The reason for this he states-they received not the Truth in the love of it. (Il Thessalonians ii. 10. 11.) They preferred their own erroneous theories, the Apostle explains, and therefore God will give them over to a strong delusion," and let them believe the lie which they preferred, and let them suffer for missing the Truth which they did not love. of love for the Truth. It is sad to say that we all as Christians have been laboring under a thorough delusion respecting God's Plan. 


