

Old Time City Landmark

Workmen found the box when tearing out the front of the building, now occupied by Bynum's Hardware and Furniture Store on the Square here in September, 1956. Not realizing its worth, the box's contents were emptied and thrown aside but recovered just in the nick of time, Norman said, in a report before a historical data collecting session of the Haskell County Historical Survey Committee

All the "Haskellana" originally secured in the cornerstone in 1907, save one item, were returned to the box. This was a copy of the old Haskell Herald, early-day newspaper here. To the box were added a copy of the Haskell Free Press and remodeling plans for the building after a fire had occasioned its partial dismantling and rebuilding. Norman is thought to be the only person who has detailed information of what still lies within the confines of the cornerstone.

Three letters, all of priceless historical significance to this county, are in the cornerstone box, Norman said.






