was hit by a large vehicle, probably a pickup truck or van, said Keene Police Chief Reagan Scherencel.

Odyssey Harbor, which treats emotionally abused children, has 105 clients on three campuses.

Ms. Varga said Jackson, who was mentally retarded, had been a resident at Odyssey Harbor since his parents' custody was terminated three years ago. He was originally from Dallas County, she said.

"Usually he would stomp around in the woods and come back. He was not a delinquent," Ms. Varga said. "He was very happy. This was the first home he had that had some permanence

Jackson's body was discovered by a Keene police officer passing by. The teenager had probably been dead for several hours, the

"We haven't got a final report from the Medical Examiner's Office yet, so we don't know for sure. But, the medical examiner's investigator said he felt like it must have happened sometime between 10 and 11 p.m.," Scherencel said.

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


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
