The rotice also says that no pupils under seven who will not be seven years oid by January first, 1914 , The reasons for these rule laid down by the board are ob vious. Pupils entering schoo after the first two weeks are not in position to take up the wo:k of any of the classes where they stand, thus forcing the foran injustice to all pupils by forc ing teachers to divide tume betwzen two many classes. This is true in the primary grades. Colquitt is speeding to Colorado where he will attend a conference of the rovernors at Colorado Springs next week, and after the con-
ference he will spend a brief vacation visiting various points in Colorado.
Before leaving, Gov. Colquitt disposed of four very important matters which had been pending in the executive department.

grain drill at the low rate of 15 pounds per acre，resulting in an extra good stand．This wheat received no rain and very little snow for several months，between September and April，The total rainfall on this crop between sowing and harvesting time be ing 4 inches， 2 inches coming on
April 17，and 2 inches on May 9 the yield was 341 －12 bushels per acre by actual weight，testing 60 pounds to the bushel．
The real value of summer tili－ ing is shown when we state tha 139 acres of the same class of land sown to the same class of seed and grown by the side of
the summer tilled wheat，on land that was well prepared but crop ped every year，gave a yield of
$145-7$ bushels per acre，having $145-7$ busheis per acre，having
a test of 59 pounds per busnel． This difference of $191 / 2$ bushel more than twice the yield of the yeariy crop，is certainly worth

The report of the commission shows that we now have 425,000 acres of land under irrigation in Texas today, and of this area 275,000 acres are in rice and 150,000 in general crops and the land is the nost valuable in the state. The report further states that
