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The "If" In Tax Reduction

Writing in Nation's Business, Walter W. Heller, who is chairman of the President's Council of Economic Advisors, says that taxes must be cut. In his words: "It now seems clear that one of the chief reasons for the sluggish behavior of our economy over the past five years or so is the persistent drag exerted by our present federal tax system."

There will be general agreement with that statement. And a tax reduction will come as welcome news to all of us-if!

The "if" lies in whether or not the tax saving is offset and more by increased living costs, due to a new surge of inflation. And one of the surest ways to produce inflation is found in successive, growing and huge government deficits.

The intelligent-and safe-way to institute tax reductions is to accompany them with the most stringent possible reductions in non-essential government spending.
