





(By S. A. Lindsey, Chairman, Texas Farm Life Commission.)

Edinburgh, Scotland, July 26th. - "Better farming, better business and better living" is the slogan of the organized Irish farmers, and with this slogan the organized Irish farmersare regaining the position Irish farm products once held in the markets of England and Scotland. There is nothing in all Europe which so aptly illustrates the inadequacy of old methods of agriculture as the story of the loss of the market's of England and Scotland by the unorganized Irish farmers to the organized Danish farmers. The lesson to be gained from the exerience of the Irish farmers is the most valuable of any on this side of the Atlantic for our own farmers of Texas to profit by. When the organized German

farmers enforced their demands upon the government and tariff duties were levied on meats, flour cheese, butter, spirits, etc., the German markets were closed to the Danes. Up to this time I eland had supplied the marke's of England and Scotland with limilar farm products. Now, the markets of Germany, being cosed to the Davish farmers, they were forced to seek the markets of England and Scotland, so the Danish farmers organized egg and poultry producing scrieties, butter and cheese co-operative factories. co-operative bacon factories, and set for themselves a nigh standard in every line. And it followed that when the Danish products began to reach the maikets of England and Scotland, Ireland lost these markets rapidly, and as a result, Irish agriculture became stagnant, the people discouraged and the country fell into utter poverty.


