Sewer Bonds Carry By Large Majority

ONLY THREE VOTES POLLED AGAINST BONDS FOR CON-STRUCTION OF SEW-ERAGE SYSTEM

In the election Tuesday for the purpose of voting bonds to build a sewer system and bonds to take care of the warrants that have been issued by the city, the vote was practically unanimous for the proposition, only three being cast against each of the proposals on the ticket.

The vote for the sewer bonds led with a vote of 205 for and three a-

The citizens of the town did not take much interest in the election, as there was no outspoken opposition, and everyone expected the bonds to go over by a heavy majority, therefore only half of the voting strength of the town went to the polls and cast their vote.

The voting of the bonds to build a sewer system means that the town now has every modern convenience that can be ofered by any town on the Plains. We have a water works system sufficient to take care of a town several times the size of Lockney, and the city council has made the water rates so low that the consumers in this city can afford to buy their water. Water rates, both industrial and domestic are cheaper here than in any town on the Plains, and possibly cheaper than any town in the state, the rate being \$1.00 per three thousand gallons, and 10c per thousand gallons thereafter, and the industrial rate being 8c per thousand gallons. We also have good electric light and power service, with all streets well lighted. The gas line is practically complete, and gas will be available to residents of the town by the time it is needed for winter use.

Work on the sewer system will begin at once so that it will be ready for use by the time the winter months

Lockney can now offer the people who desire to locate here all the conveniences needed. We have a first class high school, with a teaching force of twenty-four teachers, twentytwo and one-half units of affiliation with the state board of education. Lockney has two extra fine church buildings, the Baptist and Methodist and the Church of Christ is now making plans and preparations to build a \$30,000 church building. 

Good Crops West Of Boll Weevil Line

CROP PROSPECTS IN CENTRAL WEST AND WEST TEXAS GOOD AT THIS TIME

The editor, and his family, returned Tuesday aftternoon from Dublin, Texas, where they attended a family reunion of the Adams family, and the writer took special note of the crops along the road from here to that section of the country, and we do not believe that we have ever seen better prospects for crops than we saw on this trip. Every section of the country along this road had fine crop prospects and everything planted seemed to be doing well. We left Lockney Saturday morning, going west to Plainview and from Plainview to Sweetwater and from there to Dublin, and on the return we came through Ranger, returning home by way of Breckenridge, Stamford, Spur and Floydada. On both routes after we got west of the boll weevil line. which runs across the state near Albany and Abilene, the crops were excellent. The cotton crop below the line were just as pretty as those west, but we were informed that there would not be very much cotton raised in that section, as the weevils had punctured nearly every square and boll on the stalks. The boll weevil is said to be worse this year than for several years down in the state, and in some sections have practically destroyed the crop while in other sections they have done very little

There is a very fair acreage planted below the cap rock to feed crops, and they have practically matured and a good crop has been made. Above the cap rock the acreage to both cotton and feed stuffs is good, and the crops are in the pink of condition. The cotton is full of blooms and squares, and the feed is either in the head, or beginning to head. Most all sections above the cap rock have had sufficient rain to put the crops in good shape, and with an average fall good crops of both cotton and feed will be the result.

Not only have both dairying and poultry raising had a big expansion since the war because of increased production to meet increased demand from consumers, but producers have been able to put this form of farming on a better basis from the start and increase income from unit of stock than is the case with other crops. The cow testing associations have provided an avenue for weeding out losers and breeding up production from the highest producers. In poultry the trap nest does the same thing so that intelligent management can work toward a continual increase per unit. Also, the testing association shows the way to better feeding, higher quality product and cost cutting by the introduction of the silo and ensilage cutter, individual drinking cups, feed and litter carriers, swinging stanchions, cement floors and managers, milking machines, efficient cream seperators, feed grinders, pumps and water systems.
