WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate today set the stage for rejecting the nomination of John the White House appeared resigned to defeat and said President Bush would have a replacement candidate quickly if Tower

Crawfish wars

SHREVEPORT. La Louisiana Agriculture Commissioner Bob Odom says no matter what his counterpart in Texas says, Louisiana is still the crawfish capital of the South.

Odom's comments Wednesday were in reference to remarks made by Texas Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower on Tuesday in announcing a Houston supermarket chain's marketing campaign for Texas mudbugs.

"At long last we have a pure Texas crawfish that is going to save us Texans from the shame and humiliation that we have experienced over the last many, many generations of having to eat those smelly, mud-coated, itty-bitty, slow-witted crawfish from Louisiana," he said.

Odom said Louisiana crawfish leave their Texas counterparts in the mud.

North trial

WASHINGTON (AP) -President Reagan made a dramatic appearance at a White House meeting to thank 25 wealthy con tributors who gave money to what was later declared an illegal fund-raising operation for the Nicaraguan Contra rebels, a witness in Oliver North's trial says.

Carl "Spitz" Channell testified Wednesday about the meeting and North's role in the fund-raising operation.

Channell pleaded guilty in 1987 to conspiring to defraud the Treasury by using a tax-exempt foundation for a non-exempt purpose raising money for Contra military activities. One of the counts against North, who helped direct the Reagan administration's secret Contra assistance efforts, is that he participated in the tax conspiracy.

Assault rifle

AUSTIN (AP) Semiautomatic and assault rifles would be illegal in Texas under a bill filed by a state lawmaker who says his measure is "an ounce of prevention.' "What are you going to

use an assault rifle for? To hunt people? — And that's what they've been used for," said Rep. Harold Dutton, D-Houston. "I think even though we haven't had an incident in Texas, it's probably a good idea for us to do it (ban the rifles). Five school children in

Stockton, Calif. were killed in mid-January by a man using an AK-47 assault rifle, and 29 children and one teacher were wounded.

LOS ANGELES (AP) - The awakened in a parking lot and Donovan because he wasn't sick all day offering help and donaplight of a homeless paraplegic whose wheelchair was stolen as he slept in a parking lot unleashed an outpouring of public sympathy, but the man disappeared before he could accept any offers

Details about George Donovan's life and his misfortune were not all that clear, but people who tried to help him said the theft was typical: a snapshot of misery on Skid Row.

'George is a victim of the victims," said Ray McCann, com-Union Rescue Mission, where Donovan found shelter briefly.

Police agreed Donovan, who claimed to be a veteran, was the victim of Skid Row thieves. And although people who have heard about the theft wanted to help, there was no one to refer them to, said Lt. Fred Nixon, a police spokesman.



Guarding against the improbable

Neither North nor South could bid no-trump with only three small hearts. So the bidding went round and round until North belatedly raised South to four spades. Since the East-West hearts were divided 4-3, three no-trump would have been an easy contract. But it was up to South to

make four spades. The defense began with West taking the A-K-Q of hearts and then switching to a diamond. Declarer won the ace in his hand, cashed the ace of spades, guarding against a singletor queen in West's hand, then got to dummy with a diamond to take the spade finesse. That worked, but unfortunately West showed out. There was no longer any way to avoid losing a trick to the queen, so declarer was down

Declarer's safety play was ill-conceived. Sure, laying down the ace protected against the singleton queen being with West, but if West held a singleton spade, it was much more likely to be any one of the other four missing spades. Here the right play is to take a first-round finesse, hoping that East has the queen. When it works, the finesse can be repeated, and East can be denied a spade trick even when he holds four to the queen.

contact with the student, they likely face no danger of infection.

In addition, individuals over the age of 32 are not considered at risk since they have likely already encountered the disease within their lifetime and now have a natural immunity.

Individuals under the age of 32 who received a measles vaccination prior to 1968 are listed as a group who have a high risk of contracting the disease if they come in contact with it. Collegeage students generally fall under this category.

To qualify further, for this vacciation to be effective, this group should have received this immunization after the age of 15 months.

All persons who believe they might be at risk are being directed to the Snyder-Scurry Health Unit at 911 26th St. for immunization shots.

State health officials stress that red measles, rubeola, should not be confused with rubella, German measles, which can cause birth defects in the babies of infected mothers.

Pan Am Corp., a competitor, said it would not match the fares. Meanwhile, Eastern's sister airline, Houston-based Continental, announced it was assuming Eastern's lucrative New York-Miami route beginning today with four daily daily round-trip flights.

The United Nations' legal office on Wednesday released a letter Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard A. Shevardnadze wrote Perez de Cuellar withdrawing Soviet reservations on six human rights treaties.

His letter suggested, however, that the Soviet Union would agree to the court's arbitration in all human rights cases.

Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev proposed in his December address to the General Assembly that "all states recognize the binding jurisdiction of the International Court of Justice with respect to the interpretation and application of human rights agreements.'

One senior State Department official said the announcement "may indicate their seriousness in accepting the court's jurisdiction in a greater range of cases. It is a major step.

"Soviet legal writers used to say in their literature that they don't agree in advance in going to the Court, believing it was dominated by Western influences," said the official, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

The World Court, formally known as the International Court of Justice at The Hague, was established in 1945 and is the main judicial arm of the United Nations. While the officially neutral Netherlands-based tribunal has no powers of enforcement, its rulings heavily on world opinion.
