\section*{Adams awaits} Dallas hearing
DALLAS (AP) - Randall Dale Adams, featured in the movie "The Thin Blue Line" and whose murder conviction was overturned two
weeks ago, is awaiting a bond hearing in Dallas following his transfer from state prison.
Adams, convicted in the 1976 slaying of Dallas police officer Robert Wood, was moved from the Texas Department of Corrections Jim Ewell, public information officer for the Dallas County Sheriff's Department.
"He stays in our system until the court acts - probably a bond hearing,", Ewell said.
Adams' guilt was questioned in the Errol Morris documentary movie "The Thin Blue Line" and later by state District Judge Larry Baraka, who recommended Adams receive a new rria or be sel free After a hearing in December, Baraka ruled ual Adams did no suppressed evidence.
On March 1, the Texas Court of Criminals Appeals overturned Adams' conviction. That came just days after a three-member pane parole request. The appeals court ordered Adams transferred from state prison to
the custody of the Dallas County sheriff, where he would be eligible the custody of the Dallas County sheriff, where he would be eligible
for release on bond, said his attorney, Randy Schaffer. Kim Smith, deputy clerk for Baraka's Criminal District Court No.
2, said the court will not schedule a bond hearing until it receives the appellate court's mandate in the case. Ms. Smith said she had no word on when that might be
