The weather has been such that the farmers could gather their cotton, it has opened better, the grade has been better and the price has averaged at least three and a half cents better throughout. At this time last year the best grades of cotton sold at about 8 cents. This year the best grades are selling well above 11 cents. The poorer grades last year sold as low as four and five cents. The lowest price for cotton this year has not been below nine eighty as very little poor cotton has been brought to the local market and the buyers have been paying the limit of the market throughout the season. Speakng of the price of cotton on the narket Mr. Trowbridge said nat Floydada buyers had been paying right up to the Galveson market all the time. His words were: "I'm proud of the buyers this fall; we have certainly had a market.

#### **DUTLOOK FOR COTTON GOOD**

Prospects Good for Held Cotton-Active Mill Demand and Probable Needed Supplies Suggest Higher Prices-Long Staple Grades -Need of Factories.

advance and a fair winter and spring clean-up, though few are expecting any such radical advance as predicted by the bull market pools.

A late New York report says although prices may work a little lower temporarily, yet even with a 13,500,000 or 14,000,000 bale crop, present prices are very cheap and quite likely may prove the lowest of the season. .

#### Big Texas Showing.

With 32 per cent of the cotton acreage of the United States and the last federal condition report placing Texas at 5 per cent above the average, the state may well feel proud of the work of the Texas platers, the State Agricultural Department and the Farmers' Union in their efforts for a prime crop.

More interest than ever before is being manifested in the growth of long-staple cotton, and some experiments have been made with imported seed in Harrison County, which produced a staple as long as two-inches and nearly as fine and soft as silk, Domestic long staple has been sold lately as high as 20 to 25 cents.






