The Southwestern Telegraph and Telephone Co., who took over the local telephone system from the Northwestern some eight months ago and immediately began a complete rebuilding of the system have finished their work in the city now, the only thing lacking being the completion of the toll lines to Plainview which were announced as in readiness some months ago. This latter will not be done at present owing to failure to date of securing right-of-way from the Santa Fe. This is said to be only a matter of detail and the crew will come back and finish the toll line when the right-of-way is secured. Poles for the two copper circuits have already been laid.

Local Manager Horace T. Owens last week moved the offices from the south side of the square to the Barrow Building, second floor where a suite of three rooms accommodate the force. He announces that with the additional switchboard equipment some 35 new telephones have been installed, and unsolicited applications are coming in every day. The new board will accommodate four hundred drops.

About the tenth of next month they will issue a new directory which will include all the new names added up to the time the copy is turned over to the printer for publication. Patrons should be sure that their names and numbers are turned in correctly to the manager, Mr. Owen, who has most of the matter for the new directory complete. The Hesperian will put out the directories.

Land Belonging to Choctaws Will be Sold.

Ma'lester, Okla., Aug. 26.—A great "land rush" in which 450,000 acres of land belonging to the Choctaw Indians will be placed on the market, will center about this city early next year. The appraisers of the land are at work and will probably complete their task by Dec. 1.

The territory to be opened to buyers is not frontier land but virgin soil in civilized communities, and comprises the segregated coal lands of the choctaws, the surface of which is to be sold the tribe retaining the coal.

Feterita Looks Good to Him.

S. C. Sluder, southwest of town two miles and a half, has five acres of feterita, which he says, looks mighty good. It is practically made and has produced a heavy yield.

Feterita is similar to maize except that it has a larger head, the juice of the stalk is sweeter but not in as large quantities, and the seeds sometimes make two and three stalks each.

Mr. Sluder has this under trial from the Department of Agriculture and says he is going to plant more of it next year. He says it will produce under the most adverse conditions.

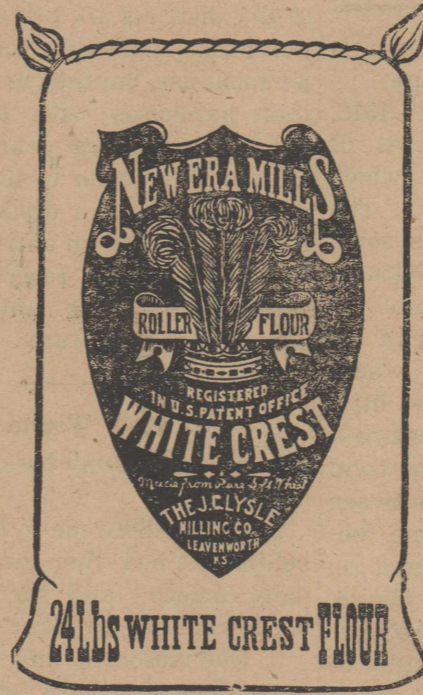
Touring South Plains by Auto.

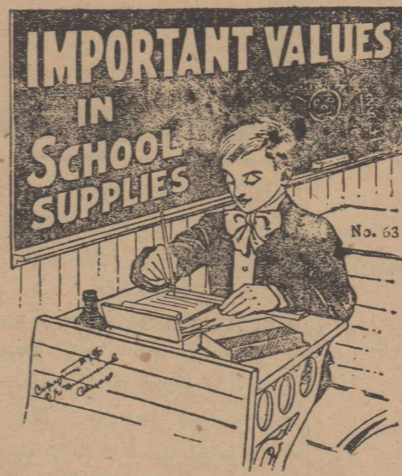

Irish markets by foreigners in the supply of such things as butter, eggs and bacon, which this country is physically better suited to produce than many of the countries which were competing so successfully with us.

THREE MAIN ASPECTS OF AGRICULTURE.

"It is unnecessary even to sketch here the general policy which was adopted by rural reformers in Ireland, and subsequently by leaders of agricultural opinion in England and Scotland for raising the farming industry of these islands to the level of efficiency attained by our European competitors. As you know, we Irish expressed that policy in two main propositions. The first was that agriculture must be treated in its three main aspects: As an Industry, as a business, and as a life. The business must be made commercially efficient and the life must be made progressive, intellectually and socially, so as to retain at least an average of the

rural folk upon the farm lands. Our second proposition was that in order to carry out the program you have got to begin with the part I have placed second, namely, the business of farming. This is necessary for the double reason that until farmers have proper control of the marketing of their produce and of the financing of their industry, they are not in a position to derive full benefit from the splendid educational facilities and useful information afforded by your agricultural departments, universities, colleges and other agencies. To use the words of the Irish farmer, the problem is to be solved by 'Better farming, better business better living,' and you must begin with better business."

World's Navies To Visit San Diego.

San Diego, Cal., Aug. 27. San Diego, the first American port of call on the Pacific coast north of the Panama canal, doubtless will have the honor and the glory of entertaining the navies of the world, soon after the canal is officially open. Whether this will be during the year 1915, when San Diego's great exposition is in operation, or before that time, is not yet determined, and will depend altogether upon the time of the official opening of the canal.

The San Diego Exposition management is responsible for the movement which has now resulted in definite announcement that the representatives of the navies of all the governments of the world that maintain navies will be invited to come to San Diego on board a warship, and take part in the greatest naval pageant the world has ever seen.

San Diego has a harbor of sufficient proportions to contain such an immense fleet as this event will cause to assemble here, and all conditions surrounding it are favorable for such maneuvers and practice operations as may be fitting such an occasion. It is to this harbor that the war vessels of the Pacific squadron come for target practice with their big guns, and here the torpedo fleet of the Pacific, the submarine fighting vessels, and the army and navy airship corps, have their practice the year around.

No estimate can yet be made of the number of war vessels that will gather here on this occasion, but already San Diego and the San Diego Exposition officials are preparing to entertain the officers and men of the world's navies in a fitting manner, and to make of their coming here a great world event; the greatest of its kind ever known.
