Personally, we believe this singling out of the beef industry for an apparent whipping boy is intolerable, unjustified and in no way helping the general public of our nation.

Why has one single individual been selected as a scapegoat in this instance? We wonder if it is because historically the cowman has been such an independent individual and this is one man's idea of "bringing him down to size."

Looking back at history, it has proven time and again, the only "control" that works in a free economy is the law of supply and demand. When this supply and demand is put out of kilter chaos is always the final outcome.

Well, it has been only a short time ago and today just try and find a fryer or baking hen in the local supermarket.

If the government persists in holding out for the September 12 lifting of the beef price ceiling we feel the harvest will indeed be an unwelcome one.

NEEDLESS SITUATION

Nation's Meat Shortage Begins To Be Felt Here

Although there are probably around 250,000 head of cattle on feed in the feedlots within a 50-mile radius of Stratford and more roaming the pastures in the area, housewives in Stratford have begun asking about the impending meat shortage.

A check with local grocers and meat outlets in Stratford this week revealed there is no real shortage this week, not yet at least.

Raymond Albert, market manager for Foodway in Stratford, told The Star that "I am really aware of the meat shortage although we haven't been really hit just yet!"

Albert added that there is no such thing as a fryer or hen that he can lay his hands on, and this week he has plenty of beef to sell to his customers, but "I sure don't know what will happen next week!"

Billie Melton, wife of Tip Top Grocery and B&B Food Market owner Kenneth Melton, told The Star "we have just begun to feel the effects of the meat shortage in our two stores. We cannot get several cuts of meat like T-bones, club steaks and items like that, but we've been lucky enough to get everything else so far."

Mrs. Betty Brown, of the Brown Meat Locker, told The

Star on Monday they are really aware of the shortage.

"We've been out of meat to sell this past week, but are just covered up with custom slaughtering," Mrs. Brown pointed out. "We have had so many customers come in that we've had to turn folks away," she stated.

Mrs. Brown said only this past week their plant killed 88 head of cattle but still don't have any meat to sell to the general public.

In talking with area feedlot operators this week, The Star learned the situation varies with the feedlot involved.

One operator told The Star his

own cattle were being sold right along as they came ready, while many of his customers had informed him to hold their cattle until later.

The operator was quick to point out there is a limit to just how long the fat cattle can be successfully held after they top out in weight. Another operator told us that they were selling their finished cattle right along. He also said that he felt there will be a real shortage of beef cattle when the September 12 date rolls around.

"I have noticed for the past 18 months to two years that we are feeding cattle for shorter and shorter periods of time,

indicating to me that the packers' supply was getting shorter and shorter," he stated. "When this ceiling price is lifted I feel the beef supply will have been cut down to a dangerous stage," he added.

Most of the feedlot operators indicated that they have been selling, or would sell, individual cattle to those who would like to have their own beef custom killed and packaged.

The feedlot operators all agreed this is not a new practice as they have been selling individual fat steers all the time they have been in business.

For the average man on the

stee, the purchase of a fat steer, or heifer, is a substantial investment. A finished animal will weigh in the neighborhood of 1,000 pounds or more and this week would sell for around \$51 to \$53 per hundred weight, this plus the cost of the custom killing, wrapping and packaging.

Several of the feedlot operators we visited with this week were quick to point out that the higher cost of grain sorghum is also going to make its felt on the fat cattle market.

Several of the operators emphasized they were still in the process of feeding "cheaper" milo, grain which they have

had on hand or contracted earlier before the cost began skyrocketing several weeks ago.

"When this higher priced milo begins to hit the feedlots, our cost of gain will take another increase," all of them point out.

What is the real answer to the beef situation? Well, it seems nobody knows why the meat industry has been singled out for this price ceiling. One thing for sure, the Sherman county housewife will know more about the beef shortage come another week or 10 days.

HIGH SCHOOL ENROLLMENT

Students in Stratford High School are asked to pre-enroll for the fall on Friday, August 17, announced Principal Dale Prescott.

Freshmen students should report to the study hall at 10 a.m. followed by Sophomores at 11 a.m.

Juniors are to pre-enroll in the study hall at 1 p.m. followed by Seniors at 2 p.m., all on Friday, August 17.

All new students are urged to visit with Principal Prescott on August 13 or 14 to register and work out their schedules.

Students who will be in the Stratford Middle School (Grades 5-6-7-8) this fall should be enrolled by August 17, announced Junior High Principal Jack Gilley.

All new students are urged to come by at any time between the hours of 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. to register and sign enrollment cards.

FIRST GAME SEPT. 7

Football Practice Begins Monday For 1973 Elks

Stratford's Elks will begin two-a-day practices in preparation for the 1973 Football season next Monday morning at 7:44 a.m., announced Head Coach David Bornstein.

"We are ready for the new season and looking forward to our second year in AA competition," said Bornstein. "Our staff is really excited and with Monday only a few days away we hope the Elks will be ready to go," Bornstein added.

The Elks are picked by the experts this year to finish next to last in the always tough District 1AA competition. The Dalhart Wolves are picked as the favorites to win the District 1AA crown this year with the Phillips Blackhawks in second followed by Panhandle, Spearman, Stratford and Boys Ranch.

Spearman and Panhandle split District 1AA honors last year with Panhandle bowing out to Childress in Bi-District action.

The Elks return seven lettermen from last year's squad which ended the season with a 4-5-1 record including a big win over the Dalhart Wolfpack. The Elks open their 1973 campaign at home on September 7 when they entertain the Gruver Greyhounds, a team which they haven't beaten in 10 long years.

Returning blue and white lettermen include Brady Hill, tailback and linebacker; Steve Coats, guard and linebacker; Mark Beaty, quarterback and free safety; Steve Barrett, full back and defensive end; John McDaniel center and defensive tackle; Jack Haille, tackle on both offense and defense; and Van Brandes, split end and defensive halfback.

Those who will be moving up from last year's Junior Varsity include Mike Armstrong, guard; Gary Ferguson, tight end; Ricky Howard, tailback and defensive halfback; Willie Mungia, split end and corner back; Danny Kirkwood, tackle; Darrell Doshier, quarterback and free safety.

Three newcomers who Coach Bornstein says his staff will be expecting a lot of effort from this year include Phillip Walden, guard; Keith Pool, guard; and Steve Williams, slotback and corner back.

"Every position is up for grabs with the best man to get the starting slot," said Coach Bornstein. "The Elks will be working out twice each day Monday through Friday of this next week with an intra-squad controlled scrimmage set for next Saturday morning at 8:30 a.m."

Bornstein says they expect about 54 prospective Elks to show up for their equipment on Monday morning.

The Elk Coaching Staff this year is headed by Bornstein with Bill Briscoe, first assistant, and Varsity head line coach and

7th Grade line coach; Karl French, a newcomer to the staff from Pampa, will be in charge of varsity ends, wingbacks and linebackers and Head 7th Grade Coach; Sam Brite will serve as assistant varsity line coach and Head JV coach; Jody Richardson, assistant backfield and receivers for the varsity and assistant JV coach.

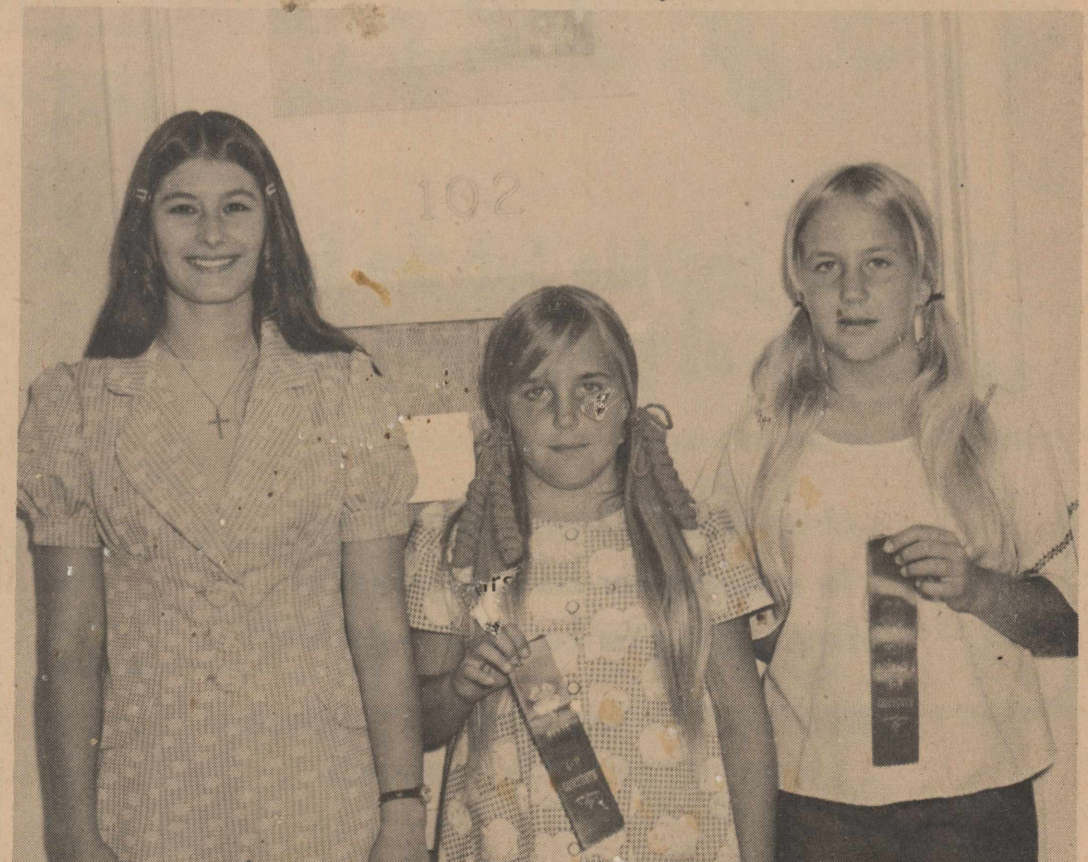
Area Girls Get Ribbons At District

Interment was in San Jon, New Mexico. Mrs. Tippins died Monday night in the Boise City Hospital. She was 88 years old.

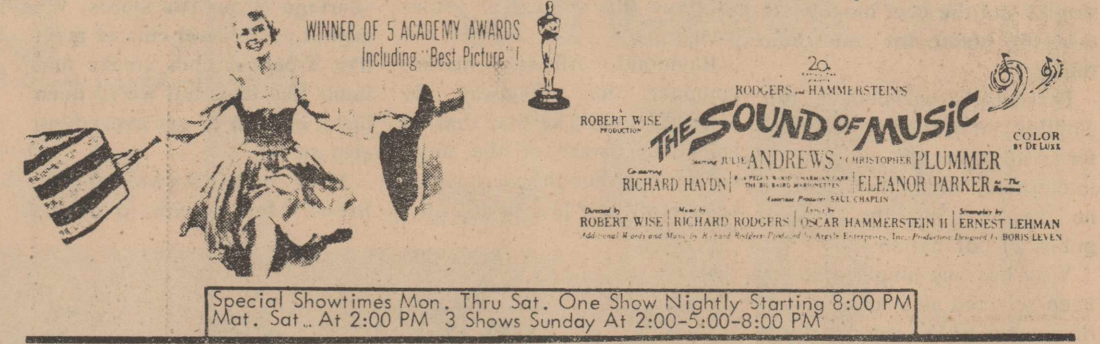

- BRUNSWICK STEW**
- 1 4-5 lb. Baking Hen
 - 2 lbs. Lean Pork Roast
 - 1 qt. cut corn
 - 1 qt. Lima Beans
 - 2 Tomatoes
 - 2 Onions (chopped fine)
 - 1 Tbsp. Sugar
 - 1 pod Red Pepper or Cayenne to taste

Cook of Week

6 or 8 white Potatoes (buttered and creamed)

Salt and pepper to taste
Cook chicken and pork until tender and will leave bones (use pressure cooker). Cut dark meat in cubes and pull white meat in shreds. Return to cooking broth in large stewing pot or Dutch Oven, add vegetables, season to taste, and cook down slowly until a thick mixture. Stir often to prevent scorching. Add creamed potatoes last and bring to bubbling boil. Serve with cornbread, fresh sliced tomatoes and cucumbers. Can be refrigerated and reheated, also freezes well.

NOTE: Fresh summer vegetables are best, but canned may be used. Any desired, added—Okra, Sweet Potatoes, some Celery, Turnips, or even Cabbage. Tabasco, Worcestershire and Tomato Catsup may be used according to taste. Originally, squirrel was used.

PECAN PIE

- 2 Eggs, slightly beaten
- 1 cup Brown Sugar
- 1/8 lb. Butter, melted
- 1/2 tsp. Vanilla
- 1/2 cup Pecans (More if desired)

Mix in order given. Pour into uncooked pie shell. Arrange pecan meats on top of filling. Bake in moderate oven until set, about 45-50 minutes. Serve plain or with Whipped Cream or Ice Cream.

DEEP SEA SALAD MOLD
Dissolve 2 envelopes Plain Gelatin in 1/2 cup cold water in

saucepan. Add 1 cup water; bring to boil. Remove from heat; add 1 pkg. Lime Jello. Fold in 1 cup Sour Cream, 1 cup Mayonnaise till well blended. Add 1/3 cup Lemon Juice and another cup water. Cool in refrigerator till thickened, while preparing: 2 hardcooked Eggs (chilled and diced), 1/2 cup chopped green pepper, 1/4 cup diced red pimento, 1 cup diced celery, minced raw onion to taste, 1 flat can light flaked tuna, 2 cans Medium Shrimp, 1 tsp. prepared mustard. Mix all together and pour into oiled fish or shell-shaped mold. Chill till firm. Unmold and serve garnished with salad greens, stuffed olives, and cherry tomatoes.

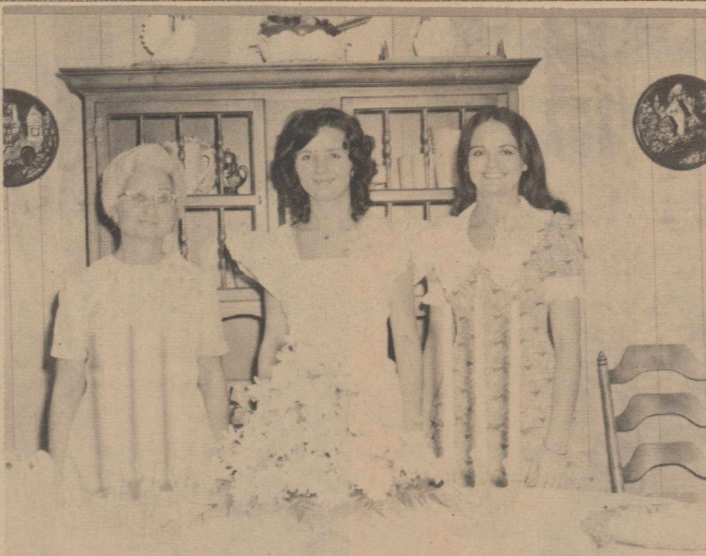
