Throughout the next three weeks area residents will have several opportunities to pitch in and help out their friends, neighbors and all of Stratford.

From April 21st to 25th any citizens with large pieces of debris can set their unwanted items in the alley for free pickup. Anyone needing help moving large pieces of debris should call the SCDC office before 5:00 pm on Friday the 25th. Tires, hazardous waste, shingles, concrete, commercial waste or construction debris cannot be accepted for pickup. Please note: alley runs will be made weather permitting.

As part of the cleanup effort, the City has agreed to charge no fee for trash deposits made in the roll-off containers, with the exception of commercial and construction debris, from April 21<sup>st</sup> through May 12th. Please, no tires, hazardous waste, or concrete in the roll-offs. A fee will still be charged for commercial and construction debris deposits.

If you have an unwanted car or truck, the Stratford Volunteer Fire Department is in need of three vehicles for training purposes. The city is willing to remove any other unwanted

vehicles that cannot be used by the Fire Department.

On November 6, 2007, the City of Childress voted to sell and serve alcohol. On May 10, 2008 your community faces a crucial decision on the issue of alcohol sales. I have been living in Childress for only a year. Within that year, it is evident that Childress is a family-oriented community. We take pride in our community and provide activities that draw others from area towns. The pioneers of Childress and current individuals have worked hard to establish this family friendly environment. I'm sure the same could be said of Stratford, Texas. Many communities do not enjoy the positive environment as we do. While about 43 percent of adult drinkers report heavy drinking on one or more occasions in the past month, 50 percent of 12-14 yearold drinkers, 65 percent of 15-17 year-old drinkers and 72 percent of 18-20 year-old drinkers report heavy drinking in the past month. In short, young people who do consume alcohol are more likely than adults to drink heavily. (Source: Pacific Institute for **Research and Evaluation**)

While some communities may see an increase in tax revenue through the sale of beverage alcohol, the "hidden" costs of alcohol sales (code enforcement, alcohol related accidents, violence. assaults, etc.) are significant.

The environmental and cultural influences upon potential consumers - especially as these impact the lives and views of young people - are substantial. For example, alcohol is cheap and becoming cheaper. The real price of alcohol has been steadily dropping for the last five decades. Cheap beers are now roughly the same price as popular brands of soft drinks.

Stir-fry the asparagus stalks when the steak and potatoes are nearly ready.


