

An electric restaurant, which does away with the services of waiters, has been installed in Paris. It is fitted with tables T. M. for one, two, three, four and larger numbers of guests. Beneath the dining room is the kitchen and dishes prepared below are sent straight up to the Laundry rep tables through the floor.

A guest gives his order through clean tubs. an electrophone carries the voice to the kitchen below without any special effort of the diner to speak into it. The dish ordered General La comes up through a moderatesized hole in the table. When the diner wishes to get rid of dishes or glasses he merely says so and they disappear silently through the hole by which they came. When the table is a large one the dish can be made to circulate and stop before any diner who wishes it.

THE REFINING INFLUENCE OF LITERATURE.

All nations that have made great advancement in civilization had great literature. The greatest peoples of past ages all boasted of the superiority of their literature. From all the accumulated literature of past ages the remarkable advancement of our own age has sprung.

Literature has refining influences. The first literature of any nation is poetry. The earliest poetry sought to impress its readers with high and noble deeds both in war and in peace It always pointed out the noblest qualities of man and established high ideals. This early poetry appealed strongly to the love of the beautiful and grand in nature. That of the northern nations, such as the Danes, Saxons, Norsemen, and others, was filled with love of nature, especially of the sea. But it was all in the language of the strongest possible emotion.

All the early poetry of England was sung and told of the deeds of great heroes, such as Beowulph, King Arthur, and numerous others. The bards of Europe sang poems in behalf of knights and ladies who befriended them. A bard was permitted to remain in any castle as long as he desired to, and in return would sing poems for its owners. He always pointed out the noblest qualities of these heroes, stimulating men to choose as their ideals these heroes. There is a story that, according to an oracle, the Spartans once sent to Athens for a eader. The Athenians, in jealous irony, sent a deformed poet, yrtaeus. But he proved to be just what was necessary, for is wise advice and stirring war songs incited the Spartans to

All the sweeter and purer thoughts of a poet come out in his writings and we are prompted to imitate his characters. In Homer's Iliad and Odyssey are such characters as Achilles, Hector, Ajax, Ulysses, and numerous others. I think it would be safe to say that there are none of these famous characters who have not been imitated to some extent. The historians say of Homer poetry: "It abounds in sublime descriptions, delicate pathos, pure domestic sentiment, and noble conceptions of character." An old Greek epigram says:

'Seven rival towns contend for Homer dead. Thru which the living Homer begged his bread." All the famous characters in Greek and Roman mythology have also been held up as ideals by many.

By means of literature we are taught all the quieter, greater virtues; such as love, pity, sympathy, reverence, unselfishness, and truthfulness. All great men, and also women, have at least some of these virtues and in comparing their characters with our own, our deficiencies become apparent immediately. Then we begin trying to emulate their deeds.

Again, it teaches the omnipotence, omniscience, and omnipresence of God, his goodness, mercy, etc., and both in the Bible and in other literature we are told exactly what our relations to God are. Milton's great epic, Paradise Lost, shows how God treats men and tries to show the justice and wisdom of his judgments. In contrast to this is Byron's best drama, Manfred and Cain. His object seems to be to justify the acts of men toward God.

Literature of any kind that shows the feeling of God and of men holds up ideals, which if followed, will refine any person in the world. The very fact that it holds up ideals to the vision of men, constitutes one of the most refining parts of any literature. By the contrast of the good and bad characters in literature we see how a man with bad character is looked upon by refined people. This is often enough to cause a change for

In modern times prose has taken the lead and is much more widely read. The chief prose writings are: History. Fiction, and Oratory. These contribute to our uplift.

History, recording past events, shows what can be achieved in every line of human effort. All the greatest deeds of peace and of war of the ancient heroes and heroines are faithfully told and held up as ideals. As a result of all this history of ancient glory, the present age, the most remarkable of all, has

Biography, which is life history, stirs us to emulate and imitate. Julius Caesar was greatly influenced in his military tactics by the life of Alexander the Great. By the reading of that great general's conquests Caesar was prompted to attempt the emulation of them. Frederick the Great was the model for Napoleon. Napoleon's military career was suggested to him by reading of Frederick's great deeds. The civilization of the great Chinese nation has for centuries been shaped by the writings of Confucius. The Orient has been influenced by Mohammed's writings for nearly fifteen centuries. But the writing which has influenced more people than all others is the biography of Jesus Christ.

Oratory exalts men and measures and stirs our feelings of patriotism and duty. Cicero's orations hold up the highest ideals in patriotism, duty, and honor. All the Crusades were made because the oratory of hermits and other churchmen roused them to fury against the Saracens. Burke's speech on "Conciliation with the Colonies" almost altogether exhorts the Parliament to do its duty, and give the colonies justice. Patriotism was also one of its strong characteristics. In fact nearly all oratodical writings place strong emphasis on patriotism, justice, and duty. If we would only try to imitate men who have these virtues we would improve our characters.

Fiction, as a rule, tells about some hero and stirs our admiration and emulation. Almost every novel printed contrasts the good and evil in the characters of both men and women. By means of these novels we see just how people of evil character are looked upon by the refined and cultured.
