The three days of festivities are expected to draw the largest total of folks yet to the ever-expanding program of events.

The regular favorites include a Beauty Contest, Old-Timers Reunion, Parade, Barbeque, Kid's Races, saddlehorse contests for youngsters, dances for adults, teenagers and square dancers plus a carnival and a host of exhibits and stock competition.

The Fair & Jamboree gets underway Thursday evening when

the new Miss Stratford will be picked to reign over the remainder of the celebration and throughout the coming year.

The winner will be crowned by this year's Miss Stratford, Carolyn Allen, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Allen and currently a student at Texas Tech at Lubbock.

This year a field of 15 young ladies will be trying for the 1971-72 Miss Stratford crown. This event will be held Thursday evening in the high school auditorium beginning at 8 p.m. Tuggie, of Amarillo's KFDA-TV, will serve as emcee for the event.

Thursday afternoon one of the favorite events among the younger set, the annual Dog Show, will be held at the County Barn. Sadler was driving north on Highway 287 traveling behind another cycle on which Miles Smith, son of Mr. and Mrs. B.L. Smith, and Lyndal Lewis, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leland Lewis, were riding. Smith slowed down his motorcycle and apparently Sadler didn't see the cycle slacken its pace and slammed into the rear end of the machine. 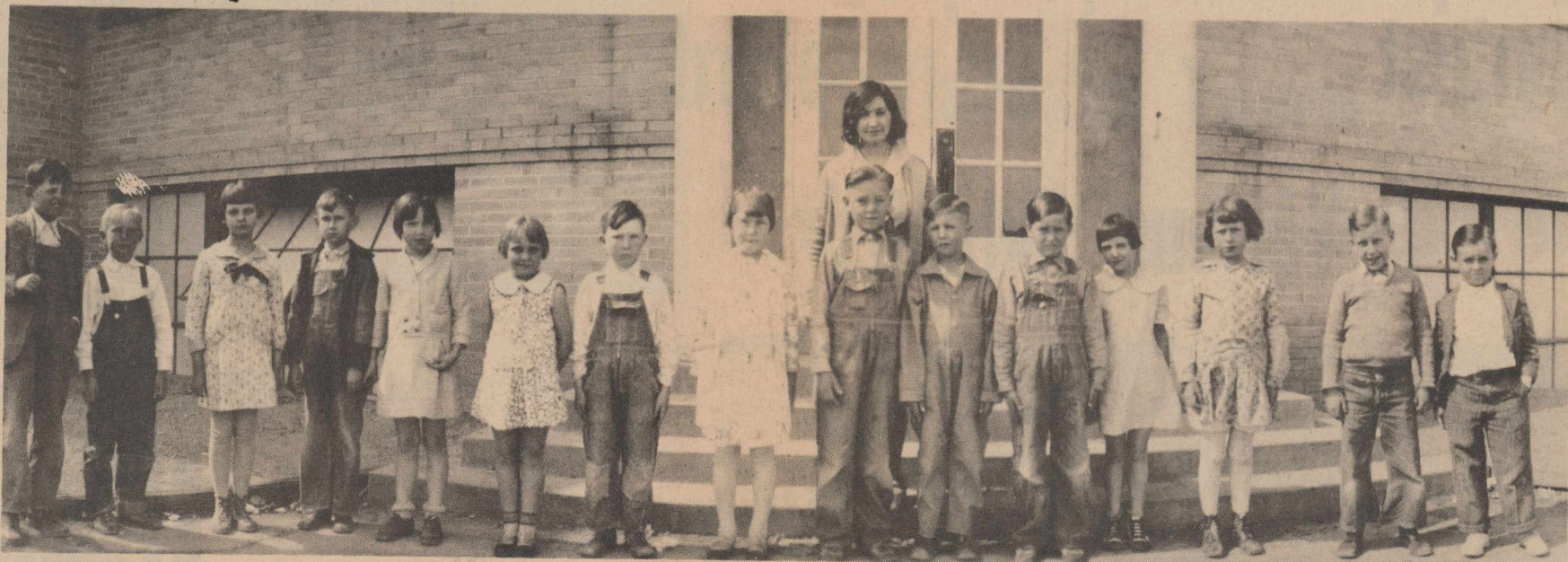

Mike Flores of Stratford on Bingo Coke took Junior Reining honors with Georgina Brown of Dumas winning Senior Reining on Patsy Silver.

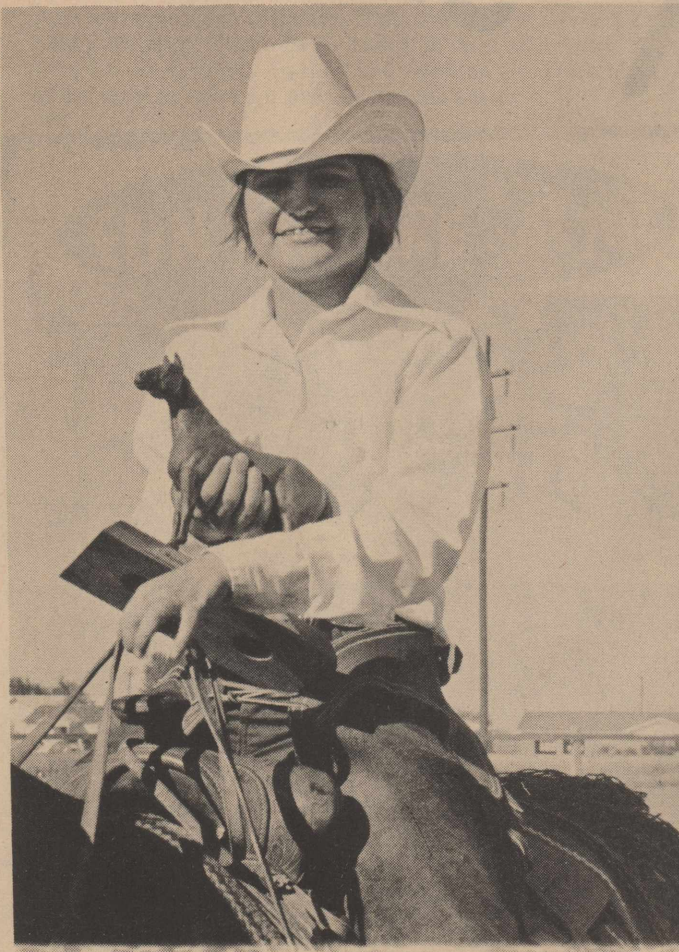

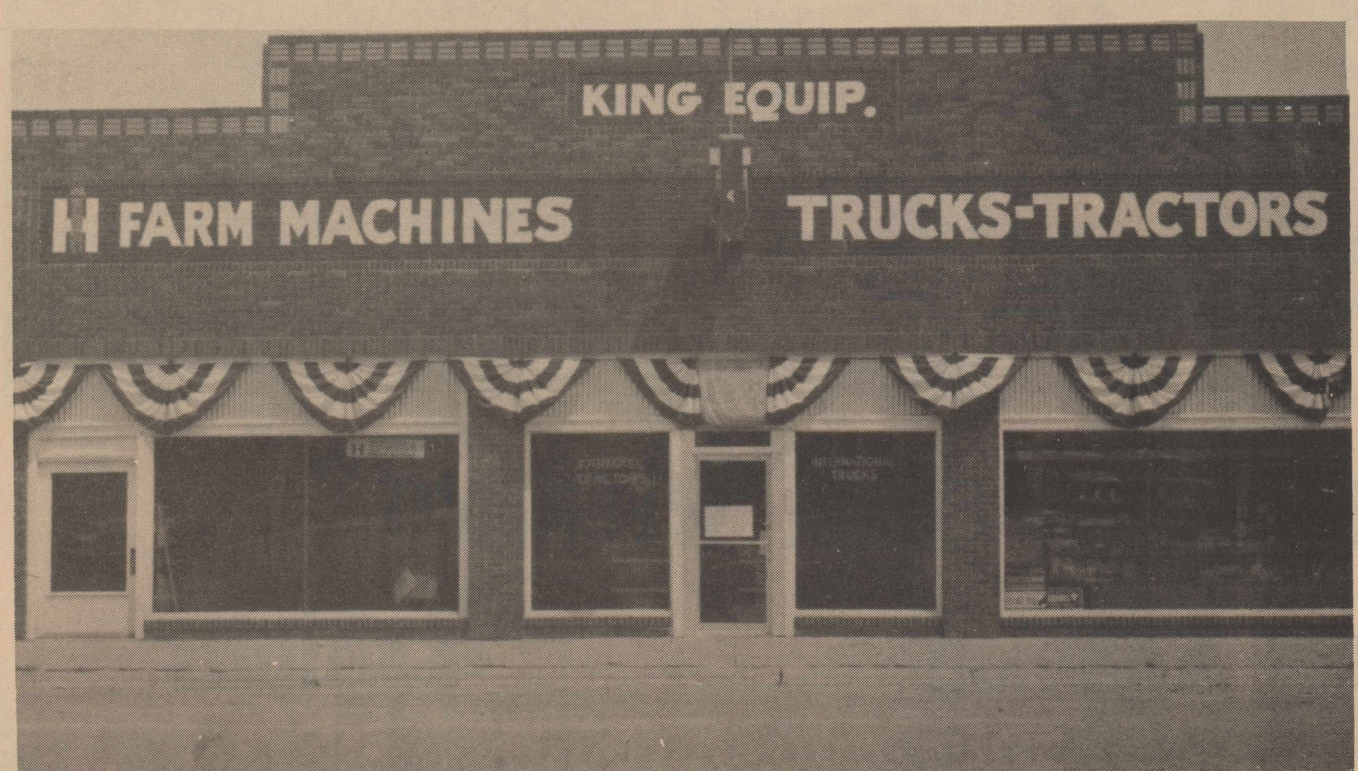

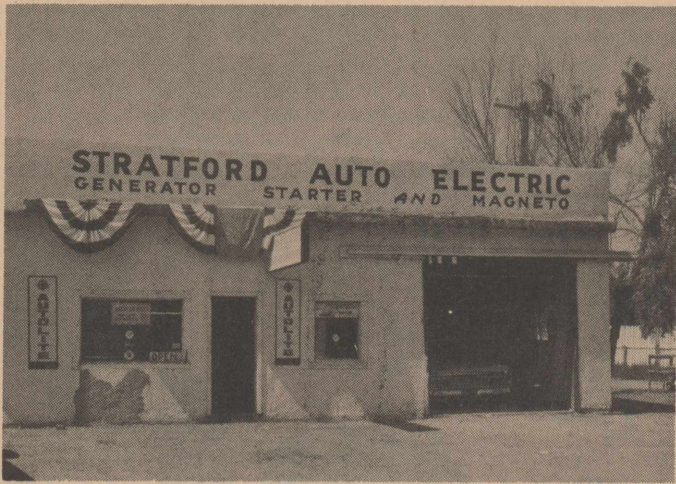

## Two Men Jailed After Robbery

Over \$5,000 in loot was recovered with the arrest of two men last Wednesday morning following the robbery of Van Boston's Trading Post in Stratford sometime after midnight Tuesday.

Kyle Weldon Jones, 28, of Sherman County, was arraigned about 11 a.m. Wednesday before Sherman County Judge W.S. (Bill) Frizzell, Jr. on a charge of burglary.

A Moore County resident, Clifford Brown, age unknown, was picked up and arrested at his job in Etter by Sherman County Sheriff Clois Vaughn and Moore County Deputy Keith Miller about noon. Brown is in the Moore County Jail also charged with burglary.

The robbery was discovered about 8 a.m. Wednesday morning by S.J. Davis, of Van Boston's Trading Post, when he

arrived to open the store. Davis notified Stratford City Police Chief Ed Sanders, who in turn notified the Sheriff's office.

Only a few hours later, Moore County officers notified Sherman County officers they had a tip on a "lot of loot" that was being stored in a barn in the southwest part of Sherman County on the Claude Sloan farm. Sloan lives in Amarillo and the land is rented out to

Paul Chesmer of Stratford, Chesmer was notified of the tipoff and joined officers to search the premises. A search revealed a host of articles varying from saddles, hardware and clothes to guns, battery chargers and drills which have been reported missing from several robberies over the Moore, Dallam, Sherman and Hartley county areas of late.

Jones, who had been previously identified by the tipster in Moore County, was apprehended by Sherman County Deputy T. Barbee and arrested. After questioning by Sheriff's officers, Jones admitted the theft of Van Boston's in Stratford and implicated the Moore county man.

Jones told officers "most of the stuff" they had taken from Boston's could be found in an automobile at Etter. A search by Moore and Sherman county officers of the Etter auto revealed the loot taken the night before from Boston's.

Officers from the four-county area were busy Wednesday af-

ternoon taking inventory of the loot that included 17 pair of new Levis, 8 watches, 2 sets of harness, 5 bridles, two guns, 3 saddles, 3 horse blankets, several pieces of luggage, 2 radios, flashlight and miscellaneous items...all this from Boston's.

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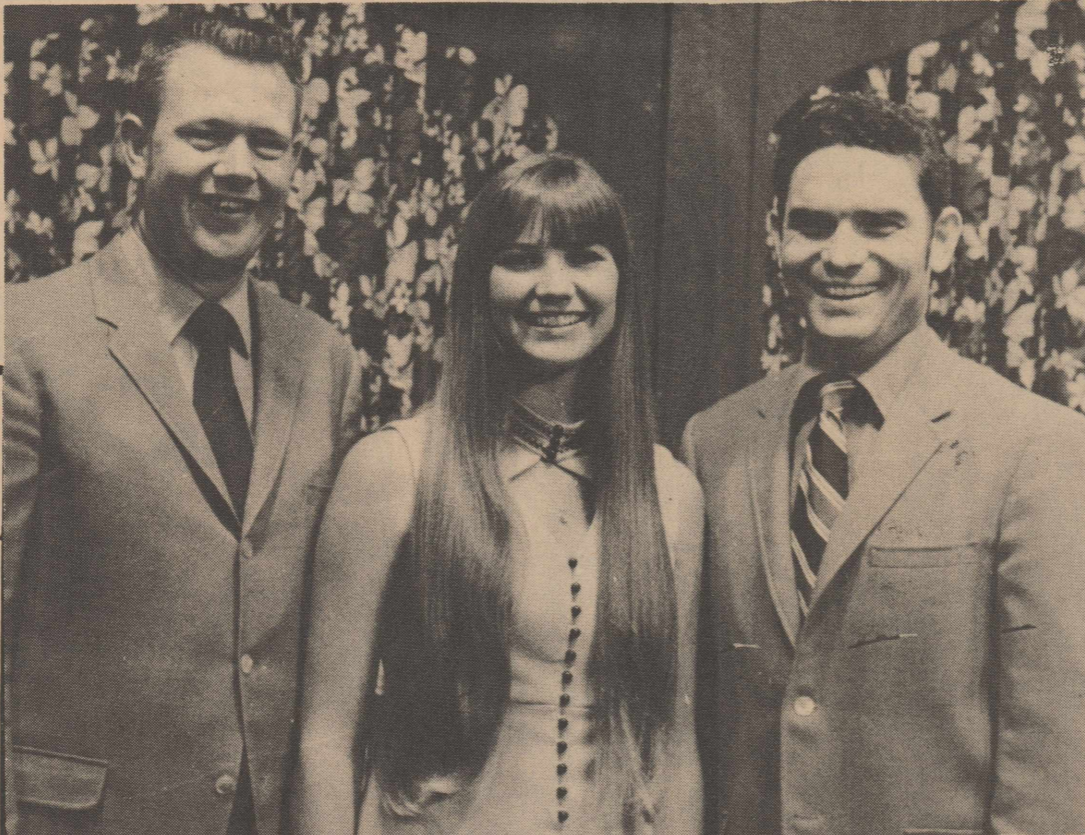

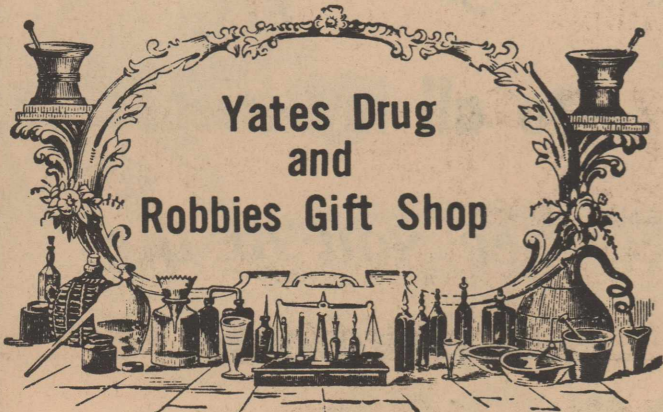

Wyatt's Stratford show promises to be one of the best in his career. It will be a major exhibit and admission will be free.



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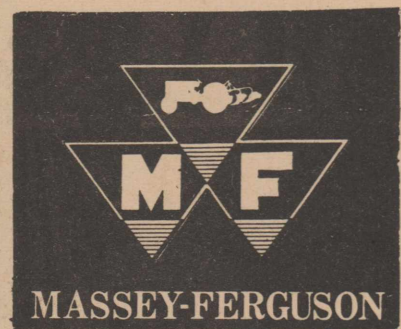

Baked Products Department will open Thursday morning at 8 a.m. to receive entries. All entries must be in place by 12:30 p.m. with judging to begin at 1 p.m.

Entries in the Baked Goods will be accepted for the eight sections in this year's exhibits.

Section A, Quick Breads will include classes of biscuits (6), cornbread, muffins (6) and Quick Loaf Breads.

Section B, Yeast Breads include classes of rolls (6), sweet rolls (6), white loaf cake and other.

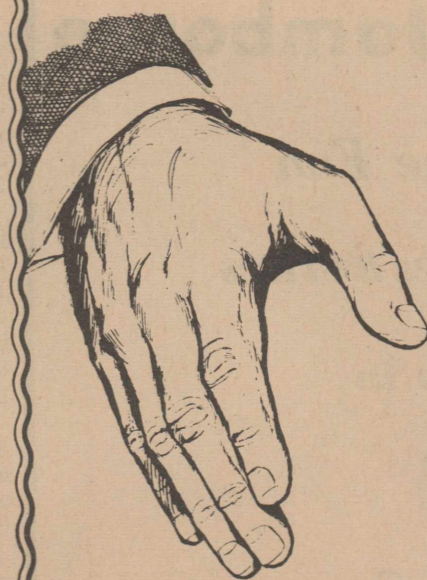

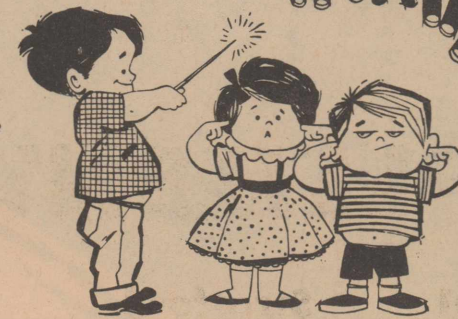

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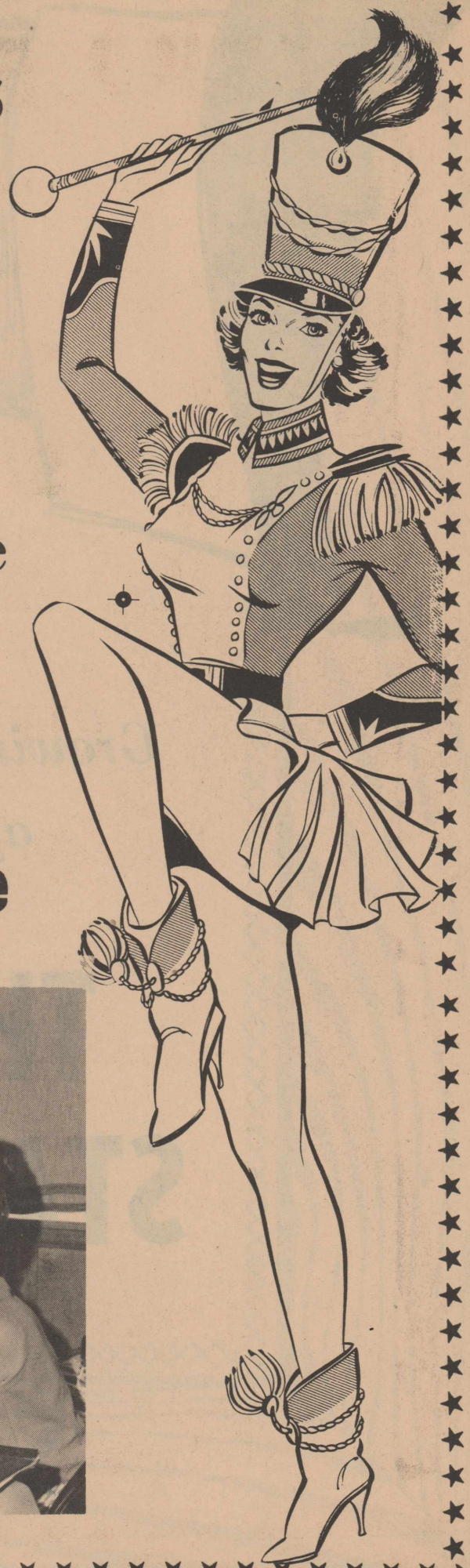
