A New York Market For Bond Of Texas Cities. ments of the savings banks of th State of New York forbids inves ment in bonds of a city in State which since January - 1 , 1861. has repudiated any of its debts or defaulted in the inter est thereon. In the administrtion of this law the administration of this law up to Sentember of this year the bonds of Texas cities have been excluded as ine
ligible, the New York ligible, the New York officials
assuming that Texas has since the outbreak of the Civil War repudiated some portion of he
State debt. In order to disprove this assumption a history of the State debt since 1860 was need ed. A New York bond house which was seeking a market for the bonds recently issued by the cily of Dallas turned to the Uni
versity of Texas for the needed history, after efforts to secure it elsewhere had failed. Dr. E. T Miller of the University was able to furnish an account of the financial history of Texas and the results of his study wer such as to show that the only repudiation by Texas was of debt authorixed during the period of secession and which was made compulsory by the amendment to the Constitution of the United State adopted in 1868. Upon the Basis of the account submitted by Dr. Miiler, Attorney Gener-
al Cormody of New York al Cormody of New York render ed an opinion on September 14 that Texas was not guilty of any repudiation within the meaning
