## The farmer who will go

The farmer who will go
hrough his field and select th best heads before the crop is arvested has an opportunity see the type of stalk which pro-
duces the seed. A big head duces the seed. A big head as good for seed as a uniform size head which grew on a good stalk, which was surrounde $\ddagger$ by ther good stalks.
Again, if the crop from which seed is being selected is somewhat mixed with other sorghum crops, the selected heads should be taken as far away from foreign heads as possible.
Remember that now is th time to start our next year's crop. Let us select the best heads we produced and stor them away in a good dry place, heads can be stored in sacks tied in bundles and can be hung from the rafters until spring Shortly before planting time, these heads can be threshed out by hand. This method of selection will insure us very much better yields than we have bee getting.
