A jury composed of Arthur L. Shelley, Mike Campbell, O. J. Helweg, Harold Hodges, Eugene Tonn, and Hubert Bledsoe, after a 115 hour deliberation, recommended the fine, which was assessed by Presiding Judge Joe Williams in Haskell County Court.

County Judge Jim Alvis had disqualified himself in both this and an earlier trial of Mrs Scott because he had filed the complaint and was one of the witnesses in the case. The earlier trial in December resultd in a "hung" jury

Agreement on Williams to preside as judge was decided by counsel on both sides, thereby preluding an appointment of a judge by the Governor.

Shortly before noon last Thursday, the jury, after brief deliberation, reported to Acting Judge Williams with the recommendation that the defendant be placed on probation for a period of two years. The Judge's ruling was that the court could not accept such a verdict, and he sent the jury back to further ponder sentence. The \$150 fine assessment followed an hour and a half later

Maximum penalty for aggravated assault is a \$1,000 fine or two years' imprison.

Thus ended the second trial which began late Wednesday afternoon following a full day's examination of prospective jurors during which a jury panel was exhausted and Sheriff Garth Garrett had to go to the sidewalks to pick up talesmen here last weekend, to secure a jury.

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


