eighteenth of an acre. Mr. Pur gear, when an acre. Mr. Pur stated that they had sold as high s 300 pounds from this patch in one week, and that their tota sales, from the patch already was $\$ 20.50$, while their own con. umption and some given to the neighbors would make the total value of cabbage taken from the patch about $\$ 30$. They still have plenty of cabbage for home use up till Christmas.
The production of cabbage per acre according to these figures would reach the sum of $\$ 540$, or almost as much as the average roduction per capita of the farming class over the United States. With two acres of cabbage one man could produce \$1080. Mr. Puryear stated that they were bothered to some exdo bugs or the production from his patch would have at least been increased by one-fourth possible a third.
This is a mighty good showing and still is not wonderful for the plains. It is merely an incident that happens on every wellregulated farm in Floyd County. Gardens are the most productive of every variety of eatables of any gardens in the world, the use of a common windmill with which the eattle are watered, a bountiful supply for all household uses supplied, and still enough pure fresh water for an acre garden sput that produces with one or two irrlgations enough to feed and
clothe a family of five for year.
