

New Sanitary Ordinances

City Council Has Passed Ordinances Guarding Public Health.—Will be Enforced.

Recent ordinances passed by the City Council effective July 1st, approved June 20th, have been posted and their effect on the properly guarded public health is expected to be very beneficial. They will, if strictly enforced, keep the danger from flies and stench to the minimum. Ordinance No. 15 is "An ordinance to prohibit the sweepings and deposits of trash etc., to the streets, alleys etc., of the City of Floydada, Texas." It carries a penalty of a fine of not less than \$1 nor more than \$20, and "each days violation thereof shall constitute a separate offense." The first three sections read as follows:

"Section 1. That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons, firm or corporation, to sweep, throw, deposit or cause to be swept, thrown, or deposited, on or into any Street, Alley, Sidewalk, Road, Gutter, Bar Pit, Sewer, Public Grounds, within the City of Floydada, any sweepings of trash, paper, waste paper, boxes, cans, straw, shavings, plunder, or rubbish and of any kind.

"Section 2. It shall also be held that the aforesaid prohibition of sweepings and deposits of trash etc. shall apply where such trash etc. is swept, thrown, or deposited, on the part of lot or lots outside the building or buildings, or vacant lot or lots, whether or not such lot or lots, other premises, is in the ownership or control of any person or persons, firm or corporation, who may make any sweepings or deposits of trash etc. in case wherein such sweepings or deposits of trash on or into any lot or part of space outside of building or buildings as named, shall afterwards be carried by the elements of the weather, or otherwise, on or into any Street, Alley, Etc. as named in the first Section of this Ordinance.

"Section 3. Provided the sweepings or deposits of such trash etc. will be permitted to be carried into any Street or Alley, if the same is contained in a net

wire basket, and immediately burned, and such trash and etc. not be permitted to escape and scatter over the Streets, Alleys, Etc."

Ordinance No. 16 follows closely the same idea and is intended to "prohibit the deposit of any decaying, or refuse, animal vegetable or mineral matter of whatsoever kind, within certain districts of Floydada, Texas." It carries the same penalty as its preceding ordinance. The first four sections read as follows:

"Section 1. That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons, firm or corporation, within the business districts of the said City of Floydada, to deposit on the outside of their business establishment, on any lot or lots, or on any Sidewalk, Street, Alley, Public Grounds, or in any Sewer, any decaying or refuse, animal vegetable or mineral matter, of whatsoever kind.

"Section 2. Provided that any business establishment may be allowed to place such decaying or refuse matter, in a box or other like receptacle, on the outside at the rear of their such place of business for the purpose of transportation of same, and said box or other receptacle, with its contents, shall be removed within four hours after same has been so placed on the outside, to without the City Limits, at the expense of the person, or persons, firm or corporation, owning or controlling the business of any such business establishment. And the placing of such box or other receptacle on the outside at intervals, shall not be construed to authorize the maintenance of box etc., on the outside so as to provide a receptacle for any decaying or refuse matter, being deposited in same from time to time.

"Section 3. The provisions of this Ordinance shall not apply to the refuse, consisting of rinds etc., from watermelons or other melons or fruits, when made by the purchaser and consumer from the dealer or person selling, and when said melons etc., are eaten and consumed within the business districts herein defined. But when the said City of Floydada shall provide suitable receptacles to receive such rinds etc., of melons etc. as consumed aforesaid, and such receptacles placed at convenient places, and at intervals along the Streets and Sidewalks of the business districts of the City as may be necessary, then this Ordinance shall be made to apply to all persons who violate the same by making deposit of any rind or other refuse from watermelons or other melons, or fruits, on or in the places as are herein prohibited.

"Section 4. The business districts of the City as herein defined, shall be made to include all the territory as is contained within the Fire Limits of said City of Floydada Texas, and further shall apply to any business establishment anywhere within the City Limits of said City of Floydada. And further the City Council by order may make the provisions of this Ordinance apply to other portions of the City, or entire City Corporation territory."

The City Officers should have the most hearty support of the citizenship in the enforcement of these ordinances as they will prove a means of preserving the healthfulness of the town. Especially since the heavy rains

Radford Again Calls Attention to Our Large Farms.

(C. S. News Service)
The average farm in Floyd County contains 501.8 acres and each farm the average number of acres of improved land is 118.2. The Farmers Union is strongly advocating the reduction of the size of the farms of this state and its President, Hon. Peter Radford, has previously, through the press, called attention to the number of large farms in Floyd County. Federal Census Records show that we have 565 farms that contain more than 100 acres. Mr. Radford claims that if cheap money were available more tenant farmers would become home owners and the owners of these large tracts could be induced to place their property on the market in small tracts.

We had 620 farms in 1910 in this country and 232 of them were operated by tenants.

New Divorce Law Pretty Rigorous.

Heretofore Texas has been granting divorces on most any pretext. The divorce laws have not been amended in years until the recent session of the Legislature tackled the subject. Hereafter divorces will not be so easily obtained, nor will the path of the divorcee be so smooth as heretofore.

Following is a part of the new law that goes into effect July 1:

Article 4681. No suit for divorce from the bonds of matrimony shall be maintained in the courts of this State unless the petitioner for such divorce shall at the time of exhibiting his or her petition, be an actual bona fide inhabitant of the State of Texas; for a period of twelve months and shall have resided in the county where the suit is filed for six months next preceding the filing of the suit; provided that such suit shall not be heard or divorce granted before the expiration of thirty days after the same is filed; and provided further, that neither party to a divorce suit, wherein a divorce is granted upon the ground of cruel treatment shall marry any other person for a period of twelve months next after such divorce is granted.

Texas Leads All Other States in Beef Cattle Production.

For a generation or more Texas has lead every state in the Union in the production of beef cattle. At the opening of 1913 there were over five million head of beef cattle in Texas. Iowa came second with two million six hundred thousand head of beef cattle. This shows how completely Texas out-distances the other states in cattle raising.

A marked feature of the cattle industry of the Lone Star State is the steady improvement in the quality of its herds. For the past ten to fifteen years ranchmen all the way from the Panhandle to the Lower Gulf Coast Country have purchased thousands of pure-bred bulls in the North and as a result of this farsighted policy the beef cattle that Texas is today sending to northern markets are showing up better than ever before in the history of the state.

From 400,000 to 600,000 Texas cattle find their way each year to northern markets. In fact, if it were not for Texas the consumers in the United States would be lamentably short of beef steaks and roasts.

For the purpose of encouraging the ranchmen of Texas to continue to improve the quality of their cattle, the St. Louis Live Stock exchange has offered special prizes for Texas cattle at the Feeder Cattle Contest to be held at the St. Louis National Stock Yards, September 1 to 26, inclusive. It will be possible for any Texas ranchman to win as high as \$200.00, including sweepstakes, on a single load of Texas steers. Secretary H. F. Parry of the St. Louis Live Stock Exchange, says that he looks for an exceptionally strong exhibit of Texas steers at the coming Feeder Contest.

Some Snake Story.

That even chewing gum may have its uses is proved by the story of the Arkansas milk maid. This young woman started out to the pasture and stumbled over a clump of bushes, fell, her face striking a short distance from a rattlesnake, which had its mouth wide open ready to strike. Her fall caused a large wad of chewing gum to fly straight into the snake's mouth, which the reptile at once closed, thus giving the young lady a moment's time to spring to her feet. She then killed the snake. The girl sold the sixteen rattlers on the snake for \$1.25, and the snake skin for \$4.30. The rest of the story goes that with a girl friend the young lady immediately invested in \$5.55 worth of chewing gum.—Cleburne Enterprise.

Texas Representative Has Best Of Scrap.

Washington, June 25.—Representative Dies of Texas had a row with a street car conductor last night. The conductor came out of the fracas with a black eye, the car came out with a smash, and Mr. Dies came out unscathed, but with temper ruffled. The railway officials said today they were investigating, and were inclined to support the conductor.

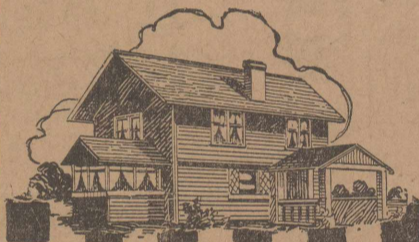

The report states that the cases examined failed to show the improvements that was promised and that the results failed to justify the confidence that had

New Mexico Coal Output \$5,000,000.

New Mexico is now accounted one of the important coal-producing States of the West, much of her output being distinctively high grade. In the Raton field, which furnished about 75 per cent of the production in 1912, the coal is a true coking coal and most of the operations are conducted on an extensive scale. In 1912 there were 11 mines that produced each over 100,000 tons, and two of these produced over 400,000 tons. Nearly 840,000 tons of coal was made into coke.

In point of area the San Juan River field, in the northwestern part of the State, is the most important. It has in New Mexico an area of about 13,000 square miles and contains both subbituminous and bituminous coal. In McKinley County in the San Juan River field three mines produced over 100,000 tons each, and one of them over 200,000 tons.

The Los Cerrillos field and the White Oaks field are relatively small in area but contain true bituminous coal. In the former some of the coal has been locally altered into anthracite, of which 32,411 tons was mined in 1912.

The output of coal in New Mexico in 1912 was the largest ever made, the production increasing from 3,148,158 short tons in 1911, valued at \$4,525,925 to 3,536,824 tons in 1912, valued at \$5,037,051, a gain of 12.3 per cent in quantity and of 11.3 per cent in value.

The first record of coal production in New Mexico was published in 1882, when the production amounted to 157,092 tons, about 4 per cent of the annual output at the present time.

'Round The World On A Bicycle.

Mr. H. A. Tippler was through Crosbyton this week riding a bicycle, and claims he is on a journey around the world, having started from Australia four and a half years ago, has traveled in many countrys, and his machine shows the effect of long usage as it was almost dilapidated, but he says he intends to put it through. He is headed for San Francisco. He makes his expenses in various ways, being a mechanic, does repair work wherever he finds it, and does some remarkable feats on a very small bicycle which he carries with him. The small wheel is about 10 inches high. —Crosbyton Review.

Federals are Eating Snakes.

Nogales, Ariz., June 24—Federal soldiers above Guaymas are reduced to eating snakes, so completely has the food supply been cut off by the Sonora insurgent State troops, say advices reaching here today. Smallpox epidemics in the Constitutionalist camps partially equalize the situation.

Despite the demoralization caused by famine and disease on either side, fighting was reported to have continued late today. The insurgents attacked Ojeda's column from the front and rear. Many were reported killed, while the wounded lie unattended on the field.

State officials insist that the Federals steadily are losing ground in the continued battle, while their ranks are being depleted by desertion.

Maverick Branding in Days Past.

Perhaps there are but few citizens of this country who have never heard the expression, "Branding a Maverick" and doubtless all can tell what it means, but few of them know how the expression originated.

Late in the year 1845 Samuel A. Maverick was temporarily residing at Decrow's Point on Matagorda Bay.

He was a lawyer with a strong propensity to speculation in land.

During the period, a neighbor, becoming indebted to him in the sum of \$1,200 paid the debt in cattle, transferring 400 head at \$3 per head.

There were no market for cattle in those days, the hides only being marketable. He did not want the cattle, but it was a case of cattle or nothing, so he took them and left them in charge of a colored family while he returned to San Antonio. In 1853 the cattle were removed from the coast up to Conquita, 50 miles below San Antonio. Here, as, before, under a distinguished management of the colored family. The cattle were left to graze, fatten and wander away. Mr. Maverick was absorbed in his real estate business in San Antonio, about one-third of the calves were branded, so in 1856 the entire plant or brand was estimated at only 400 head.

To the ingenious mind that explanation is clear, that the branding of "Mavericks" was "square." The neighbors shrewdly surmised that all unbranded calves and yearlings were Mavericks and the lawful property of the first man who could get his brand upon them, this being at that time the only evidence of ownership. About the year 1856 he sold the entire brand still only 400 head, to A. Toutant Beauregard, a brother of the distinguished Confederate general, at \$6 per head. With the exception of this experience Mr. Maverick never owned any cattle, except probably a few milch cows, to supply his domestic wants.

"Maverick" has become an

American, word and as such has been a subject of misapprehension.

And so it was, by reason of the fact that the range was open, all unbranded cattle came to be known as "Mavericks," and the property of any able to brand them.—Abilene Reporter.

Grabs For Alcohol, Drinks Carbolic Acid.

Saturday, the 14th of this month, a prominent citizen of Midland county tried to swipe a drink of Alcohol and got a drink of carbolic acid instead. The citizen, Geo. P. Arthur by name, walked into a doctor's office in Midland and told the doctor he was sick and wanted a drink of alcohol. The doctor told him he had only a small amount and could not spare it. Then while the doctor was called into the outer office, the man saw a bottle in the shelf that had some liquid in it that looked like alcohol and tipped it up and down it went. He straightway called the doctor to relieve him, but died in a few minutes in great agony. Mr. Arthur leaves a wife and six children.—Lynn Co. New.

Officers Get Drop on Beer Wagons

Tulsa, Okla., June 25.—Twelve United States enforcement officers, led by H. A. Larsen of Denver, ambushed a caravan of wagons laden with liquor southwest of Tulsa, early Tuesday, capturing eleven men and seven loads of alleged beer.

Although most of the men were heavily armed, no resistance was offered, the officers gaining the drop. Five six-shooters and one repeating Winchester rifle were taken from the prisoners.

One of the men arrested is Walter Fawcett, now under a five-year sentence for alleged murder.

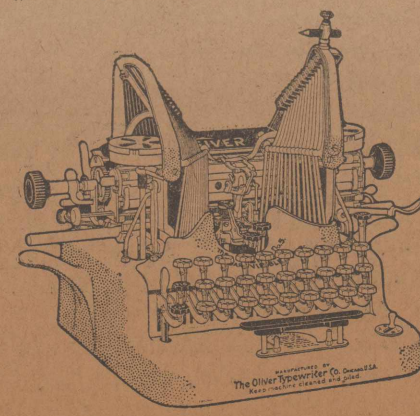

If these things are true in these instances, then some of the nerviest people in the world come from Cheek, in Jefferson county.

The quiet, peaceful ones come from Placid, McCulloch county; the jolly, jovial, funny fellows from Jovial, in Clay county and those religiously inclined would be found to have once lived in Blessing, Paradise, Angels Eden, Glory, Grace, Bishop, Elysian Fields or Sublime. The financiers, no doubt, came from Dime Box, Cash, Silver City,

Gold Coast, Commerce, Bonus, Mellin, Divide, Profit, Richland, Security or Golden, while the noisy persons came from Call, Echo, Auto, Baby Head, Bluff or Bragg.

Some of the happiest persons in the State were no doubt born at Happy, Joy, Sweet Home, Gay, Bliss Blythe, Holiday, or Lark, and it is reasonable to suppose that those matrimonially inclined came from Ringgold, True, Comfort, Bliss, Bells, or Reno.

Possibly some one has been wondering where all the successful men came from, but the problem is easily solved when it is remembered in Texas are the towns of Worthy, Industry, Energy, Grit, Ginger, Thrift, Merit and Rising Star. Undoubtedly these are the places where the successful men originated.

Perhaps, too, the clothiers come from Coats in Taylor county; the Irish from Erin in Jasper County; the Chinese from Orient in Tom Green county; the beginners from Novice, in Coleman county; the babies from Nursery, in Victoria county; the haughty from Pride, in Dawson county; the hunters from Nimrod in Eastland county; the carpenters from Tool, in Henderson county; and the intoxicated from Rye in Liberty county. It is not known if the lid is on Rye, but if so there is Sherry in Red River county, which has a little flavor and one can go to Dripping Springs in Hays county. From these he might drop to Soda in Polk county for a sweet bottle of red pop.

At the first blush it would seem that most successful base ball players would come from Slide in Lubbock county and that the best salesman would have his home in Sample in Gonzales county. Some of the proud folks possibly came from Peacock in Stonewall county, and a good many of the fast base runners from Run in

Rural School Building Contract Let.

Saturday the Board of trustees of Sandhill district let the contract for a \$5,000 building in Floydada to be erected at Sandhill, and the Irick trustees let the contract for a \$2,000 building at Lockney to be built on their site in Irick community.

For the first above, which is to be of brick construction, W. R. Simmons, a contractor of Plainview, secured the work against five competitive bids and H. E. Cannaday, of this city, secured the latter building against four competing bidders. The price on the Irick building leaves about \$500 of their bond issue which can be used for equipment.

The Sandhill building is contracted to be finished not later than October first. It will contain two class rooms on the ground floor and an auditorium in the second story which can later be equipped for recitation rooms. Trustees Smith and Grigsby were in Saturday and completed the details of the contract with Mr. Simmons.

The Irick building is to contain an auditorium, and a class room, and the contract calls for completion by September first. T. F. Beall and G. I. Sutton, trustees, were in Floyd Monday completing details of the transaction.

Both buildings will be constructed entirely along modern lines, not showy but plain and handsome and will be in point of heating, lighting and ventilation the two best school buildings in the county not excepting the recently constructed buildings at Floydada and Lockney.

They will reflect credit alike on the county and on the high class of citizenship which make up the two communities.
