



ESTABLISHMENT OF **COTTON MILLS IN TEXAS**

E. O. Dunlap of Waxahachie Has Re-Cently Made an Investigation on the Fabrication of Cotton Into Cloth in Texas.

Waxahachie, Texas: O. E. Dunlap of this city, chairman of the sub-committee on the Fabrication of Cotton into cloth and the establishment of cotton mills, of the Texas Welfare Commission, has completed his investigation and his report on this important industry is very interesting and instructive. The report in part follows:

The value of the average cotton crop of Texas is, approximately, \$225,000, 000. The crop last year was 4,297,000 bales. Of this enormous crop we only consume about 40,000 bales, in value, say, \$2,250,000. This consumption is through fifteen cotton mills in Texas. The location, capital, and capacity of these mills are as follows:

While Texas produces about onefourth of the cotton crop of the United States, an exceedingly small per cent of the Texas crop is consumed in the State. The amount manufactured into cloth within the State averages annually only 40,000 bales. If we estimate the average annual crop of Texas at 3,000,000 bales, we find that we consume only threefourths of one per cent of the crop. Let us compare this consumption with some of the other Southern States. North Carolina produces annually about 700,000 bales of cotton, and practically consumes the whole of the crop. South Carolina's average annual crop is about 1,000,000 bales, of which approximately 65 per cent is consumed. Georgia produces annually about 1,-750,000 bales of cotton, of which about 30 per cent is consumed. Alabama's annual crop is about 1,250,000 bales, of which practically 25 per cent is consumed. This clearly reveals the truth that we are far behind the States mentioned in the manufacture of cotton goods. There are several reasons responsible for this condition. 



The lower court decided in favor of Mr. Walker, and Judge Hodges declared that the entire case depended upon the definition of bran. If grain is bran, Judge Hodges maintained that creasing the cost of production, there the insurance company has insured it from loss by fire and it was decided that bran is grain.
