

Cat owners typically own more than one, and cats are said to outnumber dogs 54.6 million to 52.4 million. The trend toward cats is said to be associated with freedom of care.

While a dog has to be walked or let out, cats can even be left unattended for long periods of time. While many towns have leash laws for dogs, cats generally can roam free until they come into contact with some unfriendly neighborhood dog.

Another factor contributing to feline popularity is the increased number of women living on their own, and women tend to own cats more frequently than men. The shift in preference nationwide is also evi-

dent at animal shelters where cats are easier to place than are dogs

Preference for low-maintenance pets is not only

growing in popularity for cats, but also for pet birds--just not in the same household.

Plants may be easier to own than pets. A little water, an occasional pinch of plant foot is normal-

The Journal of the American Animal Hospital Association reports the death of a springer spaniel after eating a 2-pound bag of chocolate chips.

Few pet owners realize the toxic potential of chocolate, Dr. Aaron Glauberg, a West Orange, N.J., veterinarian wrote in the journal.

"When pets are finally taken to veterinarians," he says, "they are often in more advanced states than if they had eaten something obviously toxic, like rat poison.'

As little as 4 ounces of milk chocolate or one-half ounce of baking chocolate can be lethal for a small dog such as a Chihuahua or toy poodle, according to the journal.

Chocolate poisoning occurs less often in cats because their eating habits are different.

While a very small amount of chocolate may not harm some dogs, it is safest to avoid giving it to them at all, says Glauberg.

Pipeline problems denied

ODESSA, Texas (AP) — A top official of a company with plans to pump oil through a Midland-to-Los Angeles pipeline denies the firm is in financial trouble that would threaten the \$1.6 billion venture.

"We're going to have a few growing pains when you have a project of this magnitude. That's to be expected," said Michael Owens of Midland, vice president of Pacific & Texas Pipeline & Transportation Co., which had proposed the project.

proposed the project.

But the company faces numerous lawsuits claiming non-payment, an eviction from its offices and the revocation of right-of-way permits, The Odessa American reported Wednesday.

The Federal Bureau of Land Management revoked Pacific & Texas' right-of-way permits for 269 miles of land in California, Arizona, New Mexico and Texas because nearly \$100,000 in fees has gone unpaid. The company also faces a lawsuit filed by a Midland real estate corporation seeking more than \$300,000 on an office lease that allegedly was broken. Other suits totaling more than \$56,000 have been filed against the company by vendors for items such as fencing, land improvement and other services.

Last week, the company was evicted from its second Midland office by Consolidated Federal Bank FSB, the owner of the building, for non-payment of rent since the first of the year.

Owens said the company still plans to build the pipeline, but told The Dallas Morning News that the project is stalled by the lack of an agreement to secure enough Alaskan oil to pump through the proposed 1,036-mile pipeline. To get the project financed, the company must obtain "throughput" agreements from at least three oil producers willing to ship their oil through the pipeline.



'He was one of those people who seemed somehow invincible," said Robert Fisk of the Times of London, a friend of Anderson's. "He had no reason to be frightened, because he had made no enemies in Lebanon. If Terry Anderson could be abducted, then no one was safe."

The illusion was shattered March 16, 1985, after Anderson

He would listen to jazz tapes played a game of tennis. Three young men in a green Mercedes kidnapped him at gunpoint. The pro-Iranian Shiite group Islamic Jihad claimed responsibility.

Anderson is the longest-held of the 15 foreigners in captivity in Lebanon. His father and brother both died of cancer in 1986. He has never seen his younger daughter, Sulome, born shortly after his abduction.

His family has little encouragement except accounts of freed hostages who describe a man who has not lost his will.

The Rev. Benjamin Weir, a Presbyterian clergyman who was released by captors in September 1985 after 16 months as a hostage, told how Anderson led worship services with other hostages and fashioned flash cards from cheese wrappers so he could learn Arabic.

Weir carried a letter from Anderson when he was freed in which Anderson wrote that the hostages' main problem was keeping occupied. He said the other men and the Bible "have kept me sane.'

Anderson, who had started himself on a health kick shortly before being kidnapped, reportedly exercises and even wrestled with his guard.

ANGLETON, Texas (AP) - A New Jersey woman who allegedly contacted a Texas prison inmate to arrange the slaying of her estranged husband has been arrested in a murder-for-hire investigation, authorities said.

Meanwhile, Texas officials made public a list of items found in the cell of Kevin James Veschi, 23, of San Antonio, who is serving a life sentence for burglary and three 20-year sentences on attempted capital murder, aggravated robbery and theft.

Bexar County officials searched Veschi's cell after a convicted murderer, John Civella, 33, told authorities Veschi approached him and wanted him to carry out slayings of at least 12 people, including judges, prosecutors, former attorneys, a newspaper reporter and a New Jersey man.

found in Veschi's cell at the maximum-security Ramsey I Unit in Rosharon in Brazoria County, New Jersey officials were arresting a woman allegedly linked in the murder-for-hire scheme.

Patricia Bello, 45, of Freehold Township, N.J., was arrested about 7 a.m. Wednesday on her way to work, said Anthony J. Mellaci Jr., an assistant prosecutor for the Monmouth County, N.J., prosecutors office.

Ms. Bello, who New Jersey authorities said had contacted an undercover agent and said she wanted her 43-year-old husband, John Bello, killed, was being held in lieu of \$100,000 bond.

She was charged with conspiring to commit murder or ag-

On Wednesday, while officials gravated assault on her husband were revealing the list of items and with conspiracy to commit murder or aggravated assault with Veschi.

> An affidavit submitted to a Texas judge in Brazoria County said that, according to Civella, Mrs. Bello agreed to pay \$5,000 to Veschi and \$5,000 to the hitman.

Mrs. Bello, according to the affidavit, is the mother of Veschi's former girlfriend, who was not named in the document.

Mellaci said about 300 pieces of mail were found in Veschi's cell and that at least 50 of them had Mrs. Bello's name on them, but did not elaborate on their con-

He also said New Jersey authorities searched Mrs. Bello's car and her home, but he declined to elaborate on what was found in those searches.

The Bellos were married in June 1970 and Mrs. Bello, an instructional aide for 7th and 8th grade English students in Freehold Township, filed for divorce in October 1986, alleging "extreme cruelty" dating to 1974, according to the divorce petition.

The couple, however, continued to live in the same home.

Attorneys for the couple did not immediately return telephone calls to The Associated Press.

A search of Veschi's cell revealed numerous letters, two photo albums, several envelopes with papers, used carbon paper and a "Convicts for Christ" pocket planner, according to an inventory list submitted by Bexar County District Attorney's investigator Brian Price.





DEAR DR. GOTT: Our son, 29, had a pre- and post-operative diagnosis of giant multilobe aneurysm of basilar artery. He had a craniotomy with clipping of basilar aneurysm. I'm not allowed in the medical library so am unable to find out what this all means.

Can you help?
DEAR READER: The basilar artery is one of the large arteries sup-plying the base of the brain at the back of the head. When a weakened portion of the arterial wall balloons out from the pressure within the vessel, the condition is called an

Aneurysms can rupture, causing bleeding into the brain. Therefore, once discovered, they are usually surgically treated. As you can imagine, this is a delicate operation during which the skull must be opened (craniotomy) and the diseased artery identified. Then it is clipped or tied so that it cannot burst.

Ministry sues S. Padre Island

SOUTH PADRE ISLAND, Texas (AP) — Christian outreach ministers eager to spread the Gospel during spring break have taken the Town of South Padre Island to federal court over an ordinance banning distribution of literature on the beaches.

A hearing was set for 8:30 a.m. today at which the ministry planned to seek a temporary restraining order and injunctions permitting distribution of the religious tracts.

Plaintiffs Kevin Pitt, Jerry Davis and Street Reach Ministries

sued after a city official told them of the ordinance.


Pitt said the ministry wants to provide an alternative to the companies promoting beer and condoms to the spring-breakers. He said three constitutional lawyers were traveling from Atlanta to help the ministers with their case.

"We wanted to go and be a positive influence on the island," Pitt said Wednesday

The suit, filed Tuesday in U.S. District Court in Brownsville, accuses the Town of South Padre Island of interfering with the constitutional freedoms of religion and speech. Town Public Works Director Gary Becher also is named in the litigation.

"We're not singling out any one group or any one opinion," said City Manager Eddie Campirano. "We have an ordinance prohibiting solicitation, whether it is commercial or religious. When the public is

out there on the beach, they have a right to be out there and enjoy it and be left alone.'






