from what is known as the Summers Half and Half. cotton and beats all records for a turn-ou that have ever been made in this Section, by a long shot. Mr Standlee states that he paid $\$ 16$ a bushel for the seed and his
neighbors gave him the "horseneighbors gave him the horsethe laugh on them. He will gain enough over the old cotton out of this bale to pay for a bushel of seed and has 561 lbs of seed which he will probably sell for two or three times as much as the lint brought him. Progress is the watchword and Mr. Standlee hit it right this time. The growing pig requires proin and not much corn. It is 11 right to give a little corn, but oo much is harmful.
In purchasing a boar it is well to bear in mind that one with heavy bones is more to be de sired than one of slight build.
To make fall pigs do well, they must be provided with warm sleeping quarters at night, and filled with sunshine during the day.

Don't select a heavy, lazy saw for a breeder. She should be mild in disposition, possessed of suffic
cise.
The pure bred hog will mature and come into money more more money for the same weight at that.
Never feed more than hogs will eat up freely. Many farmers do not practice this, but keep a quantity of uneaten food lying about the lot at all times.
Steaming food for hogs is an easy matter. All that is required is a large box connected with a small boiler by a one-inch pipe. The pipe should connect the box at the bottom.
If you are in doubt, kill the bigger hog, for it makes better meat, and the ham of a light hog is hardiy worth curing, if you far too rapidly.

FALL PLOWING Its Values in Storing Water fro Winter and Spring Rains as Shown by Col. Exall. Shown Col. Exall. It is a well known fact that even in the more humid climates not is seldom raised that has growth suffered for the want of water. This need of moisture is especially felt over the larger portion of Texas and the western country. Yet eyen in the driest sections of our country the annual rainfall is generally ample
to make at least one crop a year The great trouble is not that there has not been sufficient rain, but that a large portion of
that rain came at a time when the crop did not need it, and in stead of being held in the so until it was needed, the greater portion ran off or evaporated.
Twenty inches of rain, the aver Twenty inches of rain, the average for even the driest sections, if it were all saved and supplied to the crop as needed, would
supply enough water to make supply enough water to make one hundred and twenty-six
bushels of corn. Of course, it will seldom be possitle to save will seldom be possible to save
