Q. - How much revenue does the college get from the state if I take one threehour course and what is the tax for the junior college for a \$50,000 home?

A. — The revenue from course work varies depending on the type of instruction--the college receives no state funding for community service courses-and the number of "contact hours," the actual time spent in the classroom. To illustrate, the funding rate per contact hour for an English class is \$2.88. A three-hour course would involve 48 contact hours per semester. Multiply this times the rate and it equals \$138.24. Since state funding is received for a two-year period, this amount is multiplied times two. As a result, your taking a threehour English course equals state income of \$276.48 to WTC. Regarding the tax question, the college tax rate is 17.64 cents per \$100 valuation and for a \$50,000 home would be \$88.20.

#### Wiretap case

CINCINNATI (AP) — The city and a grand jury are investigating allegations that the phone company and police illegally wiretapped hundreds of phones, including those of Black Muslims, a federal judge and a billionaire.

The taps, the subject of a U.S. District Court trial that began last month, allegedly were placed to allow police to monitor investigations and to eavesdrop on suspected subversives.

## Ex-Gemcraft executives try again to start new business

HOUSTON (AP) The founders of Gemcraft Homes, once the biggest home builder in Texas, are back in business after losing their first company in the crash of the Texas real estate

But it wasn't easy being born again as home builders.

Wall Street financiers almost laughed at their plans, and many bankers rejected them before they finally found a game Houston developer willing to bankroll their second homebuilding company.

"We are the type of people that when we get knocked to the turf, we like to get back up and get into the competition," said Jerome B. "Bob" Hutchins, one of three men who, while in their mid-20s. founded Gemcraft in 1978.

The developers' new company is Mastermark Homebuilders

Although Mastermark is starting out small — it has nine employees and one model home in one subdivision — it shows promise of getting big.

At its grand opening earlier this month, it sold eight homes in two days to rack up more than \$1.5 million in revenues.

At Mastermark's grand opening Hutchins, Frank Romero and John Poss — all former executives at the top of Gemcraft's \$400 million-per-year operation rolled up their shirt sleeves to help sell houses to customers.

It was only a year ago that Hutchins and Romero lost their controlling interest in Gemcraft to First Texas Savings Association through a foreclosure proceeding. The Gemcraft stock had been collateral for a loan on a large parcel of land in Southwest Houston.

Romero and Hutchins resigned from Gemcraft in January 1988 eager to start another homebuilding company. Getting the funds. however, was tough.

Wall Street financiers were not receptive to the idea of starting a home-building company in Houston, where heavy foreclosures ravaged the real

> The blood units themselves tested negative in the blood bank's laboratory, but interviewers at the for-profit blood bank, Houston Apheresis Inc., apparently did not check a failsafe list that identifies donors who had previously tested positive.

> The Food and Drug Administration ordered the blood bank to recall the blood last September.

> One unit was drawn from a donor who had previously tested positive for antibodies to the AIDS virus and the other from a donor who had tested positive for hepatitis B, the newspaper

> After the recall, the FDA sent the blood bank a strongly worded regulatory letter demanding corrections of what District Director Gerald Vince called "serious violations of the federal Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act." A regulatory letter is one step short of license suspension.

> The blood bank's chief executive and owner, Dr. Gregory Reimer, says his bank does a good job. "I think we are singled out by the FDA, I think we are picked on to some degree," he said.

FDA spokesman Brad Stone denies Reimer's complaint that Houston Apheresis is being singled out. He says the agency has stepped up scrutiny of all blood banks in response to AIDS.

Several political operatives estimated that more than 200 Texans now spread around more than \$100,000 a year each in political contributions.

The proposed \$25,000 cap would apply only to state races. Congress regulates federal races.

The success of a slam often depends upon how the controls fit in the two hands. To find that fit, North used a jump to four clubs, a splinter bid. That showed a singleton club, at least fourcard spade support, and 12 or more points. East doubled to let his partner know that a club lead would be safe. South redoubled, not with any idea of playing that contract, but as a means of telling his partner he held the ace. Then North cue-bid the diamond ace, South cue-bid his heart void, and North asked for aces and simply bid the

Declarer played quickly and well. He won the ace of clubs and ruffed a club, and then played the ace of diamonds. At this point, can you really fault East for playing the diamond four? Next came the ace of hearts (declarer pitching a diamond), a heart ruff, another club ruff, another heart ruff, and a ruff of the last club. Declarer played a trump back to his jack and exited with a diamond. Suddenly poor East was on lead with nothing to play but a heart or a club, either of which would allow South to shed his last losing diamond while ruffing with the king of spades in dummy.

It's easy now to see that East should have thrown the diamond king under the ace, but full credit should go to declarer for giving immseit some chance for the slam. He played the diamond ace early, ruffed out all his side-suits, and drew just one round of trump before throwing East on lead.





## Retarded manto be released after 32 years

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) - A retarded man who has spent nearly 32 years in a state mental hospital will soon be released because the Utah Supreme Court says he was mistakenly ruled insane after he confessed to a 1955

"He was just a convenient suspect," attorney Brooke Wells said of client Bernt Murphy, a 51year-old man with the mental capacity of an 8-year-old.

Third District Judge Pat Brian is expected to rule by Feb. 6 on how much freedom Murphy should be granted. Brian last week received recommendations from a committee appointed after June's order by the state Supreme Court to release Mur-

phy.
Wells said Murphy should fare well in a group home with other retarded adults. But the man who supervised Murphy's treatment at Utah State Hospital in Provo for the past seven years doesn't

think he'd be happy there.
"Personally, I think it is cruel to send him away after this many years. We have taken care of his needs, cared about him and loved him. It makes me a little sad to be required to kick him out," said George Brinkerhoff, who also sat on the committee.

Murphy was 19 when he was arrested in 1957 for questioning in the rape of a 5-year-old Salt Lake City girl. He subsequently confessed to the 1955 slaying of a 23year-old woman he met while both were students at a state training school for the retarded.

Wells said there is little evidence linking Murphy to the slaying of Jocelyn Hickenlooper and that had there been a trial before Murphy was declared insane, he most likely would have

been cleared. Wells said notes from the 1957 investigation convinced her that police interrogators either suggested to Murphy that he was involved in the Hickenlooper killing or posed questions in such a way that the confused suspect just tried to satisfy them with his answers.

As a teen-ager, Murphy lived at the State Training School, an institution for the retarded in American Fork about 35 miles south of Salt Lake City. He was released in 1957.

"There was no place in the state we could send him," school Director Vernon Houston said in 1957. "Utah has no institutions for such people. ... All we can do is release them to society and they remain there until they commit a crime which sends them to the state prison."

In October 1957, Salt Lake City Police Chief W. Cleon Skousen said Murphy had confessed to Hickenlooper's slaying during routine questioning after the 5year-old rape victim identified him as her attacker.

Skousen said Murphy told officers he had hitchhiked from the school to Hickenlooper's Salt Lake City home the morning of June 11, 1955, and had asked her to go on a walk with him. When she rejected his advances, he killed her by choking her and hitting her with a rock, the chief said.

The body was found two weeks later in a shallow grave 15 miles from the Hickenlooper home.

Until Murphy confessed, the crime had been unsolved and police were heavily criticized. Then-Mayor Earl Glade said he was embarrassed by police

Third District Judge Stewart M. Hanson declared Murphy insane later in 1957, and ordered him sent to the state hospital.

Murphy was entitled to a yearly review, but was repeatedly denied freedom or even a hear-

In 1985, Wells took the case to the state's highest court.

The years have not been kind to Murphy, the attorney said. A strapping 6-footer in 1957, he now is a "kind of a withered little person," Wells said.

Brinkerhoff said he believes Murphy is very much the same sort of person he was three decades ago, and can be "very caring and loving." When there is a death in a family or a birthday at the hospital, Murphy alone among the residents always buys

The committee was unable to predict the outcome of Murphy's release, some members of the

panel said.

"The problem I foresee is him running away and coming back to us," said Brinkerhoff, noting that Murphy has no family or friends outside the hospital.





## Castro said to have asked Khrushchev to launch missiles against the U.S.

of the Cuban missile crisis, Fidel Castro was convinced a U.S. invasion was imminent and urgently asked Soviet leader Nikita S. Khrushchev to launch an immediate nuclear strike against the United States, a key Soviet source reportedly told some American colleagues.

The Cuban leader was said to have sent his message to Khrushchev after spending the night of Oct. 26, 1962 in the bomb shelter of the Soviet embassy in Havana, so convinced was he that war was about to break out.

Castro supposedly told Khrushchev the invasion would come within 48 hours.

The account from the Soviet source was relayed by Pierre Salinger, who was President Kennedy's press secretary at the time of the 1962 crisis. It came from a weekend meeting in. Moscow of U.S., Soviet and Cuban participants and scholars who have studied the world's brush with nuclear war 26 years



Afghan troops and Moslem guerrillas continue to fight for control of the Salang Highway, the only road linking the capital and the Soviet border.

Insurgents based in Pakistan said Sunday that Soviet bombing and missile attacks along the 260mile highway had killed 600 civilians and injured 1,200 in the past several days.

"The mangled bodies are still under the debris," the Afghan News Agency, operating from bordering Pakistan by a guerrilla group, said in a telexed statement.

Official Radio Kabul monitored in Pakistan, said Afghan troops had carried out "successful military operations" with civilians who want to keep the rugged Salang Highway open.

Just north of Kabul on Sunday, a convoy of Soviet soldiers in armored personnel carriers and trucks loaded with missile launchers cruised through a Soviet bunker checkpoint as helicopter gunships hovered nearby, offering cover.

A Soviet diplomat, speaking on condition of anonymity, said, "This could be the last convoy." He refused to elaborate.

The guerrillas are not a party to the U.N. agreement and have vowed to overthrow the government of President Najib once the

Soviets are gone. At the U.S. Embassy in Kabul, American diplomats said they would return once peace is restored in this war-torn county.

## DR. GOTT

DEAR DR. GOTT: My mother's doctor dismisses her complaints of urinary incontinence as an inevitable part of the aging process. Is he

DEAR READER: Not necessarily. Urinary incontinence, the inability to control the act of emptying the bladder, has been estimated to affect between 5 percent and 15 percent of the elderly, particularly women. The causes vary from poor muscular control and the effects of multiple pregnancies to hormone deficiency and chronic infection.

Because incontinence is embarrassing, few patients actually complain of this symptom to their doctors. unless the physicians question them in detail. Hence, experts have termed incontinence a "neglected" diagnosis. At a 1987 meeting of the American Urological Society, Dr. Tamara Bavendam, a Los Angeles urologist, presented a paper in which she showed that 70 percent of elderly incontinent women could be cured.

In some patients, surgery was successful; in the majority, non-surgical therapy - including medication, behavioral modification and electrical stimulation - resulted in complete continence or substantial improvement. Bavendam's message was that complete urologic evaluations should be performed on any incontinent woman, regardless of age, because many causes of this distressing symptom could be identified and treated. Therefore, although incontinence may accompany the aging process, this problem should not be dismissed as inevitable

DEAR DR. GOTT: I recently read an article linking the Epstein-Barr virus to the rubella vaccine. What can you tell me about this connection?

DEAR READER: Doctors customarily differentiate between Epstein-Barr virus (the cause of mononucleosis) and rubella virus (the cause of German measles). The micro-organisms are not thought to be related.

However, United Press International reported last year that a peculiar type of rubella virus (present in rubella vaccine introduced in 1979) may be the cause of a puzzling illness resembling mononucleosis. Chronic Epstein-Barr virus, or CEBV, syndrome had been thought to be due to a continuing infection with mononucleosis, characterized by periodic exhaustion, fatigue, depression and swollen glands. However, according

exposed to Biavax and Meruvax vaccines. Their illnesses may be due to a chronic allergic reaction to rubella virus, rather than to the Epstein-Barr virus. This link is now under intensive investigation but has yet to be confirmed.

## Facts heard in patient dumping case

VICTORIA, Texas (AP) — A federal administrative judge is expected to decide whether a local obstetrician violated antipatient dumping provisions when he ordered a woman in labor transferred to a hospital 170 miles away.

The case centers on Rosa Rivera, then 31, who arrived at Victoria's DeTar Hospital Dec. 5, 1986, to give birth to her sixth child.

Dr. Michael Burditt said he ordered Mrs. Rivera sent to John Sealy Hospital in Galveston because he feared her unborn child was growth-retarded and would need more care than could be provided in Victoria.

Transferring the child in his mother's womb was much better than having him make the trip after birth, the doctor said.

Mrs. Rivera never made it to Galveston. She gave birth in an ambulance about 30 miles outside

The government contends Mrs.

Rivera suffered from very high blood pressure on arrival at the Victoria hospital and that transporting her posed far more danger to her and her unborn child than delivery at DeTar.

In a hearing last week, Burditt was pitted against the U.S. Inspector General's Office of the Department of Health and Human Services, which fined him \$25,000 for violating antipatient dumping provisions of the Comprehensive Omnibus Budget Review Act of 1985.

"I feel like I have to fight it, not only for myself, but for all the other doctors in the country," Burditt, 44, was quoted in the Houston Chronicle Sunday as

U.S. Administrative Law Judge Charles Stratton said he'll probably make his decision in two to four months after reviewing stacks of written testimony and legal briefs submitted in the case.

While this season's losses are unusually high, the whoopers have made tremendous progress in recent years. In 1941, their numbers dwindled to 16 worldwide as development of farms and cities robbed them of their habitats.

The Texas flock doubled in six years and recorded no losses last

"When you average it out, it's not that bad," Schwindt said, referring to the dozen birds lost this winter. "It's just that it happened all in one year."

He said that the whooping crane flock as a whole has been growing, but there have been fluctuations.

"The last three years have just been phenomenal. You have to

expect something to break sooner or later. Back in 1981, they only produced three chicks, and only two of those made it back, Schwindt said.

There has been an ample food supply at the refuge this winter, and park personnel burned 1,600 acres of land to provide more open space for the whoopers.

The birds avoid overgrown areas where predators can easily

The birds are the largest in North America, standing nearly 5 feet tall with wings spanning more than 7 feet. Adults are snow white, with black wing tips and red crowns on their heads. Immature birds are rusty red and white, with black wing tips.

Schwindt said the birds will remain at the refuge for another two months. At the end of March and early April, they again begin their long flight north.

By mid-April, he said, all should be gone.
