The small grain crop of the State is now being harvested. If the land is allowed to lie idle it will very soon be covered with weeds that will go to seed, and greatly increase this nuisance
next year. If it has no crop on it with roots to protect and hold the soil together, and the season is excessively wet, it will waste from washing and thus lose a large amount of its soluble plant food. If the ground i dry and hard, the rain that should sink in would run off and leave the ground in bad condstion for fall plowing.
