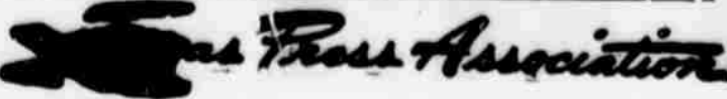

The Road Ahead

The eyes of Texans are on the road ahead. Millions of Texans are pausing this month to take a long, reflective look at their highways—and at their Highway Department. "The Road Ahead" is the theme of Texas' version of the second annual National Highway Week, May 20-26.

In Texas supporters of good roads have joined hands under the banner of the Texas Good Roads Association to throw the spotlight on Highway Week. Their theme, "The Road Ahead," places more emphasis on tomorrow than today.

Distilled to its essence, the "road ahead" idea expresses concern about the future of Texas in highway transportation. While Texas has a high-quality highway system today, will it have one twenty—or even ten—years from now?

Taking into account the rise in Texas population (there are now more than 9½ million Texans); the even more startling rise in motor vehicles (Texas now has in excess of five million, is adding them at the rate of a million every three years); and the miles traveled by these vehicles (which stands at a staggering 43 billion miles annually now, and will be at least 64 billion miles by 1970), the problem seems clear: will our fast-generating traffic overwhelm our highways?

These figures may add up to the most terrific traffic jam in history unless Texas is able to keep pace by continually modernizing and improving its highway system to meet changing traffic needs.

If that traffic jam occurs, it will be at an enormous economic cost—and at the cost of many human lives lost on the highways.

That is the sobering message of the "road ahead," as Texans view National Highway Week not as a mere observance, but as a window to tomorrow.

People, Places & Things

A real catastrophe today is for an air conditioning unit to go haywire, either at home or business.

When we recall that only a few years back, several large ceiling fans were able to provide "air conditioning" for the average large business establishment, we are amazed that people survived those "good old days."

Those ceiling fans didn't do a cooling job, they merely circulated the air inside the store and that was sufficient. A shade and a breeze was all the comfort anyone expected.

Smaller stores where ceiling fans were not in use, achieved a degree of coolness by leaving all doors and windows open. This had drawbacks, of course, and necessitated liberal use of an item now seldom seen—fly paper.

In those days, people stayed outdoors more in the summer. You need not be a real old-timer to remember theatres moved outside and became "air dromes" with an open air ceiling.

In 1915-16 the late Richard Nolen, Haskell's movie house czar, had his main theatre in the now vacant two-story building in the middle of the east side business block.

In addition, he had two air dromes operated in the summer months. One was located just across the alley north of Gene Hunter's building, and the other was located on the south side of the square at the site now occupied by the Personality Shoppe.

As we remember them, the two open-air showplaces were well patronized night after night.

There were interruptions, of course, from the weather. Especially in early spring, when lightning and thunder would cancel out the second or third reel of Pearl White's thrilling escape from whatever she was escaping from at that particular time.

A redeeming feature of these interruptions was the fact that if you failed to see as much as two reels of a three-reel program, you were given a pass-out check good for admittance the next night.

Haskell's first open air theatre was probably operated by H. H. Franklin in the summer of 1910, and was set up about where the post office is now located.

Another summer entertainment feature was the Summer Chautauqua programs that were scheduled in practically every town of any size in the country.

The programs were high class, and included top-ranking speakers and lecturers along with some of the nation's best known musicians and artists.

For years, the late R. V. Robertson owned the quarter block where the M System Store now stands, and he turned

ed down numerous offers for leasing the tract in order to make it available for use by the Chautauqua Program each year.

Another popular site for tent shows and carnivals was the block where Medford Motor Company is now located. This was a favorite site for the late Harley Sadler when he brought his tent theater to Haskell each season. Until the middle 20's, this block was vacant with the exception of one or two residences, and provided ample room for large shows and carnivals.

This site was the place where Haskell's last big Union Revival Meeting was held in the summer of 1913 or 1914. As best we recall the revival continued for two or three weeks and resulted in several hundred conversions.

Back in the 20's, this was the beginning of a busy season for thrasher crews as they prepared to start harvesting the wheat and oat crop in the area.

In the days of the steam thrasher, harvesting season was one of the busiest periods in the life of a farmer. Unlike today's self-propelled combine, which cuts and threshes the grain in one operation, this same operation 40 years ago involved much more.

First, the grain was cut and stacked in binds, with one crew doing this job.

Then, with the thrasher set up wagons hauled the binds to the thrasher, with the harvested grain being hauled from the separator to storage or market.

While one or two men can operate today's efficient combines, the crew of an old-time steam thrasher sometimes numbered 25 to 30 men. It had its own "cook shack" on wheels, and a full time cook. Starting with the first harvest here, the machines and crews would move north as the harvest progressed, ending up in Oklahoma or Kansas.

When members of the Fire Department decorated the business section with flags and pennants this week, they were continuing a practice started more than 30 years ago, when the Haskell County Fair was in its heyday.

It has proved a profitable venture for the department, which now has several thousand dollars invested in decorative material, and also has met with favorable reception from business men.

When the idea for an annual County Fair was first launched in the 20's, merchants were encouraged to have decorated floats in the Fair parade, and also to decorate their store fronts during Fair Week.

There was no one locally prepared to furnish decorative materials, so the field was wide open for outside promoters.

For a fee, these boys could turn out decorative jobs on automobiles and trucks that were dazzling and spectacular. But they also were expensive for small town merchants.

The same applied to store front decorations. The promoters had worlds of material, and they based their charges

on footage of the store front. Their charges ranged from \$7.50 to \$25, depending on the size of the store front. Merchants were willing to cooperate to a reasonable extent, but felt these charges were a little steep. Too, all the money was going out of town.

After a year or two, the matter was mentioned to the Fire Department, with the suggestion that they buy decorative material and do this work each year, insofar as store front and street decorations were concerned.

Like all other community organizations in those days, the fire department was always "broke". With no source of income except contributions from property owners where firemen had been able to keep down threatened fire loss, their money was always quickly expended for small items of needed equipment.

Firemen were quick to realize the money-making possibilities in taking over the decorating of store fronts and streets. But first there would be a sizeable investment required — and the department was broke. Then, there was the possibility that one or two bad crop years would wind up the County Fair.

After considerable study, the department voted by a narrow margin to borrow the money needed and purchase the needed decorations.

Luckily for them, several good Fair years came in succession, and the department was soon in the clear and for the first time in its history was accumulating a substantial treasury balance.

As the years passed, profits from the decorating venture made it possible for the department to add a number of items of equipment without cost to the city. Also, when a new truck was purchased several years ago, the department was able to pay \$1,000 of its cost from their own funds.

And, one of the best features of the whole deal is that businessmen pay less for decorations today than they were charged as a "minimum" back in the 20's!

Brownies, Girl Scouts Enjoy Overnight Camp

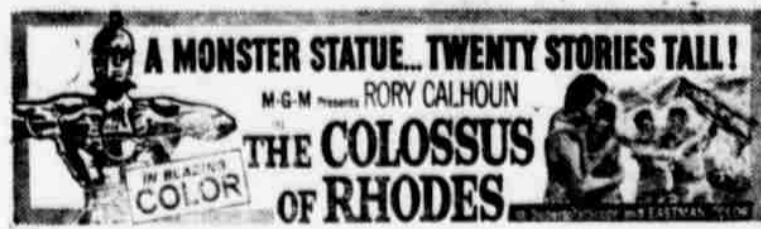
