Recent ordinances passed by City Council effective July nd, approved June 20th, have: en posted and their effect on properly guarded public iforced, keep the danger from es and stench to the minimum. sections read as tollows:

"Section 1. That it shall be kind. unlawful for any person or "Section 2. Provided that of any kind.

"Section 3. Provided the sweepings or deposits of such trash etc. will be permitted to be arried into any Street or Alley, the same is contained in a net






