Had to catch fire with flint and steel and when we went visiting or to church for several years we either went horse back or in an ox wagon. As the country began to settle up we would now and then have a Preacher drop in and hold services at some private house as there was no school or church houses in that day, and my father's house was always a welcome home for the Methodist Circuit Rider.
